#### II. Intro: Wonderful Counselor

- A. To complement our *Sunday Christmas Series* we are doing "The Prophetic Names of Jesus" for the 3 Wed nights leading up to Xmas.
  - Focus: Who Jesus is, through His prophetic names.
- B. We are starting with *Wonderful Counselor* giving us *a Christ-centered focus* that I believe connects beautifully with *a weary world heading into Christmas*.
- C. Background of Isaiah:
  - 1. The book of Isaiah is a miniature Bible. 1st 39 chapters (39 OT books) are filled with *judgment* because *mankind sinned*. The final 27 chapters (27 NT books) is a message of hope and promise and a Messiah.
- D. Slide5a Background of Isaiah 9.
  - 1. Show map of Assyria. (Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Israel, top of Egypt)
- E. Slide5b Read Isaiah 9:1-2, 6. [ch8 *Assyrian Invasion*. Zebulun, Naphtali *would feel the wrath of Assyrian invasion 1st*. But later it would be glorious Galilee, way of the Sea/Capernaum]
- F. C.S. Lewis's claim in *Miracles*, The **Incarnation** is the greatest miracle (greater even than **creation**).

- 1. **Creation** was an act of God's **power**, but the **Incarnation** is an act of God's humility, condescension, and relational love.
- Creation is God <u>speaking</u> the world into being.
   Incarnation is God <u>stepping</u> into the world He made.

# III. Slide6 1 HOW WOULD A JEWISH AUDIENCE HAVE UNDERSTOOD WONDERFUL COUNSELOR?

- A. Wonderful (פַּלֵא / pele) language used for God's miraculous acts.
  - 1. To the Jewish imagination, *pele* was not a word used lightly. It's used for:
    - a) God's redemptive wonders. (Egypt). God's supernatural wisdom. (Judges 13:18 Manoah asked angel name, *Why do you ask my name, seeing it is Wonderful*?) NLT *Why do you ask my name? the angel of the LORD replied. It is too wonderful* for you to understand.
    - b) Wonderful beyond comprehension. *Superhuman. Incomprehensible, extraordinary.*
    - c) He refuses to tell his name ... which shows *mystery and power*.

      But He did say ... but its pretty Wonderful! Maybe alluding to what Isaiah would say in our text, His name is Wonderful counselor.
  - 2. This term marked something beyond *human capability*. It was wisdom or action that could only come from Yahweh Himself.
    - a) So hearing that a child will carry *pele* would <u>stop</u> the Jewish listener in their sandals. It signals **divinity**, not just *gifted leadership*.
- B. Counselor (יוֹעֵץ / yoʿētz) more than advice; a wise, strategic, protective guide.
  - 1. In Hebrew culture, a counselor was: The king's inner-circle strategist (e.g., Ahithophel). The keeper of the king's *heart, plans, and direction*. A source of *stability, guidance, and protection*.
    - a) It implied *presence*, advocacy, and wise structuring of life NOT distant instruction.

- C. So to a Jewish audience: Isaiah is saying that the Messiah will bring God's miraculous, divine wisdom in a *deeply relational*, *stabilizing*, *presence-filled* way.
- D. Slide7 Question: So what would a first-century Jewish listener hear when Isaiah called the Messiah *Wonderful Counselor*?

### IV. Slide8a 2 WHY DOES GOD DESCRIBE THE MESSIAH AS A COUNSELOR?

- A. Because Israel's <u>deepest wound</u> was not merely *political oppression*, but *relational* disorientation.
- B. In Isaiah's time: Kings failed (4 from Judah). Leaders gave foolish counsel (Isa. 9:16a for those who guide this people have been leading them astray.). People sought answers from mediums instead of God (Isa. 8:19). The nation lived in fear, confusion, and shadow of death/deep darkness (9:2b).
- C. Slide8b God responds not first with power, judgment, or military strength but w/ ... \*A Person who will *come close enough* to **counsel**.
  - \*A King who will *restore the inner world*, not just the outer world.
- D. So, God meets human chaos not with distance, but with empathic, wise presence, and with counsel that holds, guides, and heals.
  - 1. It reveals a God who values being known, not merely obeyed.
- E. Slide9 Question: So why did God send a Counselor to Israel instead of a conqueror?

### V. Slide10a 3 WHAT DOES THIS REVEAL ABOUT GOD'S RELATIONAL HEART?

- A. God leads by coming near, *not by* shouting from afar.
  - 1. Counselor implies Proximity. Attachment. Availability.
  - 2. In other words: God is not embarrassed to join you in your confusion.
- B. God does not despise your need for guidance.
  - In human culture, needing counsel is a sign of weakness. ;( [I actually see strength. I see emotional intelligence!]
     But God seems to say: "Your need is where I delight to be your God."

- C. God does not rescue by *force*; He rescues by <u>relationship</u>.
  - 1. Power without counsel would crush. Counsel without power would fail.
    - a) The Messiah brings both but *begins with* counsel. The gentle touch *before* the mighty arm.
- D. This is actually the heart of **attachment**: A God who wants to be *experienced*, not just acknowledged. God is our Ultimate secure *attachment* ...

  Eg. *Under His wings*, *you find Refuge*. *I will never leave you nor forsake you*. *ABBA*. *Father*.
  - Secular attachment theory <u>can</u> lean toward (your early caregiving determines your destiny). Christian counseling pushes back on that. It says: People are more than their childhood story. Slide10b God can reparent, restore, and reshape. The Holy Spirit produces new patterns that aren't bound to the past.
- E. Slide11 Question: What does it say about God *that* He chooses to **guide us up close** instead of fixing us from a distance?

### VI. Slide12 4 HOW DOES THIS SPEAK INTO ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS?

- A. Advent is the season of waiting, longing, hoping and Isaiah 9:6 is spoken into darkness: The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light.
  - 1. **Advent** is not merely *counting days* to Christmas; it is: **Sitting** in the darkness long enough to feel your need. **Naming** the confusion you can't fix. **Admitting** your heart requires a Counselor who is both *gentle* and *strong*.
  - 2. Advent is an invitation to receive Jesus as the Counselor of the places you don't know how to manage.
- B. If you tend to <u>spiral</u>. When <u>shame</u> whispers old scripts. When <u>relational wounds</u> shape reactions. When your <u>feeling too young and too scared</u>. When you long for someone wise enough to <u>guide</u>, <u>but</u> tender enough to <u>stay</u> ... Then Jesus enters that place <u>not with condemnation</u> but with <u>Wonderful Counsel!</u>

C. Slide13 Question: Where in my life am I waiting for the Wonderful Counselor to enter my darkness and guide me this Christmas?

### VII.Slide14 5 WHAT CAN YOU HOLD ONTO THIS CHRISTMAS?

- A. Picture of a Christmas tree stand w/3 anchor points I'll leave you w/these:
  - 1. You are not expected to navigate **your inner world** alone.
    - a) You were created for **counsel**, for **guidance**, for **presence**.
    - b) Jesus is not ashamed of your need.
  - 2. God's wisdom is not cold direction it's warm, relational guidance.
    - a) He counsels as one who knows every fear, every shame story, every longing.
  - 3. The Messiah came not only to <u>Save</u> but to **Shepherd**.
    - a) Not only to redeem but to reorient. Not only to forgive but to restore the inner map.
- B. Advent is the season where God says, I am coming near again, not as a judge but as your counselor.
- C. Prayer: Jesus *Wonderful Supernatural Extraordinary* Counselor.

  Enter my **confusion** with Your clarity. Enter my **fear** with Your steadiness.

  Enter my **shame** with Your gentleness. And Enter my **longing** with Your presence.
