- * Take turns reading the following paragraphs:
- 1. The New Testament church put equal emphasis on large gatherings and small groups. It functioned as a loving and growing family.
- 2. Constantine (early 300's) embraced Christianity, but changed the beliefs and the form of the church.
- 3. The medieval church got away from:
 - a. True Biblical teachings
 - b. The New Testament model of how to "do church."

4. The medieval church:

- a. Emphasized a professional clergy instead of the New Testament doctrine of the "priesthood of all believers." The clergy became the "experts" in ministry. Members became observers. Priests prayed for people, listened to confessions, forgave sins, etc. All this elevated the clergy above the congregation and made people believe they were not worthy or capable of praying for themselves, reading the Bible for themselves or ministering to each other.
- b. Emphasized buildings and architecture over people. They built huge cathedrals, at enormous cost, and eliminated the gathering of believers in small, more intimate home groups. The church lost its sense of family or Ohana.
- c. Encouraged people to believe that only the professionals were called and gifted to do ministry. People were discouraged from ministering to each other or witnessing to unbelievers.
- 5. Martin Luther restored biblical truth, but was unsuccessful in restoring the New Testament way of doing church. John Wesley introduced the "method" of small groups; but gradually, the Methodist church got away from the model.
- 6. Seventh-day Adventists followed the Methodist way of doing church, including meeting in small groups, which they called "social meetings." Gradually, however, this was abandoned.
- 7. Today's church is lopsided with more emphasis on large gatherings and little or no emphasis on small gatherings. We, too, have lost the sense of Ohana* or family that existed in the early church. God, however, is calling us back to being a balanced church.

Jesus is the answer!

^{*}Ohana is the Hawaiian word for family.

He said in Luke 5:37,38: And no one puts new wine into old wineskins; or else the new wine will burst the wineskins and be spilled, and the wineskins will be ruined. But new wine must be put into new wineskins, and both are preserved.

As a church, we may have returned to pure biblical teaching (new wine), but we have clung to medieval methods. (old wineskins) It's time to return to our New Testament roots on *how* we do church as well as in *what* we believe.

It's time for a balanced church structure with both

- 1. Hosanna gatherings
- 2. Ohana groups

 Consider him who endured such opposition from sinful men, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.
- ❖ Share with the group what it means to you, personally, to "fix your eyes on Jesus."
- ❖ Sing together: In an attitude of prayer, sing "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus." Stay in silence before God for a few minutes; then if anyone wishes to pray a short, sentence prayer, let them do so. The leader will conclude the prayer time.

We are calling these two parts **Ohana groups** and **Hosanna gatherings**. (The word *Ohana* is the Hawaiian word for *family*. The word *hosanna* comes from the Bible where it was used as an exclamation of praise, particularly by the large crowd who praised and worshipped Jesus as He entered Jerusalem on what has become known as "Palm Sunday.")

The Bible is a love story

It is the story of God pursuing a love relationship with people. He wants to have a love relationship with you. He wants to have a love relationship with your Ohana group.

* Read the following scriptures and circle the word *love* (or any form of the word love)

John 3:16—For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

John 14:21—He who has My commandments and keeps them, it is he who loves Me. And he who loves Me will be loved by My Father, and I will love him and manifest Myself to him.

Romans 8:35,37,39—Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? . . Yet in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. . . .(Nothing) will be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

- ❖ Sing "I Love You, Lord"

WORD

❖ In a small group of three or four, read Luke 10:38-41 and answer the questions:

Have you ever been the guest in the home of a Martha-type host or hostess? What was it like?

In this brief Bible story, who extended the invitation to Jesus? And why?

What caused Martha to get upset? Was Jesus sympathetic to her?

Jesus did not say that Martha's activities were wrong, but He did say that Mary's choice was better. What is the "better thing" in this passage?

What are the "many things" that distract, worry and upset you to the point that you cannot focus on the "better thing?"

What needs to happen in your life so you can have a Mary attitude toward Christ?

❖ Invite one or two to pray and thank God for the way He revealed Himself to group members this past week.

