# Finding God in the Word

#### I. Announce:

#### II. Slide1 Intro:

- A. This Series we entitled the *Vertical Focus Series*.
  - 1. Goal: to Focus by looking *upward*, *inward*, *and outward*. (May, June, July)
  - 2. Vertical Focus: (looking upward to God and His Word)
  - 3. Slide2 This evening, Finding God in the Word. 5/8 Gospel Centered Application. 5/15 Dealing with Difficult Passages. 5/22 Discerning God's Will from the Bible. 5/29 Wednesday Refresh: (Guy) (my guide from Israel)
- B. The Bible is comprised of 66 books, written by various authors, over 1500 yrs.
  - 1. Yet God's Word it is a unified revelation unveiling a single message.
  - 2. It is crucial to understand what the Bible's <u>overall message is</u>, to **interpret** it properly, **and** rightly **apply** it to our lives.
  - 3. So we need to make sure **every** story of the Bible *is seen through* the **one main story** of the Bible. [recommend AL Unfolding Gospel class]
- C. The Bible's plots the movements of: creation, fall, redemption, and new creation.
  - 1. This helps us answer the questions that every person asks and must answer: Where did we come from? (creation) What went wrong? (Fall) What is the solution to our problem? (redemption) Where is history going? (new creation)
- D. From Genesis to Rev, the Bible's message is 1st and foremost about *the Triune God*.
  - 1. It's centered in His **Name** and His **Glory**, and how He has <u>graciously</u> chosen *to share Himself* with us. (wow sit in that)
- E. Ask 2 questions: What does it say about God, and then what is He saying to me?

- 1. My granddaughter Joey (1), my favorite is how she says, Mmmeeee!
- 2. To flip this by only looking for *what is He saying to me*? Makes the Bible simply a *self-help book* :( Ask: What does this say about the *character, the nature, the goodness* of God.
- 3. Ask yourself, do you want to get things from God, or get God?
- 4. Andrew L says, all the Bible is **significant for you**, but don't see it all **about you?** (Brian's paraphrase)
- F. There are 2 ways to read the Bible.
  - 1. It's either about **me**, or it's about **Jesus**.
  - 2. Is it about what I must do, or what He has done.
  - 3. Is it about **trying harder**, or *living by faith* with what **Christ has done**.

# III. Slide3 FINDING CHRIST IN EVERY SECTION OF THE BIBLE (even OT)

- A. Luke 24:27 And beginning with *Moses* and all *the Prophets*, he interpreted to them *in all the Scriptures* the things concerning *himself*.
- B. Let's look at how each part of the Bible points towards Christ in a particular way.
  - 1. (in Gen) He is **the Hope** of the patriarchs. He is **the angel of the Lord**.
  - 2 (In Exodus Deut) He's **the rock** of Moses. He's the **fulfiller** of the Law. He's the **final temple**.
  - 3. (in the history of Israel, *after Moses*) He is the **commander** of the Lord's host (Joshua). He's the **true King** of Israel. He is **the true Israel** (everything Israel was supposed to <u>do</u> and <u>be</u>).
  - 4. (in the Psalms) Jesus is the **sweet psalmist/singer** of Israel in the songs of David.
  - 5. (in the prophets) He is the **promised King**. He is the **suffering servant**. He is the **world healer** (Isaiah end).
  - 6. (in Proverbs) He is the **true wisdom** of God.

C. So each part of the Bible points towards Christ.

#### IV. Slide4 FINDING CHRIST IN EVERY MAJOR FIGURE OF THE BIBLE

- A. All anointed leaders in the Bible every prophet, priest, king, and judge who brings about *salvation or deliverance, or redemption* of any kind or level, are pointers to Christ, their strengths, and even in their flaws. (in their flaws, *Jesus is better than*)
- B. (from Timothy Keller, *Preaching*)
- C. Jesus is the true and better Adam, who passed the test in the garden, and his obedience is imputed to us (1 Cor.15).
- D. Jesus is the true and better Abel, who, the innocently slain, has blood that cries out for our acquittal, not our condemnation (Heb.12:24).
- E. **Jesus** is the true and better **Abraham**, who answered the call of God to leave the comfortable and familiar and go out into the void, *not knowing where he went*, to create a new people of God.
- F. **Jesus** is the true and better **Issac**, who who was not just offered up by his father on the mount, but was truly sacrificed for us all. God said to Abraham, *now I know you love me, because you did not withhold your son, you're only son whom you love, from me*. Now **we** can say to God, *now we know that You love us, because You did not withhold Your son, Your only son whom You love, from us.*
- G.Jesus is the true and better Jacob, who wrestled with God and took the blow of justice we deserved so that we, *like Jacob*, received only *the wounds of grace* to wake us up and discipline us.
- H. Jesus is the true and better Joseph, who at the right hand of the king forgives those who betrayed and sold him and uses his new power to save them.
- I. Jesus is the true and better Moses, who who stand in the gap between the people and the Lord, who mediates a new covenant (Heb.3).
- J. **Jesus** is the true and better **rock of Moses**, who, struck <u>with</u> the rod of God's justice, now gives us *water in the desert*.

