REVIEW IT

There is a lot that can go wrong at a wedding! As an attendee you may not notice, but rest assured that the bride and groom are well aware. This week's message is about just such an occurrence... they ran out of wine at the celebration. While this may not seem like such a big deal to us, it was a dilemma for the family.

In life, the wine always runs out. A relationship, a job, even our faith may not be as fulfilling as it once was. Mary, Jesus' mother, told the servants five very important words that we can apply to our own life in these challenging times. "Do whatever he tells you." We, too, can turn to Jesus and be faithfully obedient as we trust in His plans for us. For in Jesus, there is a wine that never runs out. We can experience the living water of refreshment that only Jesus can give by telling Jesus what we need and embracing that Jesus' miracles often happen through our obedience.

- 3. How does giving ourselves over to the practice (the work) position ourselves to experience miracles in our life? What can you do to keep yourself from giving up in frustration?
