Games People Play

I. Slide1 Announce:

A. Slide2,3 This Sunday: Pantry Drive (toothpaste / toothbrushes). Blood Drive from 8-12 (make apt.). Missions prayer 6:30pm in Agape Room, guest *Sophie Danielson*.

II. Slide4 Intro: flannel Jason. Games People Play

- A.Out of my 6 other siblings, I played the most with my 2 younger sisters as a child. We would "drive up" on our big wheels or tricycles & play gas station. We even lined up *little benches* & played church. What do you remember playing?
 - 1. Another game we **all** learned to play, *from a very young age*, was learning how to **play God** ... w/others & even ourselves.
- B. In 1964 a best selling book was, *Games People Play* (The Psychology of Human Relationships)
 - 1. It was about subtle ways people **manipulate** others w/o them even being aware.
 - 2. A book, *Games Christians Play*, came out in **1967**. Taking readers behind the scenes in the Christian community, to reveal games played *beneath a religious veneer*.
 - a) We as Christians play games like: The, *I know more than you do game*, or, *When you have been a Christian for as long as I have, as if* they were born in a choir loft *or* saved at age2?
- C. James introduces us to the most widely played game among Christians then/now...
 - 1. Slide5 Playing God w/Others (11,12) & Playing God w/Yourself (13-17).
- D. Note also, these 2 mini-sections, both are a sin of speech. Do not speak evil against one another brothers/sisters. And, come now you who say.

III. Slide6a PLAYING GOD WITH OTHERS (11,12) Read all

A. James command is, Do not speak evil against, do not defame or do not denigrate.

- 1. A defamatory word may be perfectly true: we do not have to tell <u>lies</u> in order to **defame**. But the fact that it is true gives us no right to say it.
- 2. True or false, it *makes us superior*, we *talk down* to them, ourselves adopting a *superior position*.
- 3. Defamation is forbidden not as a *breach of truth*, nor even as a *breach of love*, but as a *breach of humility*. (10)
 - a) If we are *really low before God* (6-10), we have *no altitude left* from which to *talk down* to anyone. *Alec Motyer, The Message of James*.
- B. So to play this game, here's its 1st objective: Imagine yourself as *superior* to other Christians & *put them down* in various ways.
- C. Slide6b Rule 1: You must *speak evil* of your brother or sister. (11a)
 - 1. Learn how to *talk down to* people. Use harsh words about the person who is absent. Talk about 1 person, to another person, w/the goal of lowering your listener's estimate of that other person. And, neatly wrap your conversations in a *thin-phony-veneer* of "Perhaps I shouldn't share this but..." or, "I don't mean to be critical but..." or, "we need to pray for so-n-so."
- D. Slide6c Rule 2: You must *judge* your brother or sister. (11b)
 - 1. Judge to pronounce condemnation upon someone.
 - 2. In order to judge someone *rightly* though, we must know *ALL* there is to know about that other person.
 - a) It requires the *complete understanding* about that person's **thoughts** & **motives** ... that only **God** possesses.
 - b) Jesus cautioned about hypocritical judgment in Mt.7:1-5 (splinter/plank)
 - (1) If you see someone else *doing wrong* ask yourself whether *the same evil in another form* is hiding inside **you** somewhere.
 - 3. The law James is probably referring to was *the royal law* he already mentioned in 2:8, *love your neighbor as self*. Will you set yourself above this law?

- E. Slide6d 2 Reasons why not to play this game.
- F. Reason 1: It places us in a position of authority reserved for God alone. (12a)
 - It is highly probable we don't have all the information on our friend, thus
 we could very well be mistaken, partial, misled! Only God knows the
 deepest facts.
- G. Reason 2: Playing God ignores or excuses our own failures. (12a)
 - 1. "One of the easiest ways to hide our sins is to expose the sins of others."
- H. Who are you to judge another? (12b)
 - 1. Original, the personal pronoun *you* is placed 1st in the sentence, "You there! Who are you...?"
 - a) This turns the spotlight away from *others* & puts it full force on *us*.