- K. Jesus is the true and better Job the *truly innocent sufferer* with intercedes for and saves his foolish friends (Job 42).
- L. **Jesus** is the true and better **David**, whose victory becomes *his peoples* victory, though they never lifted a stone to accomplish it themselves. (David & Goliath).
  - 1. Rather than being **the main actor** in God's story, live in the outcome of what **God** has done and is still doing. Andrew L [we are not David, but the Israelites who benefited from David]
- M.Jesus is the true and better **Esther**, who didn't just risk losing *an earthly palace*, but lost the ultimate heavenly one (incarnation), who didn't just <u>risk</u> his life but gave his life to save His people.
- N.Jesus is the true and better Jonah, who was cast out into the storm so we could be brought in. [let's dig deep into this one]
- O. Slide Let's talk about Jesus as the true Jonah. At the end of Mark 4, Jesus stills the storm, then his rebuke, *Have you still no faith?* (Mrk.4:40).
  - 1. 37 And a great windstorm arose, and the waves were breaking into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. 38 But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion. And they woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" 39 And he awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. 40 He said to them, "Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?" 41 And they were filled with great fear and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"
  - 2. It is easy to preach the book of Jonah in a moralistic way. You can draw the lesson that we need to work on your faith and trust God when things get bad. It could merely be a *how-to-sermon how to have faith and hold on in storms*. But it wouldn't show us the gospel very clearly.
  - 3. Mark is intentionally *recapping the Jonah episode* in Mark 4. He uses nearly identical words and phrases:

- a) Both Jesus and Jonah are in a boat. Both are in storms described in similar terms. Both boats are filled with others who are terrified of death. Both groups wake the sleeping prophets angrily, rebuking them. Both storms are miraculously calmed and the companions saved. And both stories conclude with the men in the boats, more terrified after the storm is stilled than they were before.
- b) Every feature is the same with <u>one</u> rather large apparent exception. **Jonah** is sacrificed into the storm, thrown into the deep, satisfying the wrath of God so the others will be saved from it. but Jesus is not. (in this storm there)
- c) Or, are the accounts really <u>different</u> at that point? No, they are not. As Jesus says in Matthew 12:41, He is the ultimate Jonah, who **is** thrown into **the ultimate deep** *eternal Justice for us*.
  - (1) See Jonah was thrown overboard for <a href="his own">his own</a> sin, but Jesus is thrown into the ultimate storm for <a href="our">our</a> sin.
  - (2) Jesus was able to save the disciples from the storm, **because** He was thrown into the ultimate storm.
- d) So, let's not <u>default</u> to a mere exhortation *to trust God more*, but go deeper to see the saving work of Jesus. Then not only do we have a great picture of the gospel of salvation, but in the end, we also have a more powerful, heart-changing motivation to trust God.
  - (1) We now have a practical application for listeners, that is surrounded in **His** saving work, not in <u>our</u> efforts.
- e) So, instead of settling with a message of *Have faith in the midst of your storms! Have faith in Jesus! He won't let you down!* Instead, let the gospel stir inside your heart ... faith in Christ's work, to show people what He did for us.
- f) Are you in something like a storm in your life? Have you prayed and felt like God must be asleep? He is not. How do you know? Because He faced that ultimate storm and endure it <u>for you</u>, so you could know He will not abandon you in *your infinitely smaller storms*. Why not trust the One who did that for you? (Hear the difference?)

P. Jesus is the true Prophet of God sent from Heaven with a message of repentance, but instead of the belly of a fish, He emerged from **the grave**. He sat outside the city of Jerusalem weeping over their rejection of Him and their coming judgement, which is a stark contrast to Jonah weeping over Nineveh <u>in anger</u> that they would be spared and would receive God's mercy instead of judgment.

- R. There are other categories: *Preaching Christ from every Major Image in the Bible* (bronze serpent; water from the rock). *Preaching Christ from every deliverance story in the Bible* (David & Goliath). *Preaching Christ from every Theme of the Bible* (kingdom, covenants, justice, judgment).
- S. Ask, What is the road to Christ? Did you know that in Southern California from every city, every town, from the mountains to the beach, there is a road that leads to LA?
  - 1. And so from Scripture, there is a road to *the metropolis of Scriptures* ... that is Christ.
