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INTRODUCTION

STORIES JESUS TOLD

You do not have to be a Christian or know anything about the Bible to enjoy these Ohana group materials.

You do not have to read, talk, sing, pray or share during the group time if you do not feel comfortable doing so. You are welcome to simply come and listen.

These materials are designed to help people examine the stories or parables that Jesus told and how they can be relevant to life today.

Within the session guides you will find links to other topics on what Jesus said about various subjects such as *Who He Is, Forgiveness, Judgment*, etc. Some of the links will also include His practical teachings on *money, marriage, conflict resolution*, etc. Whenever you see one of the link symbols --



-- it is an opportunity for your group to decide if they want to go to that link for the next session. This way, the group can tailor-make each session to fit the needs of the group. If there is no need for digging deeper into a particular topic, then your group should move to the next *Story Jesus Told*.

Even if the group does not want to go to a link, you may personally choose to do so. Simply ask your Ohana leader for the guide sheet on the topic that interests you. You can go through the material on your own or with a friend or another Ohana member.

Thank you for joining us on this journey toward a deeper spiritual experience through *Stories Jesus Told*.

THE SOWER, THE SEED AND THE SOILS

WELCOME

- **Greet each other and introduce any guests.**
- ❖ Hook into the session topic and get better acquainted Have a collection of pictures of flowers, plants and trees of various kinds and ask each person to pick one that they like and tell briefly why they like it. OR ask people to share what their favorite flower is.
- ❖ Ask "Why do you think God created so many kinds of plants?"

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing together some songs about God as Creator. Suggestions: "All Things Bright and Beautiful," "This Is My Father's World," "How Great Thou Art" (PP. 92, 93, 86 of the SDA Church Hymnal) (You could also ask a children's Sabbath School Director to bring a children's song about God as Creator)
- ❖ Pray together by going around the circle and each one thanking God for one thing He has created and why you like it. (Examples: "Thank You, God, for making roses that smell sweet," "Thank You, God, for making kittens that feel soft." "Thank You, God, for mountains to look at and to climb," "Thank You, God, for an ocean to swim in.")
- **Form into small groups of three or four:**

- ❖ The Ohana leader will ask the group to go to God in silent prayer for a few minutes, confessing to God where we each may be failing to be "good ground receivers" of the Word and asking God to change us. After a few moments of silent prayer, the Ohana leader will pray aloud.

WITNESS

- ❖ If your group does not have a Blessing List yet, begin it now.
- Discuss together what you might do as a group to help the people on your Blessing List to become "good ground" hearers of the Word.

- Contact your prayer partner.
- Pray for your Ohana friends and their names on the Blessing List.
- Invite someone to come with you to the next Ohana meeting.

THE MUSTARD SEED AND THE YEAST

WELCOME

- **Greet each other and introduce any guests.**
- ❖ Hook into the session topic by opening a package of seeds and giving a few seeds to each person. Let each person share some time when they had just a tiny seed of an idea but it grew into something big. (Example—a home or yard improvement idea that started small but grew into something big; a party that began with a very small guest list but grew, etc.)

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing together some of your group's favorite praise songs.
- ❖ Invite each person to take three of the seeds from the ones they got during the sharing time. For the first seed, praise God by telling Him one thing you like about Him. As you speak your praise, place your seed in a container in the center of the group. For your second seed, think of one thing to thank God for and place the second seed in the container. For the third seed, think of one request you wish to make to God. If it is a private request, simply tell the group it is a personal request as you place your seed in the container. After all in the group have placed their seeds in the container and expressed their praises, thanks and requests, invite one person to have prayer for the group.

