- II. Intro: Questions About Identity [identity questions grouped]
 - A. Identity Questions: Who do <u>people</u> say that I am? But who do <u>you</u> say that I am? What do you call me good? Woman, what does that have to do with me? Who is my

mother? Who are my brothers? What do you think about the Christ? Whose son is he? Man, who appointed me as judge or referee between you and your brother?

- B. Slide 10a What is your name? ... that could be a simple question, or a profound one
 - 1. It depends on the *circumstances*, and who is asking the question.
 - 2. If it's a barista asking you your name the question's pretty *straightforward*. But when **Jesus** asks the question, *What is your name?* as He asked *the possessed man* in Luke 8, it's completely different ...
 - a) Slide 10b After all, to know another's name is the beginning of relationship.
- C. Names are more than mere *labels*. We identify with *our names*. In a sense, *we are our names*.
 - 1. Shakespeare's Juliet famously asked actually the opposite, What's in a name? Then she answered her own question: "That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." But if Juliet can easily change the name of a rose it's probably because ... she's not a rose herself.
 - a) She would not be nearly so *casual* if the name to be changed were <u>her own</u>. If someone insisted on calling her *Julie* or *Jules*, she might protest.
 - b) Think of all the ways <u>your own name</u> has been changed. The one's you **like**, the one's you **don't**. (*Jish*, just my siblings! Brian, Bri, BB, B, PB)
 - 2. We are intimately tied to our names in ways that are powerful and even rather mysterious.
 - a) **George Forman** named all 5 of his boys *George*, but that's a little strange. We usually don't want to *share our name*.
- D. Slide 10c You know why organizations do **name tags** at events ... we recognize that it is hard for any kind of relationship, *even a casual one*, to develop *if you don't know each others names*.

- 1. And if someone does not bother to learn your name after multiple times, it might be an indication that they don't really care to. (now we all feel a little bit guilty). This also is why it is sometimes painful to have your name forgotten
 - a) For the most part, we remember the names of *important* people or people who are *important* to us. (That's why it's hard, even when it's *innocently done* from *loss of memory*)
- E. Slide11 Isaiah says God calls us by name. Is.43:1 But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: "Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine.
 - 1. It implies that God is *not* an impersonal force. If God knows me by name, it means that ... God is <u>a being</u> and, a being who seeks to be *in* relationship with <u>me</u>.
 - 2. It is one of God's ways of reaching out to me in all of who I really am.

III. Slide12 HE CALLED HIM LAZARUS (Lk.16:19-31) 1st Story

- A. One of Jesus' parables, commonly called *Lazarus and the Rich Man*, includes an *interesting, and telling, use of Names*. *READ*
- B. Licked by dogs not like your pampered pet that comes up and greets you with a kiss and a lick, no we're talking *diseased* stray dogs.
 - 1. Yet this *mangy mongrel*, *the dog outside* the gate, showed more compassion than *the man inside*!
- C. These guys cannot be more **different**. One rich, one poor. One feasted, one starved. One covered in purple, one covered in sores. One with enough money to meet his needs and throw parties, the other man *with a name*, *unlike the other guy*.
 - 1. If you are **rich**, it seems that <u>everyone knows</u> your **name**.
 - 2. The names of rich people often are spoken like magic words. Those names have the power to open closed doors. And yet, Jesus gives no name to the rich man in the parable.

- 3. It's also safe to assume that the rich man of the parable does not know the name of the beggar who sits at the gate of his house. But in the parable (as in the eyes of God) the beggar has a name *Lazarus*.
- D. *Lazarus*, the <u>only</u> character named in Jesus' parables ... maybe because of what his name means ... *When God Helps*!
 - 1. Think about this: Lazarus is unclean, penniless, he's covered with sores, he desired what fell from the rich man's table, and even the dogs licked his sores. Yet his name means, When God Helps ... wait, does He?
 - a) How many people *mocked him* because of his name. *Doesn't look like you're getting helped by God!* But this is not the end of the story for Lazarus.
 - b) In the end it shows God really was his *Help*. His suffering came to an end, and then *the Great Reversal*.

