DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

These questions are designed to help you talk about God's word and Pastor Brian's message with friends and family. You of course can use your own questions, but we'd like to give you this tool to encourage Biblical fellowship and discipleship in your circle of relationships. **Enjoy discovering more about Him!**

"TRIUMPHAL ENTRY TO TEARFUL ENTRY" | LUKE 19:41 - LUKE 20:8 | PASTOR BRIAN BELL

WARM-UP QUESTION: When was the last time you saw someone cry in public? What did that show about that person?

"When God Cried" (Luke 19: 41-44)

Jesus weeps over Jerusalem as he shares about the future destruction to the city because the people reject Him. What does that show about Jesus? How should Christ followers react to the lost in their communities?

"Cleansing the Temple" (Luke 19: 45-48)

Jesus goes to the temple and clears out all the merchants operating there who were getting in the way of worship. What are things that get in the way of worship in our society and churches today?

"Authority" (Luke 20: 1-8)

Some religious leaders questioned Jesus' authority and Jesus responds with a question that puts them on the defensive. What are questions people ask today about Jesus? What types of questions can Christ followers respond with to make people think?

REFLECTION QUESTION:

Jesus shows passion for worship in both how he cries over the lost and how he drives out corruption in the temple. He wants people to come to Him, but many resist His authority. In each situation He responds in a way that shows His love for God. How have you shown passion for God lately? Are there areas of your life that need to give Jesus control so you can better worship Him? Pray that God would give you wisdom and courage to respond in each situation in ways that honor Him.

From Triumphal Entry to Tearful Entry

I. Slide1 Announce:

- A. Slide2-9 Dan: C@R. REAL. Cmp Alandale. Easter/CW. Wmns Retreat. Fresh Faith.
- B. Slide10 Prayer for Rohingya. We have a great opportunity to be praying for the Rohingya as *Ramadan* approaches (*Ramadan*, a month of *fasting, prayer, reflection & community* for Muslims).
 - We have a 30 day prayer guide that you can <u>download</u>. This year the prayer points will lead you to pray for countries where <u>Rohingya live</u>, for Rohingya believers, and different ministries (translation, radio, media). We hope this guide will *fuel your prayers* and *inspire you* to continue praying for the Rohingya every day. You can find the prayer guide on our Missions Page online. (App/Web)
- C. Slide11a Prayer: Father, Your Son Jesus was *a man a sorrows, and acquainted with grief*. And we know this wasn't mere *emotionalism or shallow sentimentality* but a reminder You care and that You carry our burdens.

II. Intro: From Triumphal Entry to Tearful Entry

- A.Our Israel trip was fantastic. (Team, weather, sites, learning, new discoveries)
- B. TY to *Jason Hohnberger* last week (turning water into wine). And *Dan* starting off our last section of Dr. Luke.
 - Slide11b Lukes Gospel broken down: Lk.1&2 = 30 yrs of Jesus' life. Lk.3 - 19:27 = 3 yrs of Jesus' life. And Lk.19:28 - 24:53 = 1 week of Jesus' life. [so 25% deals with <u>His last week</u> before He died]
- C. From **Triumphal** entry to **Tearful** entry. There are **3 times** in Scripture that Jesus wept: John 11:35 (Mary/Bethany over Laz). Luke 19:41 (here over Jer). Hebrews 5:7 (*In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers & supplications, w/loud cries & tears*)
 - Each is near the end of His life. Each reveals what matters most to our loving God. His tears are a reminder that He loves sinners and cares for every soul.