- ❖ Think of the size of a seed, such as a radish seed. What is the size of a full-grown radish plant? What would you say is the ratio, in size, of one radish seed to one full-grown radish plant?
- ❖ Also consider that it takes just one tablespoon of yeast to work three to five cups of flour into a dough that will rise into a bread loaf. What is the ratio of one tablespoon of yeast to three to five cups of flour?
- **Form into small groups of three or four.**
- **Look** at what this passage *means*:

	• Why do you think Jesus compared the kingdom of heaven to a mustard seed and to yeast? List as many reasons as your group can think of.
	• What was Jesus trying to tell people about the kingdom of heaven through these illustrations?
	• What do these two illustrations tell us about God's part and our part in the growth of the kingdom within us?
	• What is one thing from these two illustrations that impresses you most?
*	Took: What can we <i>take</i> from these stories and apply to our lives?

WITNE ❖	Discuss together what these two stories tell us about taking the gospel to the world. What do these illustrations tell us, if anything, about witnessing to unbelievers?

- * Conclude your time together by praying together that God will cause His kingdom to grow in the hearts of the people on the Blessing List.

TREASURES

WELCOME

- **Greet each other and introduce any guests.**
- ❖ Hook into the session topic and get better acquainted with each other by each answering the following: "Have you ever wanted something so much that you sold, traded or bartered one of your most precious possessions to get it? If so, what?

WORSHIP

- ❖ Give each person a good-sized piece of tinfoil and ask them to fashion something out of it to represent some material possession they own, which they value. Or it could be something they would like to have. Example: house, car, boat, clothing, picture, an antique, etc.
- ❖ Go around the circle and let each person briefly explain what their tinfoil item represents.
- ❖ Our time in the Word today will remind us that the most precious possession we can have is Jesus. Let's toss our tinfoil trinkets into this waste bag and focus our attention on Jesus, our real treasure.
- ❖ Sing together some of your group's favorite songs of praise to Jesus.
- **❖** Invite someone to pray.

WEEDS

WELCOME

- ❖ Greet each other and introduce any guests.
- ❖ Hook into the session topic by finding out how many of the people in the group like to garden. Let each one briefly tell why they enjoy it.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Go around the circle and let people share one way in which God has blessed them this past week.
- ❖ Gather any special prayer requests from the group, then get together as prayer partners to pray for each other and for the requests of the group.
- ❖ Sing together some of your group's favorite praise songs.
- **Form into small groups of three or four.**

- ❖ Book Read Matthew 13:24-30 to find out what it says.
- Summarize what it says by drawing a cartoon strip in the space below of stick figures to illustrate the story.

 - Invite someone to come with you to the next Ohana meeting.

THE GOOD SAMARITAN

WELCOME

- ❖ Greet each other and welcome and introduce guests.
- ❖ Hook into the topic and get better acquainted by sharing with each other a time when a stranger helped you.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing together some of your group's favorite praise songs.
- ❖ Pray together and thank God for the blessings of strangers who have helped during our lives. Ask God to make us willing to help others.

- ❖ **Book** Read Luke 10:25-37 to find out what it says.
- ❖ Make sure you understand the elements of the story by answering the following questions:
 - To whom and under what circumstances did Jesus tell the story of the Good Samaritan?

- **Form into small groups of three or four to do the next sections.**
- **Look** at what the passage *means* by discussing the following questions:
 - Why did the lawyer question Jesus? (Luke 10:25)
 - What do you think of the way Jesus answered him?
 - Why do you think the priest and the Levite passed by the injured man?
 Note: A Levite was like an assistant to the priests. Levites worked in the Temple as doorkeepers, musicians, custodians, etc.

• Why did the Samaritan stop and help the man? (vs. 33)

Note: Samaritans and Jews disliked each other. They would not speak to each other or associate with each other. Their prejudices went back hundreds of years to a time when the Samaritans, who were then part of Israel, departed from the faith. Later, the rest of the Jews did the same; but because the Samaritans were first to apostatize, the Jews did not like them.

- ❖ At the end of his story, Jesus asked the lawyer "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" What is your reaction to the lawyer's reply to this question? (vs. 37)
- ❖ **Took** What can we *take* from this story and apply to our lives today?
- ❖ Jesus told the lawyer "Go and do likewise" and His words apply to us today, as well. Most of us have kind impulses to help when we see someone in need, but often our fears stop us. Which of the following have you ever said to yourself?

