Here is what I heard. I do not claim anything, so please ask for confirmation. Take what resonates and drop what does not.

1. A New Season Is Here.

A new season where your current ceiling will become your floor. The things you could only reach before will now be easily accessible. Like running in mud and now on dry ground. Before and after, like a day of Pentecost. This is meant to be a time of refreshing.

2. The Bamboo Tree

We must remember how the bamboo tree grow. Five years of underground, unseen growth, then when it breaks through the ground, it grows 90 feet tall in 5 weeks. Breakthrough is here.

3. Paper Walls.
