WARM-UP QUESTION:

What are examples of when anticipating something makes the event or gift more exciting and fun?

"Biblical Hope"

The prophets of Israel often wrote of hoping in God because of His past faithfulness. Looking back reminded them there was hope for the future. What has God done in the past that is good to remember to give hope?

The apostles pointed to the resurrection of Jesus to explain how they had a "living hope". Their hope was in a person instead of circumstances. What are the benefits of having hope in Jesus instead of circumstances? Challenges?

"Simeon's Hope (Luke 2:22-34)

Simeon was righteous (good relationship with God) and devout (good habits for God) which led him to hope for God's salvation. What are specific ways to have a good relationship with God and good habits for God?

REFLECTION QUESTION:

Simeon felt free because he saw God provide and reveal His son. He wasn't tied down with burdens from this world. What are burdens that you are holding onto that God wants you to release so you can hope in Him? Pray for God to reveal to you what they are and how to let Him have them.

Advent is Hopeful Anticipation

I. Slide1 Announce:

- A. Slide2-6 Lar: Fostering Hope, C@R, CAFL, Xmas Eve Services. Sub Teachers.
- B. Slide7 Giving Update: Mercy Projects \$4900. MPD \$3000. Pantry \$4200? 25 lbs of Lip Gloss 4 the outreach to sex workers in LA. Gifts for 500 Foster children in Riv Co.
- C. Slide8 Coffee w/Kelly: Ladies a reminder to listen in to Coffee w/Kelly. #88 !!!
- D. Prayer: the weary world rejoices. God You are our source of Hope.

II. Slide9 Intro: Advent is Hopeful Anticipation

- A. Last Week we talked about Advent being about *Expectant Waiting*.
 - 1. Slide10 To which I will add 1 thing ... Anna's story. Lk.2:36-38 NLT *Anna, a prophet, was also there in the Temple. She was the daughter of Phanuel from the tribe of Asher, and she was very old. Her husband died when they had been married only seven years. 37 Then she lived as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the Temple but stayed there day and night, worshiping God with fasting and prayer. 38 She came along just as Simeon was talking with Mary and Joseph, and she began praising God. She talked about the child to everyone who had been waiting expectantly for God to rescue Jerusalem.*
 - 2. Practical things to do for Advent by Dawn Spice (recep)
 - a) Turning the *Elf on the Shelf* from a troublemaker into a <u>server</u>, like he's sitting in the mixer bowl w/a note that says, *let's bake cookies for the neighbors*. Read 1 ch of the book of Luke everyday. Make a craft each day to give away to neighbors, Sunday school teachers, friends, etc. Learn the *FULL* lyrics to a classic Christmas Carol everyday. Learn about a <u>different character</u> from the Christmas story everyday. Wrap up books, open & read a different 1 each day. Slowly build a gingerbread <u>nativity scene</u> by adding to it each day. Make traditional advent wreath.
- B. Slide11 We've all heard a countdown 10, 9, 8...1. Advent is simply a countdown.

- 1. And we've all watched a movie *a 2nd or 3rd time even though we know the ending* (hopefully not Hallmark movies!). Why? because we like the story!
- 2. So we rehearse the 1st advent narrative, the birth of Christ every year.

III. Slide12a BIBLICAL HOPE

- A. Can you describe the feeling of *anticipating a future* that is better than the present?
 - 1. We call it hope & we all do it. *It is a state of <u>anticipation</u> and it is <u>crucial</u> for healthy human existence. And it is a really important concept in the Bible.*
- B. Hope in the OT קוָה (qavah) יָחַל (yachal)
 - 1. There are 2 main Hebrew words translated as hope.
 - 2. **Yachal** which means simply "to wait for." Like the story of Noah and the ark as the flood waters recede, Noah Had to **yachal**/wait for weeks.
 - 3. **Qavah** which also meant "to wait". It's related to the Hebrew word qav which means <u>cord</u>. [When you pull a qav tight, you produce a state of <u>tension</u> until there is a release]. That's qavah, the feeling of <u>tension</u> and <u>expectation</u> while you wait for something to happen.
 - a) The prophet **Isaiah** depicts God as a farmer who plants vines and *qavahs/waits* for good grapes.
 - b) The prophet **Micah** talks about farmers who both *qavah* and *yakhal* for morning dew to give moisture to the land.
 - c) So in biblical Hebrew, hope is about waiting or expectation.

C. Slide12b But waiting for what?

- D.In the period of Israel's **prophets**, as the nation was sinking into self-destruction, **Isaiah** said, "at this moment, the Lord is hiding his face from Israel, so I will qavah/wait for him." The only hope Isaiah had in those dark days was the hope for God Himself.
- E. You find this all over the book of **psalms** where these words appear over 40x's. [In almost every case, what people are waiting for is **God**]

- 1. Slide12c In **Psalm** 130:5 *I wait* (qavah) *for the Lord, my soul waits* (qavah), *and in his word I hope* (yakhal).
- 2. The prophet **Hosea**, he lived in <u>dark times</u> when Israel was being oppressed by foreign empires. And he chose hope when he said, *God will turn this valley of trouble into a door of Hope*. Hos.2:15
- 3. So, it is God's *past faithfulness* that motivates *hope for the future*.
- 4. You *look forward* by *looking backward*, trusting in nothing other than God's character. Ps.39:7 says, *And now, O Lord, for what do I wait* (qavah)? *My hope* (yakhal) *is in you.*

F. Slide12d Hope in the NT ἐλπίς (elpis)

- G. *In the NT*, the earliest followers of Jesus cultivated the similar habit of **hope**.
 - 1. The empty tomb opened up a new door of hope.
 - 2. They use the Greek word *Elipis* to describe this *anticipation*.
 - 3. **Peter** said that Jesus' resurrection opened up *a living hope* that people can be reborn into new and different kind of humans.
 - 4. **Paul** said the good news about Jesus announces the *Elipis* of glory. The *Elipis* is based on a **person**, the risen Jesus who has overcome death.