It's inconvenient.
Someone else will help out.
People will think I'm a nut.
Others may think I'm a fool.
I'll scare people.
People will reject me.
It's not going to make any difference.
I'm not positive they need my help.

- ❖ All of the above statements make up negative self-talk. As a group, go back over each of the above excuses and substitute a positive statement you could say to yourself when tempted to pass up the opportunity of doing a kindness because of your fears. Jot down your ideas in the space provided by each statement above.
- ❖ Being a Good Samaritan starts where you are. Individually and privately, take a few moments to write down some acts of kindness you could perform this next week in the following arenas:

At home (Suggestions: put a love note in a spouse's or child's lunchbox. Say something affirming to a loved one. Listen attentively.)

At work (Suggestions: Put a flower on a co-worker's desk, put an affirming note on the desk of someone who has done a good job, etc.)

In the community (Suggestions: put a quarter in an expired parking meter, offer to return a grocery cart for someone, read clerk's name tags then use their names to thank them for doing a good job.)

- ❖ If you have time and feel comfortable doing so, share with each other the ideas each of you came up with for doing "random acts of kindness" this next week. Encourage each other to make a game out of looking for ways to help people.
- **Return to the larger group.**

WITNESS

- ❖ Brainstorm some ways your group could do kind deeds together in the community and simply say to people "We want to show you God's love in a practical way." Some suggestions would be to conduct a *free* car wash. Go to a large store parking lot together and look for ways to help people. Help people put groceries in their cars, offer to return shopping carts, etc. Go downtown together and put money in expired parking meters. You could also leave a short note. On a holiday such as Valentine's Day, place a carnation and note on car windshields. Let your mind run free as you brainstorm together. Then, pick one activity that your group can agree on and set a date and doit! Plan to work together for an hour or two. Enjoy yourselves as you bring unexpected happiness to people.

- ❖ Encourage each other to invite someone to the next Ohana group meeting. Put an empty chair in your circle and conclude your time together by praying that God will fill the chair next week.

- Contact your prayer partner.
- Pray for your Ohana friends and their names on the Blessing List.
- Invite someone to come with you to the next Ohana meeting.

THE FOOLISH FARMER

WELCOME

- Greet each other and welcome guests.
- ❖ Hook into the topic and get better acquainted by sharing briefly what you would do if you unexpectedly received an inheritance of a million dollars. How would you spend the money?

WITNESS

- Share with each other any "random acts of kindness" you performed this last week.
- ❖ Get an update on the group's discussion of last week about doing a group activity to show love in the community. Have you done something as a group? If so, discuss how it went. If you have not, set a definite time to do such an activity.
- * Review and update the Blessing List.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing together some of your favorite praise songs.
- ❖ Gather prayer requests from the group and/or pick some of the names from the Blessing List and pray for these requests and names. Do this by inviting people to volunteer to pray for one name or one request. This way, each request is mentioned by at least one person during the prayer time.
- ❖ Conclude your prayer time by softly singing together a chorus such as "I Love You, Lord," "God Is So Good," "Thank You, Lord", etc.

- ❖ **Book:** Read Luke 12:13-21 to find out what it *says*.



LOST AND FOUND

WELCOME

- ❖ Greet each other and welcome guests.
- ❖ Get better acquainted by finding out and writing down on your Ohana member list the birth dates and anniversary dates of the people in your Ohana group.

WITNESS UPDATE

- ❖ Take some time to share together any "acts of kindness" performed by the members of the group. Were these positive, negative or neutral experiences?
- Discuss any group projects that are going on such as a free car wash or some other community activity.
- ❖ Did your group think of some way to collectively share it's wealth? (Last session's topic) If so, discuss any additional planning that needs to be done.

WORSHIP

- ❖ Sing together some of your group's favorite praise songs.
- ❖ Pray together by each person completing the sentence, "You are wonderful, God, because . . . "
- Conclude your prayer time by softly singing together a short song of praise such as "God Is So Good," "Alleluia," "Thank You, Lord," etc.

