Small Group Study Guide Heaven

For use with the sermon series "Heaven" by Pastor Allen Nolan 7 Episodes

God, through His word, reveals the nature of heaven to those who love Him (1 Cor. 2:10). Pastor Nolan emphasizes studying and understanding heaven to avoid misconceptions and instigate excitement and awe. There are four reasons for Christians to learn more about Heaven. Learning about heaven helps in debunking myths, assists believers to align their priorities with God's will, and motivates them to live for God while generating an eternal perspective. Learning about heaven can greatly diminish the fear of death, thereby enlightening that it's a step closer to being with Christ.

- 1. What are some common misconceptions about heaven and why do you think they exist? (People often think of heaven as an ethereal place filled with disembodied spirits playing harps on clouds or as an everlasting church service).
- 2. Why is it important for believers to set their sights on the realities of heaven according to Colossians 3:1-2? (Focusing on heaven gives us an eternal perspective and helps us keep our priorities aligned with God's will).
- 3. How does having a focus on heaven and the heavenly prize help motivate believers to live for Christ? (The apostle Paul focused on the end of the race and receiving the heavenly prize, which inspired him to persevere in his faith).
- 4. In what ways does understanding heaven help take away the fear of death? (In 2 Corinthians 5:6-8 and Philippians 1:21-23, Paul expresses his eagerness to go to heaven and how dying means being with Christ, which is better).

5. What steps can be taken to deepen your own understanding of heaven, and how can you share this knowledge with others? (The sermon highlights the importance of learning about heaven through biblical references, personal stories, and relatable examples).

There are four reasons to focus on heavenly things (Col. 3:1-2): to dispel inaccuracies; to comply with God's commandment; to inspire a life lived for God; and to alleviate fears of death through knowledge of the afterlife. In tackling the nature of heaven, Pastor Allen distinguishes between temporary, intermediate heaven and our final destination in the new Jerusalem on the new earth. He further presents a timeline of eschatological events, from the rapture and tribulation, through to the millennium, the great white throne judgment, and finally, the new heaven and new earth.

- 1. Why is it important to learn about heaven and avoid misconceptions? (Pastor Allen discussed four reasons for learning about heaven, including avoiding misconceptions).
- 2. What does Colossians 3:1-2 tell us about our focus on heavenly things? (Pastor Allen explained that God commands us to focus on the realities of heaven and heavenly things rather than earthly things).
- 3. What are the different aspects of heaven that Pastor Allen mentioned? (Pastor Allen mentioned the temporary and intermediate heaven, ruling and reigning with Jesus during the millennium, and the new Jerusalem on the new earth).
- 4. Why is understanding the timeline of the end times events important in dispelling misconceptions about heaven? (Pastor Allen provided a timeline of end times events, emphasizing that understanding this timeline can help avoid misconceptions about heaven).5. Pastor Allen outlines the tribulation, battle of Armageddon, and subsequent millennium period where Jesus returns to Earth, followed by the resurrection of believers and non-believers. He then elaborates on the new Heaven and Earth created after the great white throne judgment, where the New Jerusalem is a tangible city on a physical Earth with embodied believers. When a person dies, the body decomposes, while the spirit returns to God, depending on the individual's bond with Jesus Christ. Believers ascend to heaven whereas non-believers are sent to a place called Hell.

- 2. The sermon outlines a timeline of events from the present heaven to the future heaven. How does this understanding of heaven as a temporary and intermediate state challenge or affirm your previous beliefs about the afterlife?
- 3. According to the sermon, believers will reign with Christ during the millennium. What implications does this have for how we live our lives now, knowing that we will have roles in Christ's future kingdom?

In this episode, Pastor Allen Nolan corrects misconceptions about heaven, including the timeline of events after death for believers and unbelievers, the physical nature of heaven and the resurrection bodies believers will have, the distinction between the rapture and the second coming of Jesus, and the importance of receiving Jesus as Lord and Savior for eternal destiny. Unbelievers go to hell temporarily and believers to an intermediate heaven before returning to earth with Jesus during the Millennium.