III. Slide12 WHEN GOD CRIED (41-44) READ

- A. Tears (41-43)
- B. He drew near and saw the city What was Jesus looking for? What did He desire to see? [we were just here] Slide13
 - 1. He was looking for the lost I've come to seek & save the lost.19:10
 - 2. He's looking **for worshippers** The Father is seeking such to **worship Him**. Jn.4:23
 - 3. He's looking **for fruit** in our lives Look, for three years now I have come **seeking fruit** on this fig tree, and I find none. Cut it down. 13:7
 - 4. He's looking for **faithful servants** I looked for a man among them who would **build up the wall** and **stand before me in the gap** on behalf of the land so I would not have to destroy it, but I found none.
 - a) What does Jesus see today when He looks at *our* city? (your city)
- C. Why Are You Weeping, Jesus? Jesus wept violently for the people of Jerusalem.
 - 1. Not for Himself, not for the cross that awaited Him; but for the fate that would come upon *that city*.
 - 2. Rather than the joyful shouts and praises that resounded all around Jesus presently, instead He heard the screams, the cries, the shrieks & groans of the men, women, & children who would die in that city, as He had prophesied.
 - a) The Roman General **Titus** would invade in 70 AD, leveling the <u>city</u>, destroying its glorious <u>temple</u>, & brutalize its rebellious <u>people</u>.
- D. Imagine Angels seeing their God cry over rebellious humans?
- E. Imagine seeing in advance, the destruction of a whole city ... YOUR city?
- F. Slide14 Imagine what the city was & is now? Great is the LORD, and greatly to be praised, In the city of our God, In His holy mountain. Beautiful in elevation, The joy of the whole earth, Is Mount Zion on the sides of the north, The city of the great King. God is in her palaces; He is known as her refuge. Ps.48:1-3

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- Now the city is infected; the Temple polluted (no glory, no understanding of their feasts); the people contaminated (w/sin, & indifference).
- G. Imagine what the city could have become (also, your life).
 - 1. They say love is blind but Divine love is farseeing. [ie. the potentiality of people]
- H. Slide15a Prediction (43,44)
- I. Wait, you and your children, that's harsh! Oh?
 - 1. In Mt.27:25 The rulers, the priests, and the people <u>united</u> in accepting responsibility for the death of Christ, saying, *Let his blood be on <u>us</u> and on <u>our children</u>.*
 - a) Then almost 40 years later, on this very spot, judgment was pronounced against the citizens of Jerusalem. Of the 3,600 victims of the governor's fury, not a few were scourged and crucified. The house of Annas was destroyed some years later. Caiaphas had been deposed 1 year after the crucifixion. And Pilate was soon after banished to Gaul and there died in suicide.
 - 2. When Jerusalem fell, her wretched citizens were *crucified* around her walls until, in the historian's grim language, *"space was wanting for the crosses, and crosses for the bodies."* The horrors of the siege of Jerusalem are unparalleled in history.
 - a) They missed the time of their visit. They wasted their opportunity.
- J. Slide15b They missed 4 things: (don't miss these)
 - 1. Your day your opportunity/<u>time</u> is brief.
 - 2. Your peace your <u>reconciliation</u> w/God.
 - 3. Your eyes your life is dependent on *looking to Jesus*.
 - 4. Your visitation your visit with the Savior <u>seeking</u> to save you.a) Be very clear, today is "*your day*"!

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- K. If you don't *know* Jesus, you **can** <u>reject</u> him, but know this ... you'll <u>reject</u> Him by walking through **His tears**!
 - 1. When Jesus looks at lostness, He does so with profound sadness.
 - 2. His 1st reaction is <u>not</u> anger, but seeing them through tears. *We need to mimic this trait.*
- L. Looking at you & me (pre-salvation), He would've wept.

