A GRATEFUL HEART: The Promise of His Coming Pastor Jay Hassman November 30, 2025

DAY 1: THE GOD WHO KEEPS HIS PROMISES Reading: Isaiah 9:1–7

<u>Devotional</u>: Hundreds of years before Jesus was born, God spoke a promise through Isaiah: a great Light would break into the world's deepest darkness. Israel waited generation after generation, holding onto this assurance even when heaven felt silent. Advent reminds us that God's promises may take time, but they are never forgotten.

The birth of Jesus proves that God is a promise-keeper. He fulfills His word, not on our timeline, but on His perfect timetable. If God was faithful to send a Savior exactly when the world needed Him most, He will be faithful in your life too.

Maybe you're waiting for something—an answer, a breakthrough, direction, or healing. Advent whispers to your heart: If God kept His biggest promise, He will

Reflection Question: Where in your life do you need to trust that God's promise is still in motion even if you cannot yet see it?

DAY 2: RIGHT ON TIME Reading: Galatians 4:4–7; Luke 2:8–14

<u>Devotional:</u> Paul writes, "When the set time had fully come, God sent His Son." Jesus didn't arrive late. He didn't show up early. He came right on time—at the exact moment God had prepared throughout all of history.

Bethlehem was not an accident. It was an appointment. A divine arrival scheduled long before the world existed. This truth brings peace into our waiting: God is a precise God. He is never rushed and never delayed. If He showed up on time in Bethlehem, He will show up on time for you.

When life feels slow or your prayers seem unanswered, remember this certainty: God isn't ignoring your situation—He is arranging it. Advent teaches us that God's timing is always connected to His purpose.

Reflection Question: What situation in your life requires you to trust God's timing instead of your own expectations?

DAY 3: THE PROMISE STILL AHEAD. Reading: John 14:1–3; Revelation 22:12–13

<u>Devotional:</u>: Advent looks backward to Christ's birth, but it also looks forward to His return. Jesus made a clear promise: "I will come back." The One who came as a lamb will return as a King. This world is not the end of the story. Pain is not permanent. Evil

will not have the last word. The promise of His second coming gives us hope that rises above the chaos of the present.

Just as surely as He came once, He will come again. Every sunrise is a reminder that we're one day closer. Every moment of longing becomes a reminder that heaven is preparing something far greater than we can imagine.

Advent is the season where we remind our hearts: We are a people of hope, not fear.

Reflection Question: How does the promise of Jesus' return give you hope in the middle of what you're facing right now?

DAY 4: GRATEFUL WHILE YOU WAIT. Reading: Titus 2:11–13; Philippians 3:20

<u>Devotional:</u> Waiting is rarely easy, yet Scripture teaches that waiting is holy. Gratitude is what keeps the heart steady while the promise unfolds. When you thank God for what He has already done, your faith grows for what He has not yet done.

A grateful heart keeps us spiritually awake. It keeps us attentive, watchful, and expectant. Gratitude pulls us out of fear and plants us in hope. It reminds us that we are citizens of heaven, waiting for a Savior who is coming for us. When waiting becomes weary, gratitude becomes the anchor. Gratitude says: "God, You were faithful before—and You'll be faithful again."

Reflection Question: What is one way you can practice gratitude today as an act of faith while you wait on God?

DAY 5: LIVING READY Reading: Hebrews 10:23; Matthew 24:42–44

<u>Devotional</u>: "He who promised is faithful." Advent calls us to live in that truth. Grateful for His first coming and ready for His second. Readiness isn't fear-driven; it's love-driven. It's not about predicting the day—it's about preparing the heart. Living ready means living with purpose, joy, holiness, and hope. It means walking each day as if Jesus could return at any moment. It means sharing His love generously. It means refusing to let worry or distraction dull our spiritual sight.

The world prepares for Christmas with decorations. The believer prepares for Advent with devotion. As you end this 5-day journey, remember: The promise that brought hope to Bethlehem still brings hope to you. Live grateful. Live expectant. Live ready.

Reflection Question: What does "living ready" look like for you during this Advent season?