IV. Slide7a PLAYING GOD WITH YOURSELF (13-17) sin of presumption

- A. (13) Our lives are completely in **God's** hands. *Therefore*, we must live trusting **Him** for every moment.
 - 1. Imagine for a moment **you** as the final authority over your life, then live like it. Take *God* completely out of the picture, don't depend on Him, don't even recognize His existence. *It sounds like this* ...
 - a) Choose your own **time** & **schedule**. (13a) *today or tomorrow*.
 - b) Choose your **location**. (13b) we will go to such and such a town.
 - c) Choose how much **time** there. (13c) *spend a year there*.
 - d) Choose your own activities around your own benefits & pleasures (13d) & trade
 - e) Choose how much you'll make in **profits**. (13e) *make a profit*.
 - f) Choose to **boast** about it. (16) you boast in your arrogance.
- B. James isn't coming against *day planners*, or advocating haphazard organization.

- 1. God condones wise planning. Prov.16:9 The heart of man **plans** his way, but the Lord establishes his steps.
- 2. *But* are plans are always to be according to **His will**, acknowledging **His sovereignty** in our lives.
- C. Slide7b 3 Reasons why we'll never win at Playing God (14)
- D. Reason 1: Tomorrow's circumstances are totally uncertain. (14a) you do not know what tomorrow will bring.
 - 1. An *unexpected injury, sudden death of a spouse, loss of a job,* can instantly change everything. [Life is so transient & brief]
 - 2. Wanna make the best of it then? Ask the divine Spirit to *choose for you* & guide you. Discover God's will & do it. [Find out where God is moving & move w/Him]
- E. Slide7c Reason 2: We have no assurance of a long life. (14b) What is your life? For you are a mist/steam/smoke that appears for a little time and then vanishes. (the transience of life)
 - 1. Slide8 Wasn't this the problem of the Rich Fool in Lk.12:1-20? Then he told them a story: "A rich man had a fertile farm that produced fine crops. 17 He said to himself, 'What should I do? I don't have room for all my crops.' 18 Then he said, 'I know! I'll tear down my barns and build bigger ones. Then I'll have room enough to store all my wheat and other goods. 19 And I'll sit back and say to myself, "My friend, you have enough stored away for years to come. Now take it easy! Eat, drink, and be merry!" '20 "But God said to him, 'You fool! You will die this very night. Then who will get everything you worked for?' 21 "Yes, a person is a fool to store up earthly wealth but not have a rich relationship with God."
 - a) He doesn't criticize the man for being rich, for saving, or for planning.
 - b) He thought about *his bounty, his barns, his goods*. My crops, my barns, my wheat, my goods, my friend/soul. He was a little *my-opic*!
 - c) He didn't recognize *God* as the real owner. Deut.8:18 *Remember the Lord your God.* He is the one who gives you power to be <u>successful</u>.

- d) He was a pleasure seeker who lived only for <u>material</u> things. When we ask, *how much is one worth*, we should be talking about one's **character** & not one's *possessions*.
- e) He was called a fool because he left God out of his life. Have you left God out of your finances, decisions, life, *in some area*?
 - (1) Then Like a crack of thunder God said to him, You Fool!
- f) He missed the true meaning of life by giving himself wholly to getting & spending.
 - (1) A ship should be in water, not water in the ship. And so with possessions...we should possess them but not let them possess us.
- F. Slide9 Reason 3: We have no right to ignore God's will. (15) *Instead you ought to say, If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that.* [the heart of the matter]
- G. Slide 10a The Puritans loved the phrase *Deo Volente God willing*. (signing letters w/D.V. became a common practice)
 - 1. It's not that the Bible condemns *forward planning*, but it's simply that we should <u>never</u> leave God out of our future plans.
 - 2. The mere use of the phrase God willing itself can become a pious cliché perhaps that's why it has largely disappeared but the attitude of humble dependence on God as we face an uncertain future is the vital thing to retain. [don't have to say all the times, please pass the potatoes, D.V.]
 - 3. Back in the OT, King David wrote My times are in your hand, Lord. Ps.31:15
 - a) Slide10b In simple terms, whatever I put in my day planner for 2021, will be of no significance compared to what God puts in my day planner.
 - b) When we recover the <u>attitude</u> of *Deo Volente*, then we will be able to echo the prayer attributed to Moses in Psalm 90, *So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom*.
 - 4. D.V. God willing before and after everything in life, presupposes a life of dependent prayer in which all is taken before God.

- 5. Slide 10c God willing is the posture of a burning heart.
- H. Prayer: God teach us to be <u>humble</u> and *plan in Pencil*! Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. In my heart as it is in heaven.
