Ps.107:23-31 "After the Storm" 4.22.15

Intro. Storms can be a metaphor for difficulties, struggles, and challenges of life.

Not only how we respond in the storms but *after* that matters

Subject: The storms of life

Object: Have an attitude of gratitude to the God who saves

Context: 4 scenarios of peril. Each time God's people cry out for help & are rescued. Exhort to worship and give thanks.

- A. God controls the storms [23-27]
- 1. How does God use storms in our lives? [23-25]

23Those who go down to the sea in ships, who do business on great waters, 24They see the works of the LORD, and His wonders in the deep.25For <u>He commands</u> and raises the stormy wind, which lifts up the waves of the sea.

- a. God brings a storm to correct us: Jonah 1:14-16
- b. God allows a storm to demonstrate our faith: Job 1:19
- c. God uses storms to draw you close & grow your faith: Ja.1:2-4, Rom. 5:3-4
- ? How has God used storms in your life?
- 2. How do we react in the storms of life? [26-27]
- a. We feel overwhelmed [26-27] They mount up to the heavens, they go down again to the depths; their soul melts because of trouble.27They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, and are at their wits' end.
- i. Imagine a ship tossed in enormous waves up & down [* Perfect Storm], experienced sailors reeling to and fro, staggering like drunks & at their wits' end:
- b. We feel afraid [Mark 4:35-41] Jesus says, "Lets cross over" then a great storm arose & they thought they would die. Jesus rebuked the storm and their lack of faith.
- c. We feel hopeless [Ac.27:20] The sailors with Paul lost hope of surviving the storm
- d. How should we react? Since God is good, He is with us and for us, we should trust, and have peace
- B. God delivers us in the storms [28-30]

28Then they cry out to the LORD in their trouble, and He brings them out of their distresses. 29He calms the storm, so that its waves are still. 30Then they are glad because they are quiet; so He guides them to their desired haven.

- 1. People cry out to God In the midst of trouble [28]
- a. Repeated theme of Psalm107 [v.6,13,19]
- i. Judges and 7 cycles of oppression re rebellion then cry out and God delivers
- ? What are some struggles that people cry out to God about?
- 2. God brings people out of distress and calms storms [28-30] God is the one who delivers us and calms the storms ... it is God not us.

- a. He is the one who guides us to the desired destination [30] ie. safe harbors
- i. Noah's ark had no rudder not a design defect, God was guiding [Ac.27 re Paul
- ? What are some ways that God has delivered you?
- 3. People respond with joy once the storm has ended [30]
- a. the immediate response to the end of the storm is gladness
- i. cf. James 1:2-4 Joy should be our response at the start, during and end.
- C. God wants us to be grateful <u>after</u> the storm [31] Oh, that *men* would give thanks to the LORD *for* His <u>goodness</u>, And *for* <u>His wonderful works</u> to the children of men!
- 1. Thank God for His goodness and wonderful works to us
- a. Reflection: In what ways is God good? How has God been good to you?
- 2. Unfortunately the psalmist needs to repeat the exhortation to give thanks [1,8,15,21]
- 3. The tendency is to forget to give thanks and/or the attitude of gratitude is short-lived
- a. Jesus and the 10 lepers [Lu.17]
- b. Communion [Lu.22
- ? Why is it challenging to give thanks "after the storm"?
- i. reflection: How can you express thanks to God tonight (and tomorrows)