IV. Slide16a CLEANSING THE TEMPLE (45-48) READ

- A. Slide16b *The trouble w/righteous anger* is that it is so much easier to be angry than *righteous*. But it is possible to be both.
- B. Slide17 *Explain Map.* The issue was where they set up. Their *flea market* was in The Court of the Gentiles. Often we read that the fence of separation was to keep them out, but they were actually *invited to come and pray* up to that point.
 - 1. This is where Jesus did His public teaching (not in the temple).
 - a) According to **Josephus** there was a need for an estimated 255,600 lambs at Passover in ad 66. Big business. Problems arose when <u>abuses developed</u> and *business* became more important than *worship*.
 - b) This was the County Fair & the Stock Exchange all rolled into one.
 - 2. He challenged *the entire banking system* of Jerusalem. By taking up all of the property on the temple now with their animal market *it denied access to the Gentiles*.[the 1 place God designed for Gentile evang, *rendered ineffective*]
- C. Connect purging the temple with ... purging our hearts on the cross.
- D.(47,48) For years, *tension* was building, leading to the cross. 2 groups: (same today) a group seeking to **destroy** Him, & a group **hanging on** His words.
 - 1. Henry Nouwen said, *In going to Jerusalem Jesus is asking, Will you be my disciple or will you be my executioner*? [you have to do something w/Jesus]

V. Slide18a AUTHORITY (20:1-8) READ

A. Debates are fun *if* the topics are <u>in</u>significant. *Feel free to answer out loud*.

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- 1. Which is better summer or winter? Which is better Chick-fil-A or In-n-Out? What's the proper way to pronounce GIF (Jif or gif)? Should toilet paper hang under or over? Which is better the American accent or the British accent? (it's the only thing that they have on us). Which is worse a quiet introvert or a loud extrovert? Would you give up 3 fingers for \$1 million? Last one, does pineapple belong on pizza?
- So some topics are **fun**, but others demand *careful thought*. Why? Because of the *ramifications* of what you believe. In Scripture some respond with <u>hostility</u>, others with <u>humility</u>.
- B. The religious leaders really didn't want to know the truth, they only wanted power
 - Slide18b Why do some people not want to follow Jesus? Because if you embrace Jesus as Lord, *everything* in your life changes. And that scares some people. They don't want to everything to change in their life. The religious leaders would need to get a new job if they said, *Jesus is Lord*.
 - 2. Often beneath peoples *questions about faith* is actually deep fears and selfish desires. They don't want to give up their <u>immorality</u>. Or they don't wanna give up their <u>power</u>. [it wasn't lack of knowledge, but unwillingness to accept the truth]
 - a) Slide18c God never condemns people for **ignorance**, but for those who **have the light & disobey it**.
 - b) See they would rather *run their own lives* and *live as they please*. They'd rather *be like God*, than *to be answerable to Him*.
 See Sin *rejects God's authority* and seeks to *live autonomously*.
- C. Notice how Jesus engages his enemies. He, *in a Jesus like way*, answers a question with a question.
 - 1. They're trying to intimidate Jesus with their questions and with their numbers. We as Christians will often be in conversations and find ourselves on the defense. Ask questions!
 - 2. Jesus also *asks lost people* questions too.

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- D. I just picked up a book called *Questioning Evangelism*, where Randy Newman argues that *asking questions* and starting *meaningful conversations* is *a far better method* for sharing faith, than prepared speeches or statements. (Lee Strobel, frwd)
 - 1. The world has **change**, but our gospel hasn't.
 - 2. Our environment is more hostile, but our gospel is as good as ever :)
- E. The Church has worked through different motivations to share her faith.
 - 1. A few decades ago, sharing your faith was very guilt-based.
 - 2. Then the primary motivation became *triumphalism*. We had *more evidence, better apologetics, and better arguments* than those around us.
 - a) We wanted to win! ... which was even worse than the *guilt motivated* days. Today more and more *followers of Jesus* want to share their faith, because of *concern for lost people, because they love them*.
 - 3. Questions place a proverbial *pebble* in someone's shoe.
 - a) What makes you believe that? What brought you to that conclusion?
- F. Jesus, He's a *King on a colt*. He's a *King with tears*. He's a *King with all authority*. He's the *perfect King*. He's the *perfect ruler*.
 - 1. Let me place a **pebble** in <u>your</u> shoe, Does Christ <u>today</u> have authority in **your** life?
