- 2. Pray before you begin your study. Ask God to help you understand and He will do this for you. Write out your answer.
- 3. As you read the homework, make it a point to underline Scripture. Write thoughts and personal applications that have been helpful to you.
- 4. If you have problems with your lesson, call your leader. She is there to help you.
- 5. Keep in mind that the more time you can put into the study, the more you will get out of it.

PARTICIPATING IN A SMALL GROUP:

- 1. If you are new to Bible study, do not be disturbed if you are not able to answer every question. As you study, you will pick up speed in doing your lessons. You will also build up your understanding of the Bible and will soon discover that you are able to enjoy and answer more and more questions each week.
- 2. Be willing to share personal experiences or ways in which the Lord has helped you. Your experience may be just the encouragement someone in your group will appreciate and find helpful. Because time is short, be brief so others will have time to share.
- 3. If you tend to be talkative, please do not monopolize the discussion. Give quiet people a chance to express themselves also. If you are timid, you do not need to participate in the discussion until you feel comfortable.
- 4. There may be people from different churches in your discussion group. Make it a point not to discuss other churches or other pastors. We discuss only the Bible questions and what they mean to us personally.
- 5. Please do not bring other materials to share.
- 6. If you represent a business or other endeavor, this is not the time or place to promote or sell.

Saturation | Investigation | Explanation | Application

Saturation:

- 1. Read the passage through several times. Consider reading a variety of translations.
- 2. Read before and after passage to keep context.
- 3. Write down any thoughts or questions you may have.

Investigation:

- 1. Who is speaking; who is the author?
- 2. To whom is he speaking?
- 3. What is the reason or purpose for writing?
- 4. What is the background?
- 5. List facts.
- 6. Identify any contrasts.
- 7. Are there any repeated words or phrases?
- 8. Identify any metaphors or analogies.
- 9. List key words or phrases. Look them up in a dictionary, or even on Google.
- 10. Ask these six questions: Who? What? Where? Why? When? How?
- 11. Is there a list of anything? (e.g. Galatians 5- Fruit of the Spirit)

- 12. Is there a description given?
- 13. Is there a quotation used? If so, where is it taken from and to what is it referring?
- 14. Is there a progression or digression?
- 15. What does this passage tell me about God the Father, Jesus the Son, the Holy Spirit?
- 16. Identify the main point of the passage.
- 17. What does the author want to communicate?

Meditation:

- 1. Think on the passage.
- 2. Pray about the passage.
- 3. Make notes as you think about it. (phone, iPad, sticky notes, etc.)

Application:

- 1. Is there a command to obey?
- 2. Is there a promise to claim?
- 3. Is there a warning to heed?
- 4. Is there an example to follow or avoid?
- 5. What does this passage mean to me?
- 6. Is there an action or attitude I need to take or change? (Do I need to forgive someone?, etc.)
- 7. What lessons or applications can be drawn from this passage?

Dear Precious Friend,

I pray that this book would be as life-changing for us as it was for the people who lived it. God is ready to use you in a mighty, world-changing way. So, are you ready to change the world through Him as we dive into the book of Acts together?

CHAPTER 1 & 2

Dear Precious Friend,

Acts Chapters 1-2 cover the acts of the Holy Spirit and birth of the early church. Jesus commanded His followers to make disciples of all nations in Luke 24:46-49, and Acts 1:8 restates that commission with equipping, "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Jesus fulfilled His words in Matthew 16:18, "I will build My church, and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it" when the early church was born. The same Holy Spirit empowers us today to bear witness to Jesus Christ before all the earth for salvation "that whoever calls on the name of the LORD shall be saved" Acts 2:21.

Chapter 1 begins with a prologue, or introduction, referring to a "former account" written to a man named Theophilus. Early tradition identifies Luke as the author continuing his account about Jesus to Theophilus from Luke 1:3. Next, a section on the promised Holy Spirit gives insight to the preparations and meaning for the Holy Spirit's coming. The Holy Spirit, the Promise of the Father, declared by Jesus, sets itself apart from the water baptism by John the Baptist, and will empower disciples to carry the gospel throughout the world. Following the promised Holy Spirit, Jesus ascends, or gets "taken up," to heaven completing His earthly ministry while the apostles watch and take hope, as we do, in the promise from Acts 1:11, that "This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven. After Jesus' ascension, waiting in prayer and supplication for the promised Holy Spirit, Peter addresses the need to replace Judas Iscariot as "written in the Book of Psalms: 'Let another take his office'" Acts 1:20. Two qualifications required this man to have accompanied the apostles from the beginning of Jesus' ministry eye-witnessing His miracles and teachings and eye-witnessing His resurrection. Seeking God in prayer then casting lots by faith, Matthias was chosen. What tremendous wisdom, understanding, and guidance the Word of God and prayer provided the apostles then and us still today, when we chose to live by faith and obedience!

