

Life Group Discussion Guide "Roots of Belief and Unbelief" – John 12:37-50

Main thought:

In this passage we see three possible responses to Jesus; unbelief, belief without confessing, and believing and confessing. Jesus shows us these three responses so we can understand and hear the warning, and by His grace become followers who both believe in, and confess Jesus.

Notes:

The 7 Signs of Jesus

- 1. Water into wine (John 2)
 - God gives out of His grace.
- 2. Healing of royal official's son (John 4)
 - God's grace is for the whole world.
- 3. Healing of the man at the pool (John 5)
 - God's grace must be received.
- 4. Feeding of the 5,000 (John 6)
 - God's grace can flow through us.
- 5. Walking on the water (John 6)
 - God's grace is **personal**.
- 6. Healing of man born blind (John 9)
 - God's grace <u>reveals</u> his Son.
- 7. Returning Lazarus from the dead (John 11)
 - God's grace can **conquer** anything.

Read John 12:42-43 and discuss the following questions.

How do these verses describe those who believe, but don't confess?



- What are the 2 stumbling blocks mentioned here that cause people to not confess Jesus publicly? How have you seen this in your own life? What circumstance/scenario comes to your mind when you read these verses?
- What benefits are gained when you move from being a secret Christian to a confessing Christian?

Read John 12:44-50 and discuss the following questions.

- What stands out to you from these verses?
- Why is it critical to personally respond to Jesus?
