# My Prayer. My Faith. My Praise.

#### I. Slide1 Announce:

#### II. Slide7 Intro: My Prayer. My Faith. My Praise.

- A. The year **1020 BC** was also <u>a very good year</u>. But not because of Saul, the king <u>all</u> Israel pinned their hopes on. That year was significant because, in a secluded field in Bethlehem, God was raising up a youth named **David**.
  - A *nobody*, nobody noticed. A *somebody* who would change Israel's course forever. Because while the people saw only a *shepherd*, God saw a king.
- B. Today you have to check the labels on your grocery items so close.
  - 1. You may be getting less than you thought. Some manufacturers are selling us the same size packages, but they are putting less of the product in the box. (eye drops; small potato chips bag/4 chips now?)
  - 2. How something is wrapped doesn't always show us what's on the inside.

- a) That's true with people as well.
- b) How do you evaluate teenagers? (which David was) Do you tend to measure them by externals?
- 3. We can wrap ourselves up in the same packaging every day "nice clothes, big smile, friendly demeanor", yet still be less than what we appear to be.
- C. When David was *anointed w/oil* by Samuel to be <u>king</u> they estimate he was inbetween **10-15 yrs old**. Yet he didn't become king until he was 30.

  Nothing had changed ... Everything had changed.
  - 1. I wonder if as he was walking back to his sheep he thought ... Wow, The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He makes me to lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside the still waters. He restores my soul; He leads me in the paths of righteousness For His name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; For You are with me; Your rod and Your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You anoint my head with oil; My cup runs over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me All the days of my life; And I will dwell in the house of the Lord Forever."

#### D. Slide8 Allow me to paint the story. Map

- 1. 1) Gibeah, David flees from Saul. 2) David goes to Adullam via Gath, & gathers followers. 3) David & his followers fight Philistines in Keilah.
  - 4) David hides in Wilderness of Ziph, Saul chases there. 5) David flees to Wilderness of Maon, Saul follows. 6) David goes to En-gedi, Saul follows w/large force.
- E. This psalm arose out of *testing experiences*. It's about the Ziphites *tattletaling* on David's whereabouts to Saul.
  - 1. David is on the run w/600 men.

- Now, to be betrayed by *Doeg the Edomite* (1 Sam. 22) well that's no surprise (Ps.52). But here to be rejected by *men of his own tribe*?
   Inexcusable! (1 Sam.23 & 26 Ziphites from Judah).
- 3. And this ... in spite of rescuing one of their own border towns (Keilah) from the Philistines (1 Sam.23).
- 4. It is a dangerous and disillusioning situation ... but he turns again to God.
- F. It's a song w/a sequence, moving from: *a problem, to prayer, to praise*. Or from *trouble, to trust, to triumph*.
  - 1. Our outline: My Prayer. My Faith. My Praise.

#### III. Slide9 MY PRAYER (1-3)

- A. What a great way to pray. When being *attacked*, *rejected*, even while being "in" the will of God.
- B. (1) Save me by *your name* the psalmist appeals to God's name as he looks for deliverance. He trusts that the name of God is powerful enough to save him.
  - 1. Ps.33:21 For our heart is glad in him, because we trust in his holy name.
- C. Vindicate me the Hebrew word used here, literally means to judge.
  - 1. When used of the innocent, it indicates a vindication or defense of their rights.
- D.(2) Hear my prayer a common request in *individual* lament psalms.
- E. (3) Stranger or insolent men, rude, arrogant, lack of respect.
- F. Ruthless men seek my life *violent or powerful*, show no mercy, no pity, describes people who <u>oppress</u>.
- G. They do not set God before themselves the defining characteristic of the psalmist's *enemies*. They have *no regard* for God and <u>oppress</u> with violence.
  - 1. By describing them this way, the psalmist draws a *contrast* between himself and his enemies.

## IV. Slide10 MY FAITH (4,5)

- A. This is a clear turning point at vs.4. Here's where *David's faith* kicks in.
  - Note: he has to play hide-n-seek with Saul for about 10+ years. So nothing has changed ... except inside:)
  - 2. He is now **trusting** the Lord. Warren Wiersbe said, *It's one thing to cry* **out** to God, but it's something else to **believe** that He is going to <u>hear</u> and <u>answer</u>.
- B. (4) Behold, God is my helper here now is the *contrast* to his enemies, who have no regard for God, the psalmist trusts God to help him in times of trouble.
- C. The Lord is the upholder of my life or the God is the mainstay, or the main support, of your life today [*mainstay* = a person or thing on which something else is based or depends: *farming is the mainstay of the rural economy*]. *Warren Wiersbe*
- D.(5) Faithfulness *or constancy* speaks to the absolute dependability of God.
  - 1. It is often paired with God's steadfast love.
  - 2. Ps 25:10 All the paths of the Lord are steadfast love and faithfulness.

## V. Slide11 MY PRAISE (6,7)

- A. David ends with Praise.
  - 1. David moves from his *problem*, to *prayer*, to *Praise*.
  - 2. David moves from trouble, to trust, to Triumph.
- B. (6) With a freewill offering The psalmist responds to God's faithful deliverance by bringing this *freewill offering* as *an act of worship*!
  - 1. Freewill, i.e. no vow was included in his prayer. It wasn't, *If you will do this, I will give that.*<sup>1</sup>
- C. (7) I will give thanks to your name the psalmist appealed to <u>God's name</u> in vs.1. Now, he responds by *giving thanks to the name* of God.
- D. What do we learn here from David?

- E. With **Sorrow** in David's heart, he breaks into a **Song**.
  - 1. His troubles weren't any less (decade + of running). He never let go of his trust. He clung to God. He waited patiently for Him.
  - 2. In the middle of a storm, he built a *Bethel*, then broke into *Song*.
  - 3. Slide12 Habakkuk end with this Hymn, Even though the fig trees have no blossoms, and there are no grapes on the vines; even though the olive crop fails, and the fields lie empty and barren; even though the flocks die in the fields, and the cattle barns are empty, 18 yet I will rejoice in the Lord! I will be joyful in the God of my salvation! 19 The Sovereign Lord is my strength! He makes me as surefooted as a deer, able to tread upon the heights. (3:17-19)
  - 4. Slide13 "You cannot <u>starve</u> a man who is <u>feeding</u> on God's promises." F.B.Meyer