In Chapter 2, the Holy Spirit comes at Pentecost, a major Jewish festival, also known as "the Day of Firstfruits." This Pentecost symbolized the day of firstfruits for Christ's church marking the beginning of the great soul harvest who will come to know Christ and unite together through the work of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit attracted a crowd with the sound like a rushing wind and disciples speaking in tongues, or in the original Greek, "diverse languages." Jews, gathered from other nations in Jerusalem for the festival, witnessed the wonderful works of God through the disciples praising Him in their native languages. Some marveled and wondered what it meant, while others mocked the disciples for drunkenness. Peter gives a sermon addressing the crowd with truth and respect. He refutes accusations about the disciples'drunkenness, explains prophecy from Joel in the Old Testament promising a time when all who followed God would receive His Spirit, and presents proofs from David's psalms

concluding Jesus as both Lord and Christ. Peter's sermon cut to men' hearts leading them to ask "what shall we do?" Like Peter, can we lead others to salvation with the same answer he gave? "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is to you and to your children, and to all" Acts 2:38-39. Following Peter's sermon, the church grew exponentially creating increased needs and responsibilities including training large groups and bringing them into fellowship with other believers, teaching right doctrine, training in fellowship, or learning to share in the lives of other believers, and training in the breaking of bread and prayer. As the early church, so too today, may we learn to commit ourselves to Jesus Christ and each other in the power of the Holy Spirit working together united in the body of Christ.



CHAPTER 3 - 5

Dear Precious Friends,

There are so many amazing events and valuable insights in the three chapters you are about to experience, far too many to include in this letter! I encourage you as you read this biography, which may even seem repetitive to you if you are already familiar with these events, to really put yourself in the shoes of these individuals. If you are anything like me, you may find your experience simultaneously inspiring, encouraging, convicting (gulp), and stirring introspective questions.

Chapter 3 opens with Peter and John being asked for alms by a lame man outside the temple. In our world, this might be like a panhandler interrupting our errands to ask for money. Peter and John weren't able to help the man with what he asked. They could have simply said "no" and kept walking or avoided eye contact and pretend they didn't see him. But they saw through what he perceived his need to be, which was money, and helped him on a far deeper level. They also specifically told him the help came in the Name of Jesus Christ.

When people come to us with a perceived need, do we stop and address their true need? Do we tell them we are helping them in the Name of Jesus?

The miracle God performed through them attracted the attention of the masses who were impressed by their gift of healing. Rather than bask in the adoration, they seized the chance to tell about the Source of their gift, their Savior, their Lord, Jesus.

If someone gives us adulation, do we point them to Jesus or do we take the credit? Is it our accomplishment, or is it God's accomplishment that He has graciously allowed us to participate in?

Peter and John's bold evangelism upset the church leaders. Thankfully, we at The Garden Fellowship are not under this sort of misdirected leadership! But evangelism and speaking the Truth landed these two in jail and they were required to defend themselves against the church leaders. This looks like a recipe for utter disaster! Peter, who very recently denied Jesus three times out of fear he would also be arrested (Luke 22:54-62, Matthew 26:69-75), is now boldly defending himself and John against the very same individuals who sentenced Jesus to death! Where did that boldness come from? It came from being filled with the Holy Spirit (Acts 4:8, Luke 12:11-12).

Are we sincerely asking and then allowing the Holy Spirit to fill us and give us boldness to proclaim Jesus?

Precious friends, as we pray and interact with the Holy Spirit, we need to be sincere in our hearts. Throughout this section of Scripture, you will see the amazing things that very ordinary

people can accomplish by being filled with the power of the Holy Spirit. We also see some devastating consequences of trying to lie to the Holy Spirit. It is said that we "can fool all of the people some of the time and fool some of the people all of the time." Make no mistake, there is no fooling God. There is no sense in trying to pretend with Him or hide things from Him, because He sees straight into our thoughts and our heart. (1 Samuel 16:7, Proverbs 21:2, 1 Corinthians 4:1-5)

The Holy Spirit is ready and willing to reveal great things to you and accomplish great things through you. I pray that you read and study with sincere expectation, and just see what He has planned for you!



