- D. Psalm 46 was written in a time of crisis, and it is preserved for us today in our crises. We also face natural evil and moral evil.

E. Whatever trouble comes, Psalm 46 tells us, with its first word, where to turn. Not to a change in circumstances. Not to our best efforts to fix the problem. Not to our anxious strategies to avoid pain and loss. We are to turn to God.

#### Introduction

F. This psalm rings with the name of God. Verse 4: "the city of God." Verse 5: "God is in her midst" and "God will help." Verses 7 and 11: "the God of Jacob." His covenant name, "Yahweh," appears in verses 7, 8, and 11. Verse 10: "Cease striving, and know that I am God."

- E. The background of this psalm is unknown, but it is believed to have been written after a military victory over a foreign power attempted a siege against Jerusalem (2 Chronicles 20:1-30; 2 Kings 18-19).

# I. Our God Is Infinitely Strong (46:1-3, 6, 9)

F. How does this psalm teach us our God is infinitely strong? "God is our refuge and strength." He is (present tense) our refuge and strength. God both protects and empowers His people. A "refuge" is a place of protection and safety. "Strength" is God providing His people with the inner power to keep on keeping on. We need not fear (46:2-3).

G. "He gives His voice, the earth melts" (46:6b). God doesn't need fire to melt the earth. He doesn't need hands or lasers to melt the earth. He only needs to speak and the earth will melt. The power of our God is seen in the power of His word.

B. And not just present, but "very present," attentively present. In other words, God is ready and eager to help. He is able, present, and eager to help. He is abundantly available to help you.

F. This life-giving river, who is ultimately God Himself, is present with His people to sustain them in their crisis.

H. As Christians it is important for us to understand that no longer is there a physical place where God has pledged His special favor and presence. Now, there is a particular person, God's own Son.

### II. Our God Is Attentively Present (46:1b, 4-5)

K. And where God chooses to be present in all His strength, once in ancient Jerusalem, and now in Jesus Christ, and His body the church, "will not be shaken." Nature is shaken (46:2) and nations are shaken (46:6), but God's people will not be shaken (46:5).

L. This doesn't mean that God's people will never experience trouble. In this age we will encounter trouble but we need not fear because God is with us.

### II. Our God Is Attentively Present (46:1b, 4-5)

M. "God will help her when morning dawns" (46:5b). For every crisis we face in Christ, and all its darkness, God has a dawn designed.God will help you when morning dawns. Your dawn will come. God's help does not mean that His people are kept from crisis, but that He keeps us through crisis.

N. In His perfect timing, when the appointed morning dawns, God rescues His people from their trouble, having preserved them through the long night.

A. What does God's being exalted have to do with the help we need in crisis? How does God's own declaration that He Himself will be exalted feed our confidence?

B. Let's get verse 10 in context. Verse 8 is an invitation to the raging nations, those setting themselves up as enemies against God and His people. Verse 9 declares that God will bring an end to all war. It is a lost cause to set yourself against the living God.

C. Any and every nation that stands in opposition to the kingdom of God and His Christ can expect a devastating end.

D. Verse 10 issues another invitation, both to the raging nations and to His fearful people.

Raging nations, fearful people: "Cease striving and know that I am God."

F. God spoke into the chaos, into the raging and shaking, "Cease striving," be still, lay down your weapons, cease making war.

G. Verse 10 is also a word to God's people. Cease striving, church. Be still, church. Do not fear. Do not be anxious. Do not work yourself into a frenzy trying to save your family and take your country back to the 1950s.

L. The certainty of His exaltation is precious beyond words and gives us a place to stand when all around us seems unsure. The certainty that He will be exalted is granite under our feet. It is the guarantee of our help.

M. "Yahweh of hosts is with us; The God of Jacob is our stronghold."

N. Psalm 46 ends with a powerful word. The word "stronghold" in verse 7 and in the refrain in verse 11, the final word on which the psalm ends, is an even stronger image of security than "refuge" in verse 1. This stronghold is a picture of inaccessible height, an impenetrable fortress.