H. Slide13a Biblical hope is based on a Person which makes it different from optimism

- 1. Optimism is about choosing to see in any situation how circumstances could work out for the best.
- 2. But biblical Hope it's not focused on circumstance. In fact, hopeful people in the Bible often recognize there's NO evidence things will get better. But they choose hope anyway!
 - a) Hope keeps your soul alive. You need hope not because you're going to die tonight, but to get up tomorrow and live.

- b) Slide13b Optimism is psychological, Hope is theological. Optimism is personal trust in <u>yourself</u>, Hope is personal trust in <u>God</u>. Optimism is what you think **you** can do. Hope is what you think **God** can do. *Rick Warren*
- I. Slide14 Biblical hope isn't optimism based on the odds.
 - 1. It is *a choice* to wait for God to bring about a future that is as surprising as a crucified man ... raising from the dead.
 - 2. Christian hope looks back to the risen Jesus in order to look forward.

 And so we wait. That is what the biblical words for Hope are all about.
 - 3. Hope = the expectation of what is sure to come.
- J. Slide15a There was an article written where they Surveyed 2000 Americans on Hope
 - 1. It reported that 80% of the 2000 were **desperate** for some **good news**.
 - 2. As humans we have to have something to <u>look forward to</u>. But if that thing can be **taken away** from you, your hope is misplaced (if your hope is in your spouse, your boyfriend or girl-f, or in your children, in your finances or career, it is misplaced)
 - 3. Through this 2020 & 2021 we have been *shaken*. Our idols of *comfort*, idols of *safety*, idols of *health*, idols of *relationships*, have been *shaken* to Slide15b the core. As one said, *Covid has showed us the shallow graves in which we have buried our idols*.
 - 4. But when you have your hope in *something that cannot be taken away* from you, it's a game changer. Our hope is in a *Person*.
 - a) You can have **Hope** because Jesus cannot be taken away from you.

 Paul opens 1st Tim with, *Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by command of God our Savior, and of Christ Jesus our Hope.*
- K. Let's meet an old man named Simeon.

IV. Slide16a SIMEON'S HOPE NUNC DIMITTIS (Lk.2:22-35)

A. Quick over view of Lk.2:22-24.

- B. The Temple was central in Israel's Worship & Hopes.
- C. 3 Rites/Ceremonies: Circumcision (21). Purification (22a). Presentation (22b-24).
 - 1. We also note this is Mary's *sin offering*. see Lev.12:1-8.
 - 2. Presentation (22b-24) as prescribed in Ex.13:2, 12-15.
- D. Slide 16b Lk. 2:25-35
- E. Slide17a (25) Simeon = one who hears & obeys.
 - 1. He was righteous (in his attitude toward God past).
 - 2. He was devout (in his attitude toward man -present).
 - 3. He was waiting (in his attitude toward Hope future).
- F. So why this man? (3 reasons) 3 x's the passage refers to the Spirit's influence on him.
 - 1. Slide17b The HS was upon him (25). The HS revealed things to him (26). The HS led him (he came in the Spirit) (27).
- G.(28) It was the custom in Jerusalem to bring a small child to a rabbi that he might bless the child & pray for it. (LKGNT; pg.144)
 - 1. He took Him up in his arms these are arms of **Hope** & **Faith** stretched out.
 - a) Here's Jesus resting in the arms of Simeon, and Simeon resting in Jesus Salvation.
- H. Slide 18 (29) This section is called Simeon's *Nunc Dimittis* or now dismiss.
- I. This is a salvation song, a missionary hymn, a message of Hope, a prophecy of sorrow to come.
 - 1. I'm ready to be called home now!
 - a) What do you want to have happen so that you could say at the end of your life, Lord, now dismiss your servant in peace?
 - 2. Hopefully after we see salvation we are then ready to fly.
 - 3. You're not ready to live, till you're ready to die!

- J. Depart in peace = to release a prisoner, to untie a ship & set sail, to take down a tent, to untie a beast of burden.
 - 1. It frees believers from the burdens of this life & leads us into the blessings of the next.
 - 2. Are you tied to this place? If so, by what?
 - 3. Like a Hot Air Balloon pilot, can you cut another cord loose today?
- K.(30) Salvation not *soteer* (savior), not *soteria* (salvation), but *soterion* (speaking of *one fitted to save*). Have your eyes seen Salvation?
- L. (34,35) The **fall** and **rising** of many when Jesus is preached, He <u>always</u> produces either *a rising* or *a falling* in every one of His hearers.
 - 1. He is history's *Dividing Ridge*. Neutrality is forever impossible. "Rise *unbelievers* from your sins dark depths; Rise *believers* above this world, to the next."
- M.(35) Sword a large wide sword. Signifying extreme anguish.
 - 1. Mary did feel "the sword" in her heart <u>repeatedly</u> as she watched her Son during His ministry, & then stood at the cross where He died.
- N.Do we await *Christ's second advent* with as much excitement & Hopeful Anticipation as did Simeon his *1st*?
- O. Prayer: Faith means more than believing in God; it means believing God.