Dear Precious Friend,

Acts Chapters 6-8 discusses the story of a remarkable man. He was a servant to the Lord. He was noted to be full of wisdom and the Holy Spirit. This man, by the name of Stephen, was chosen by God to be the first of thousands of martyrs to die for the sacred name of Jesus.

During this time, the church in Jerusalem was rapidly growing. People were joining Christianity by the thousands. With the growing numbers, the Hellenists declared that their widows were not being taken care of as well as others. So, seven men were appointed to this task, Stephen being one of them. Stephen was noted to perform great wonders and signs among the people, and even proclaimed to fix his gaze up to Heaven and see Jesus standing at the right hand of the Father. Of course, this would cause an uprising. People begin to falsely accuse him of speaking against the law and against Moses. But Stephen clearly lays it out for them, referencing names such as Joseph, Moses, David, and ultimately Jesus, in that these were all people God had sent, yet man rejected them one after the other. It is a clear picture how we can resist the Holy Spirit and the path God sets before us.

The synagogue eventually puts Stephen to death by stoning him. As he falls on his knees, crying out to Jesus, he says "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." It instantly reminded me of the first words Jesus spoke on the cross. "Father, forgive them." What a beautiful picture of the powerful grace of God, especially after following persecution. Because, with persecution, comes the most growth of the church. People scattered from Jerusalem, and preached wherever their feet took them, out into Judea and Samaria, throughout the Roman Empire, and further and further.

Stephen's death is a true example of being faithful to the Lord. He served in the ministry that God called him to, to serve tables and help widows. So, lovely ladies, remember to keep your gaze fixed on Heaven. Remember to be honored to serve in whatever ministry God calls you to. Remember to share the name of Jesus, and all that He represents. He wasn't a man that was stoned to death, away from the public eye. He was crucified publicly, for all to see, with arms stretched open, waiting to love us.

When you share the gospel, you are helping to keep dispersing the Church. And you never know who you are influencing! The one man who saw Stephen die, and would radically be changed by it, was Paul!

After all, friends, how beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news.



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Dear Precious Friend,

I often read the Bible as if it contains personal stories from close friends. Letters written of what has happened in their lives, filled with all the drama of their time, the joys among their congregations and the sufferings that come along with experiencing life. Acts, in particular, holds that place very well since it speaks in the context of stories being told from the perspective of experience. You have learned this, throughout the reading of it, and have come to discover that, in fact, it IS that because it was written by Luke to share the recordings of the beginnings of the church.

If unknown to you, as it was to me, our friend Luke became a believer after the Lord's resurrection. Meaning: that he wrote these accounts without knowing Jesus physically and came to hear the gospel, came to believe its power, and, in faith, lived his life for Jesus in the beginnings of a church that was just technically starting. He came to faith, in probably the hardest time to be a Christian. People were denying the gospel's power, Jesus' authority, the belief system that you can be born again, and literally being martyred. Can you imagine that? Realistically, if this was happening at the time I came to know Jesus, which was modern day 2010, this faith would sound insane to die for (did I mention I was 17 at that time? It totally would not have been cool). However, Luke did it.

In the next couple chapters, I encouraged you to make Luke a personal friend. To be curious about the founding of the Corinthian Church and the various trips traveled (Chapter18), to get informed (and maybe even research like I did) of the political/social drama from Chapter 19, and to resonate with saying our goodbyes, like Chapter 20, to people that have made detrimental influence within our own church family.

The nerd in me wants to tell you history isn't boring and that it does tell us a lot and that Acts is *THE* book to learn about what not to do as a church body (big educational voice here). However, I acknowledge that a lot of us do not share the same itch to read various recorded accounts that feel like they don't apply to our life. And that's okay, because I know that if you made it this far to week eight, at times, especially if you are really going through it, reading the Bible feels like we are just reading someone's Cornell notes. But I say it again, make these next three chapters personal. Let the Holy Spirit tell you what He did in your older church family. Let Him tell you what He wants to do with you.