Worshipping together is a vital part of an Ohana group. As we come together each week, we need to come prepared to worship. Our worship time together is not just routinely singing three songs because this is the "singing time" before we move onto something else or to "kill time until everybody gets here." Let's find out what the Bible says about worship.

Circumstances

Read Colossians 3:15-17 (NIV): Circle the words *hearts, thankful, gratitude* and *thanks*; and underline the phrase *members of one body*.

Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Why we worship God is more important than how or when or where we worship Him. Worshipping together is a time for our Ohana group to tell God how much we love Him. There are many ways to do this, but according to what we just read in Colossians 3:15-17, what would you say is the "bottom line" of worship?

WITNESS

- ❖ It's time to pick a prayer partner! This should be someone of the same gender in your group with whom you will pray regularly. The two of you will agree to contact each other on a weekly basis by telephone or in person to pray together.
- ❖ This next week call each other and pray together, especially remembering your names of people who need Jesus. Ask God to open doors of opportunities and give you abilities to reach these people.
- ❖ Take a look at "Our Blessing List." Make sure you have the names on the group list copied onto your personal list, so you can pray for these people this week.
- **This next week** pray for the names on "Our Blessing List." Also pray for each of the Ohana members.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Get into the prayer partnerships just formed and pray for each other. Remain in silent prayer until the entire Ohana group has finished praying.
- ❖ Sing together "I Love You, Lord" and "Thank You, Lord"

A LOVE RELATIONSHIP WITH EACH OTHER

Session 5

WELCOME

- **Take time to greet each other.**
- **Share** with the group: A time when you received unexpected help from someone.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing some of the songs that your group has most enjoyed singing the last few weeks.

- Share what you discovered about Christian relationships.
- Note that the passages we've just read were written by two disciples, Peter and John, who had not always lived by the high ideals they wrote about in their epistles. John and his brother were known as "sons of thunder." Peter was impetuous and often spoke hastily. All the disciples vied with each other for positions of importance. They were impatient with each other, insensitive to people's needs and prejudiced.
- Together, read the following quotation carefully, underlining phrases and words that particularly impress you:

"The apostles differed widely in habits and disposition. There were the publican, Levi-Matthew, and the fiery zealot Simon, the uncompromising hater of the authority of Rome; the generous, impulsive Peter, and the mean-spirited Judas; Thomas, true hearted, yet timid and fearful, Philip, slow of heart, and inclined to doubt, and the ambitious outspoken sons of Zebedee, with their brethren. These were brought together, with their different faults, all with inherited and cultivated tendencies to evil; but in and through Christ they were to dwell in the family of God, learning to become one in faith, in doctrine, in spirit. They would have their tests, their grievances, their differences of opinion; but while Christ was abiding in the heart, there could be no dissension. His love would lead to love for one another; the lessons of the Master would lead to the harmonizing of all differences, bringing the disciples into unity, till they would be of one mind and one judgment. Christ is the great center, and they would approach one another just in proportion as they approached the center." Ellen White, The Desire of Ages, p. 296.

Session 6

WELCOME

- Greet each other.
- ❖ Get better acquainted by describing the first group of Christians with whom you were associated following your conversion. How did you become part of the group and what kind of an experience was it for you?

WORSHIP

Choose one person to read the first verse and then have the group read the dark print together in unison:

- ❖ Sing songs that focus on Jesus and His sacrifice for us. Suggestions: "Jesus, Name Above All Names," "There Is A Redeemer," "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross."
- Pray together thanking Jesus for His servant attitude and asking for a servant attitude among group members.

LOVE RELATIONSHIPS GROW WHEN PEOPLE ARE EQUIPPED FOR MINISTRY

Session 7

WELCOME

- Greet each other
- ❖ Share with the group: An incident in your life when someone helped you learn a new skill. It might have been a very small skill; nevertheless, you were "mentored" or "coached" and consequently you grew in confidence and ability to do a certain thing.

WORSHIP

Review

WELCOME

- Greet each other.


Like building a house, Ohana groups take time and effort

WORD

Let's turn to the Bible to find out what is involved in building our Ohana group. The New Testament uses the word *edify* which means "to build up." The Greek word for *edify* is *oikodomeo* which means *to be a house-builder* or *to build up*. Webster's Dictionary also defines *edify* as to build or to construct a dwelling and to instruct or improve morally or spiritually.