- **Form into smaller groups of three or four.**
- **\(\Delta\)** Hook into the topic by each sharing briefly some time when you got lost.
- ❖ **Book:** Read Luke 15:1-31 to find out what it *says*.
- Summarize what you just read by answering the following questions:

- **❖ Look** at what the passage *means* by discussing and completing the following sentences:

 - What do you think of the attitude of the elder brother? Have you ever met anyone like that?
- **Took** What can we *take* from this story and apply to our lives today?
 - With which one of these "lost" stories do you most identify? The lost sheep, the lost coin, the lost son? Why?
 - Have you ever felt like the elder son? What attitude do you think God would want you to have toward lost people who are found? What can you do to cultivate a more loving attitude toward them?
 - All three stories conclude with rejoicing. (Luke 15:6,7, 9,10, 22-32) Notice particularly the words in verses 7 and 10: "There is more *rejoicing* in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons . . ." "There is *rejoicing* in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents." Discuss together how you feel about a God who throws a party over lost people who are found:

The Lord your God is with you, He is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, He will quiet you with his love, He will rejoice over you with singing." --Zephaniah 3:17

- * Conclude your time together by praying together and praising God for finding you and rejoicing over you!
- **Return to the larger group.**

❖ WITNESS

- Take a look at the names on the Blessing List. Which persons on the list are like the lost sheep who knows it is lost but doesn't know how to get back home? Which ones are like the lost coin which doesn't know it is lost? Which ones are like the lost son who chose to leave the father, chose to return but is fearful of what will happen when he returns? Talk about how you can help each of these persons find their way home.
- Invite three people to pray for the names on the Blessing List. Have one person pray for those who know they are lost but don't know how to get home. Have another pray for those who don't know they are lost and a third person to pray for the *prodigal sons* who know what they need to do to come home but are fearful.

- Pray for your Ohana friends and their names on the Blessing List.
- Invite someone to come with you to the next Ohana meeting.
- Continue to look for ways to do "random acts of kindness."
- Help with any community or outreach activities your Ohana group has planned.

- ❖ Hook into the topic and get better acquainted by sharing with each other an injustice in society and/or the legal system that bothers you.

WORSHIP

- If you were asked to give a character reference on the woman, what would you say about her?
- Note: "In ancient Oriental society a widow was often the most helpless of persons, particularly if she had no sons to champion her rights. This widow apparently had none to protect her. Furthermore, she had nothing wherewith to bribe the callous judge or to offer in payment for justice." SDA Commentary, Vol. 5, p. 844

Second Coming

- **Look** at what the passage *means* by discovering the spiritual applications.
 - Since Jesus had been talking of what it will be like just before His second advent, what significance do you see in the fact that Jesus told His disciples this parable "to show them that they should always pray and not give up"? Why is it especially important for Christians living in end times to be persistent in praying?
 - Because of her status as a poor widow, the woman was powerless. Compare that to what the Bible says about all of us: *When we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly.* (Rom. 5:6) How does sin make us powerless? What does Jesus do about our powerlessness?
 - The poor widow had an *adversary*. 1 Peter 5:8 tells us our *adversary* is the devil. How could being persistent in prayer gain us justice against our adversary, the devil?
 - How is God, the Father, *unlike* the judge? (Luke18:7,8) Review the previous section where you listed the characteristics of the unjust judge. For each of the negative characteristics of the judge, list an opposite, positive characteristic that God possesses:

Why is the fact that God is a just judge good news for Chrisians living in the last days?

 - If you feel like sharing your responses with your small group, you may do so.
 - End your time together as a small group by praying for each other.

- **❖** Discuss together:
 - Do you know of injustices occurring to Christians?
 - Can our Ohana group do anything about these things?

- ❖ Note 1: A "penny" or "denarius" was a Roman silver coin worth about 15 cents which was the ordinary pay for a day's labor.
 Note 2: The "third hour" would be about 9 a.m.; the sixth hour, noon; the ninth hour, three p.m.; the eleventh hour, 5 p.m.
