JOHN 21:1-19 OUR GREAT REDEEMER

JESUS REDEEMS OUR PAST

- Read John 21:1-14 and compare it with Luke 5:1-11. What similarities do you see in these stories and why does it matter?
- After Peter denied the Lord, we can only imagine where he went and how he felt. But, in Mark 16:7, the angel says to "Go get the disciples and Peter." Why did the angel single Peter out and why was John 21:7 such a powerful moment for Peter?
- Sometimes we can be held captive by the sins of our past. How can we be sure that Jesus has forgiven all our sins and redeemed our past?

JESUS REDEEMS OUR PRESENT

- Read John 21:15-17. Why did Jesus single out Peter and why did Jesus ask him the same question three times?
- Why did Jesus' answer to Peter's question call for him to tend to/feed Christ's disciples? (see Luke 22:31-32; 1 Peter 5:1-3)
- The primary mark for a redeemed person has always been love for God and obedience to His Word (e.g. John 14:15; Matthew 22:37). Why do love and obedience for Jesus go hand in hand?

JESUS REDEEMS OUR FUTURE

- Read John 21:18-19. What did Jesus mean when He said that Peter would stretch out his hands?
- In Luke 22:33, Peter said he would go to prison or die for Jesus, and just a few hours later, he denied Jesus three times. How did Peter's failing and Christ's redemption prepare him to boldly stand for Jesus no matter the cost (see Acts 2:14, 37-38, 40-41; 4:13, 18-20; 6:40-42)?
- Every Christian has a past, but one that has been fully redeemed by Jesus. How does this reality impact how we live in the present and what does it mean for us in the future?