❖ In a small group of three or four: (Take about 10-15 minutes)

To each person in your small group, assign three or four of the following verses which use the word *edify* or some form of the word *edify*. For clearer understanding as you read the texts, mentally substitute the phrase *build up* whenever you read *edify* or *edification*. Beside each text, jot down brief notes of what you discover about edification, then share what you learn with each other.



❖ In the large group, summarize the findings from scripture by answering the following:

What is <i>edification?</i>	
What is it not ?	
Who is to <i>edify</i> ?	
How should <i>edification</i>	take place in a group?

Do you foresee any times when *edification* might be a difficult process?

Building up (edifying) our Ohana group will take the currency of love and the commitment of time.

In session six we talked about how Jesus invested time in His disciples. They lived together -- eating, sleeping, traveling and doing chores together. Jesus taught them together and equipped them to minister together. As they followed Jesus, they learned from Him how to *build up* (edify) instead of destroying each other. It took a lot of love and it took a lot of time.

- ❖ To think about: If Jesus and the twelve dropped into our world, how do you think they would function?
- ❖ Brainstorm: Picture our Ohana group as a group of disciples led by Jesus in today's world. In spite of our individual commitments to families and work, we are going to stick together as a group and worship God together, fellowship with each other, be instructed by Jesus together, minister together, witness together and edify each other. Brainstorm on how this could be scheduled into our lives. Be as specific as possible. Remember that some of what we wish to do can be done in pairs as Jesus sent out the disciples, or in specially scheduled large events. Try to think of ways to incorporate Ohana activities into the natural, day-to-day events of our lives. (If you do not have time to address all five items below, concentrate on numbers 1 and 2)

Reading Material For Session Eight

Pray for Ohana members and their names of people who need Jesus.

Building up sometimes involves tearing down.

In remodeling a house, you often have to tear down and get rid of things such as outdated wiring and plumbing, termite-ridden boards, weak foundations, leaky roofs, etc. Even in building a new house, the site needs to be prepared; and this involves removing dirt and rocks so the foundation of the house will be on level and solid ground.

It is the same in our Christian lives. Jesus wants to build us up into mature Christians; but He needs to take away the junk from our past. Old attitudes and values need to be torn down so they can be replaced with Christ-like ones.

Part of our daily prayer life should include a prayer similar to David's in Psalm 139:23,24

"Search me, O God, and know my heart;

Try me, and know my anxieties;

And see if there is any wicked way in me,

And lead me in the way everlasting."

It is not easy to ask God to show us what is wrong with us, but it is vital if we are to grow. This work is a personal matter first.

Often times we hear someone in a small group say, "I'm having conflicts at work." Or "I have been depressed for days. Please pray for me." We quickly pray for the request but see no lasting results. Why? Because we did not ask God to search and know us.

We pray about a symptom or two without knowing the underlying cause. Maybe there is unresolved anger, bitterness or sin that causes the conflict at work or the depression.

Deal with the roots of sin, not just the fruits of sin

Jesus always dealt with the root of sin and not just the fruit. To the woman at the well, He said, "You have had five husbands and the man you are now living with is not your husband." To the man let down through the roof for physical healing, He said, "Your sins are forgiven."

Satan tries to confuse and deceive us by covering up the real source of our problems with a lot of surface hurts, pains and conflicts. He gets us to live, talk and even pray in generalities that do not help us. We need God to *identify* the root of our problem so that we can get specific in our praying and in our living. Then God can begin to *build us up*.

Help is needed to identify roots

There are several reasons we need help:

- 1. We may be in denial. We fear that the real causes of our pains, hurts and sins may be so painful we cannot handle it, so we deny their existence.
- 2. The cause may be so deeply buried that we honestly do not know the real cause of the destructive fruit in our life. We may have buried the causes way back in our childhood or in some other unresolved events in the past and as a result, we are totally blind to them.

- 3. Satan may be deceiving us by dumping so many peripheral difficulties on us, that we do not see the root causes of what's going on in our lives.
- 4. We may have become too dependent on another person. Satan has ensnared us in an unhealthy co-dependent relationship with a spouse, parent, child, etc. to the point that we cannot come to grips with the roots of our pains and hurts on our own.