Maybe you won't be at the verge of starting political riots, but I do pray you are encouraged that what you believe is true. That the gospel is worth so much "trouble" because it is revolutionary to the heart and detrimental to the soul.

Dear Precious Friend,

In the beginning of Chapter 21, we see Paul heading to Jerusalem. On his way, he takes a couple stops to visit believers. Some shared prophetic messages from the Holy Spirit warning Paul to avoid Jerusalem. So, did our dear Paul compromise when he decided to continue his trip to Jerusalem? It is true, these prophetic messages could have been warnings, but they could possibly stand as messages to "get ready" instead of "don't go." We don't know for sure, but we can applaud Paul for his courage to lay his life in the Lord's hands and say "the will of the Lord be done." May we as followers of Christ have the courage to do the same.

Later in Chapter 21, when Paul arrived in Jerusalem, a well-known dispute arose: should believers forsake the Law of Moses or not? Paul had already settled that problem by declaring that the same grace that gives Gentile believers freedom to abstain from certain traditions also gives Jewish believers freedom to observe them. Even with this declaration, good intentions turned into a temple riot all when some jumped to conclusions. It's a solemn reminder not to allow certain biases or prejudices to cause us to jump to conclusions about others.

I personally title Chapter 22: Paul's Testimony. As Paul stood before the crowd, he began to share his story: zealous Jew, arresting Christians, turned sold-out follower of Jesus. He boldly shared his conversion and new-found calling: missionary to the Gentiles. Friend, what is your testimony? Do you have a conversion story? I pray you boldly share your testimony for the glory of the Lord. There may be parts of the story you wish were erased, but look at Paul's story in Chapter 22, God used every moment, both good and bad, to create a beautiful testimony of His grace.

In Chapter 23, we find Paul at a low point. Paul's witness for Christ in Jerusalem led to legalistic Jews causing a riot in the temple. Also, his testimony before the Sanhedrin left them in confusion. Jesus met Paul in his discouragement. Acts 23 says, "The Lord stood by him and said, 'Be of good cheer." The Lord's message to Paul simply infers "take courage." Friend, if this letter finds you at a "low point" now or in the future, may you find comfort knowing that Jesus will meet you where you are, and He will reveal His next steps for you. Following His encouragement to "be of good cheer," Jesus promises Paul that he would go to Rome. Jesus met Paul's discouragement and insecurities with His confidence. Friend, whatever confidence the enemy or the world may try to knock out of you, I pray our Jesus will meet you where you are, encourage you, and reveal His next steps for you.



In this action-packed account of Paul's imprisonment in Caesarea, we see several things unfold: multiple court hearings with high-ranking officials, lies and accusations by certain Jews desiring Paul's death, Paul's testimony and radical transformation after encountering our risen Savior, Paul's courage in proclaiming the gospel to others, the lack of justice in the Roman courts by officials who knew of Paul's innocence, delays and imprisonment for over two years, another attempt to murder Paul thwarted, and Paul's appeal to Caesar (which the Lord used to bring Paul to Rome).

As I read through the chapters, God kept impressing on me the verses, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us RUN with ENDURANCE the race that is set before us. Let us FIX our eyes on JESUS, the author and perfector of our faith, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. CONSIDER HIM who endured such hostility from sinners, so that you WILL NOT grow weary and lose heart." Hebrews 12:1-3

I cannot imagine living in Paul's shoes. He endured SO many trials in his life. Just in these chapters, he was falsely accused of crimes by would-be murderers (these Jews tried to kill Paul multiple times, but God kept him safe). While they were pointing the finger at him and making up false accusations, Paul could have easily pointed the finger back at them for their crimes (but he didn't). He was also imprisoned for over two years waiting for justice that never came. And, on top of this, he had enemies who were actively planning ways to kill him. But what is Paul's reaction to these trials? He continues to fix his eyes on Jesus, to remember what Jesus did for him, and to RUN his race (the course Jesus set him on) with ENDURANCE, holding tightly to his faith in our Savior!!

Like Paul, we are also running a race. We each have different trials and an enemy who would love to throw our gaze onto something other than Christ. But may I encourage you to keep pursuing Him with endurance, to keep diving deeper in His Word, to cling tightly to His promises, to remember all that He has done and to trust Him to continue to take care of us. Just as Jesus never abandoned Paul, He will never abandon us. Keep pressing in closer to Jesus.

He is worth it!