Jesus is the best help!

- He can open our hearts to be honest and real so that we can stop denying the roots of our problems.
- He can lovingly bring us to the place where we can face the issues we've buried in the past.
- He can give us wisdom concerning the deceptions of Satan.
- He can separate us from unhealthy relationships that keep us stuck in destructive behaviors and unproductive living.

Pray daily "Search my heart, O God!"

Get by yourself and ask the Holy Spirit to do a "CAT scan" of your soul.

- First, ask Him to show you any pattern of sin in your life. What are the sins you have been vulnerable to through the years?
- Secondly, look for pressure points in your life. At the other end of those
 pressure points you find Satan's handiwork. Put these two pieces of
 information together—your habitual sins and your pressure points—and
 you will have a road map to Satan's schemes against you." (Ed Silvoso, That
 None Should Perish; Campus Crusade Asia Limited, Alexandra PO Box 0205, Singapore,
 911507; pp. 238,239)
- Go to Jesus for forgiveness and cleansing of the past, and power for the present. Claim 1 John 1:9 and 2 Peter 1:3,4.

Jesus uses His people to help

- 1. Your prayer partner can be a supportive and honest Christian friend to encourage you to get at the roots of your hurts, pains and sins.
- 2. Your Ohana group can lovingly help you "root out the roots" of your problems.
- 3. You must be open, honest and willing to listen.

An Ohana Group is not a therapy group

There is danger that a group becomes a problem-solving group rather than a group being built up by Christ. This can happen when:

- 1. The group sees itself as the ones to "build up" rather than a conduit for Christ to "build up."
- 2. An individual in the group brings a need to the group first rather than taking it to Jesus first.
- 3. A leader or member is perceived (in their own mind or by others) as the official "counselor" or "edifier" who has the answers for all problems and needs.

The best help an Ohana group can give

- 1. Encourage deep, personal relationships with Jesus for each member.
- 2. Listen lovingly to each other.
- 3. Ask God to reveal the "roots" underlying the "fruits."
- 4. Focus on Jesus as the Great Physician who can accurately diagnose, prescribe and heal at the right time using the people He chooses.

Praise God for His power to build up!

Reading Material For Session Nine

The promise of the Holy Spirit is not limited to any age or to any race. Christ declared that the divine influence of His Spirit was to be with His followers unto the end.

From the Day of Pentecost to the present time, the Comforter has been sent to all who have yielded themselves fully to the Lord and to His service. To all who have accepted Christ as a personal Saviour, the Holy Spirit has come as a counselor, sanctifier, guide, and witness. . .

Those who at Pentecost were endued with power from on high, were not thereby freed from further temptation and trial. As they witnessed for truth and righteousness they were repeatedly assailed by the enemy of all truth, who sought to rob them of their Christian experience. . . Daily they prayed for fresh supplies of grace. . . Under the Holy Spirit's working even the weakest, by exercising faith in God, learned to improve their entrusted powers and to become sanctified, refined, and ennobled.

The lapse of time has wrought no change in Christ's parting promise to send the Holy Spirit as His representative. It is not because of any restriction on the part of God that the riches of His grace do not flow earthward to men. If the fulfillment of the promise is not seen as it might be, it is because the promise is not appreciated as it should be. If all were willing, all would be filled with the Spirit. Wherever the need of the Holy Spirit is a matter little thought of, there is seen spiritual drought, spiritual darkness, spiritual declension and death. Whenever minor matters occupy the attention, the divine power which is necessary for the growth and prosperity of the church, and which would bring all other blessings in its train, is lacking, though offered in infinite plenitude.

Since this is the means by which we are to receive power, why do we not hunger and thirst for the gift of the Spirit? Why do we not talk of it, pray for it, and preach concerning it? The Lord is more willing to give the Holy Spirit to those who serve Him than parents are to give good gifts to their children. For the daily baptism of the Spirit every worker should offer his petition to God. Companies of Christian workers should gather to ask for special help, for heavenly wisdom, that they may know how to plan and execute wisely. . The presence of the Spirit with God's workers will give the proclamation of truth a power that not all the honor or glory of the world could give.

With the consecrated worker for God, in whatever place he may be, the Holy Spirit abides. The words spoken to the disciples are spoken also to us. The Comforter is ours as well as theirs.

JESUS GIVES THE HOLY SPIRIT TO OHANA GROUPS SO THEY CAN SHARE HIM WITH THE WORLD

Session 10

WELCOME

WORSHIP

- Sing together some of your group's favorite songs.
- * Read and meditate on the following scripture passages:

Review

In one day, the 120 believers grew to a group of 3,120 believers! This means that the original 120 immediately became Ohana group leaders! In these verses we see the formation of the New Testament church into:

- 1. Ohana groups
- 2. Hosanna gatherings

The Holy Spirit empowered the disciples to share the gospel. The same Spirit inspired the structure of the infant church into Ohana groups and Hosanna gatherings.

The Result of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit

Notice that the multiplication of believers was the *Lord's* work. It is still the Lord's work. It is not our work. However, He invites us to join Him in His work, plus He gives the Holy Spirit so we can do His work. Here in Acts 2, we see how God works:

- 1. He gives the Holy Spirit to empower His disciples to proclaim the gospel.
- 2. The Holy Spirit puts believers together in Ohana groups where they can care for each other.
- 3. The Holy Spirit inspires believers to praise God in Hosanna gatherings.
- 4. God adds to the church.

We can't improve on God's way of working! Let's join Him in His work!

Summary:

In this passage of Scripture, Jesus gave a road map to the first Ohana group and every group thereafter. It is a map that will take His disciples to their final destination in the kingdom of God. Notice the steps:

- Take time to prepare for the journey. (vs. 5)
- Don't worry about arrival dates or times. That is in God's hands. (vs. 7)
- Fill up with the fuel of the Spirit. (vs. 8)
- Start the journey in your neighborhood. (vs. 8)
- Go to adjacent neighborhoods, towns and countries. (vs. 8)
- Go to the whole world. (vs. 8)
- You will arrive at the destination because you've got God's word on that! (vs. 10,11)

WORD AND WITNESS

Taking a trip can be an exciting adventure!

It is God's desire that our Ohana journey will be an exciting experience.

A successful trip depends on making adequate preparations. For the last several weeks we have been preparing for the Ohana journey. Actually, we've been on a "test journey" to see what a real Ohana trip will be like. God has asked us in His Word to invite everyone in the world to join us on this journey; and we want to make sure that when people join us, they will have a good trip and arrive at the destination. The destination is heaven and along the way, there are mileposts of Christian development that are absolutely essential. Therefore, we have been learning and practicing the things that will make our trip a successful one.

During this session, we want to check our preparation list and make sure we have everything in place for the Ohana journey.

We will do this by reviewing the highlights for each session. Most importantly, we want to look at the "Witness" and "This next week" sections and make sure we have been "doers of the Word" and not just hearers. In other words, this is a time for personal and

group accountability. If you have suggestions for improvements, particularly in the assignments for each week, please make them.

Session One – The New Testament church consists of Ohana groups and Hosanna gatherings.

- □ Contact your prayer/accountability partner.
- □ Pray for Ohana members and their names.
- Review the material from sessions one through ten and jot down the highlights.

All aboard for the Ohana journey!

The next step is for us to start several Ohana groups and invite people to join us on this exciting journey!

Discuss together how many groups can our group spawn? Who should comprise the leadership team for each group? When shall we start? Who can we invite to each group? (Have a list of the newest members of your church, plus a list of persons who are not yet members but are currently receiving Bible studies, attending a pastor's class, etc. These are people who would be great to invite into an Ohana group.)

Important rule - You must invite three times as many people as you wish to have in your group. For instance, if you want to start with a group of 10 people, you need to invite 30. If you wish to have 5 new people in your group, invite 15. Even though they are interested, many people will have scheduling conflicts, family situations and other things going on in their lives that will keep them from joining you now. Keep praying for them and invite them again at a later date.

Plan to start with about 6 to 8 people and then you have room to grow week by week until you reach 12.