IV. Slide13 WHAT IS YOUR NAME? (Lk.8:26-39) READ 2nd Story

- A. Luke says that the man is possessed by **demons**, he might also have had *symptoms* of *serious mental illness*, *specifically multiple personality disorder*. In either case, the poor fellow *clearly is suffering*.
 - 1. Slide14a When the man sees Jesus from a distance, he runs to him and fell down down before him. Jesus asks, "What is your name?" This is not an insignificant question, particularly here. It is the question one human being asks another. Remember it's the beginning of relationship. (I met Rayla, Liz's granddaughter in our break room today, my 1st question)
- B. This man had been exiled from his community and had been left for dead. We can only imagine how long it has been since he has been asked his **name**.
 - 1. Probably he has not been asked since he first had been tormented, and that in itself would have *added to his torment*.
 - Slide14b During his time of distress I'm sure he has been known by *labels* rather than by a name: a madman, a demoniac, naked guy, dangerous beast. But Jesus asks, *What is your name?* Under these circumstances,

- the question sounds like *nothing less than* an invitation to **life**, the first step in healing.
- C. Slide14c The man replies, *Legion is my name*. It is another poignant name. A **legion** was a unit of the Roman army of *6000 soldiers*, who often *brutalized* those who lived in occupied lands. So when the man says, *Legion is my name*, he is testifying to **how many** demons occupy his soul and how **destructive** they can all be.
 - 1. Then, in an odd twist to the story, Jesus commands the demons to leave the man alone and to enter a huge herd of pigs instead. The pigs then madly run off the edge of a cliff into the sea of Galilee.
- D. The man, now in a new set of clothes and in his right mind, *asks if he can follow Jesus on his travels*. Jesus has another idea. He tells the man to go to his home so that his friends and family can hear this amazing story and see the transformation for themselves.
- E. So the man goes back into his hometown and does just that. He tells the story of the miraculous thing that has happened and about how he has been restored to life.
 - 1. Slide14d I imagine him *beginning his story* by saying, the 1st thing Jesus did was ask me, *What is your name?* [now, *Ahat* is my name] #1, not 6000.

V. Slide15a IDENTITY RECEIVED

- A. Any identity that is achieved rather than received has to be excluding.²
 - 1. Another words, you feel good because these other people aren't as good as you, or as enlightened as you, as conservative as you, as hardworking as you.
 - a) That's often, how we feel good about ourselves.
 - 2. Slide15b You need recognition. You need somebody *Outside* to come in and speak to you.
- B. Who **Do** You Need? You need somebody on the <u>outside</u>, <u>but</u> what kind person should they be?

- 1. You need the *love* and *approval* and *esteem* of someone <u>you esteem</u>, if you want any esteem yourself.
- 2. You want someone who will never let you down or disillusion you.
- 3. You can't have someone who is **fickle**, who is up and down with you, depending on *how well you perform*.
- 4. Slide15c You need the adoration of Someone who adores you. You need to know that *the God of the universe loves you*. That would have to give you the **most powerful basis** and **stablest identity** possible!

C. Slide16 How do you get that?

- 1. Knowing you're adopted into his family, that's a new identity! You're a new creation. You're a citizen of heaven. You are His own. You're a child of God. You're a friend of Christ. You're a family member of Christ. You're a bondservant of Christ. You're His bride. You're His poem. You're the apple of His eye. You're His beloved.
- 2. And Jesus didn't show up just to give you a new name. He died for you!
- D. Slide 17a John Piper said, "Who do you believe has the greatest power to determine who you are and what you are worth? That is your god."
 - 1. Slide17b Timothy Keller said, When you're struggling with what your culture says about your identity because you're not good looking enough, not strong enough, not smart enough, not successful enough. You have to learn how to pull out your identity & push it to the top of the deck.
 - 2. When you are worried about your **status** and **reputation**, go to Phil.2, and remind yourself that *Jesus wasn't afraid to give up His*. Though he was God, he did not think of equality with God as something to <u>cling to</u>. Instead, he gave up his divine privileges; he took the <u>humble position</u> of a slave.
- E. Slide17c Key: don't just <u>believe</u> this take it to the <u>center</u> of your imagination, *through worship*, *through thinking*, *through applying it*, at that moment.
 - 1. If it doesn't go to the top of the deck ... you're back where everyone else is in cultural captivity.

- F. Slide17d So How are you getting it **down** into your heart? Take it to the *naming* level.
 - 1. Remind yourself again & again, What do I know to be true. (not feel!)
 - 2. I think that's why the song, "I Am A Child of God" became so popular. We all need it sung over our lives. Over & over & over again. [end]
- G. Keywords: identity, name, questions.

H.4 Things:

- 1. We are **saints**, not sinners. (1:1) saints 9x's.
- 2. We are **adopted**, no longer abandoned. (1:5) [when adopted 3 things happen: Father pays all debts. You receive all fathers privileges. Unable to be <u>unadopted</u>, a parent could not sever legal guardianship].
- 3. We are **sealed** w/promise of HS, no longer at risk. (1:13)
 - a) Sealed = we are made secure as a sign of *authentication* or *ownership*.
- 4. We are His **poeima**/masterpiece, no longer valueless.
- I. Paul uses *In Christ* (or similar) more than 160 x's. (Jerry Bridges *Who Am I?*)
- J. Quick reminders: *Roles* are what you <u>do</u>. *Identity* is who you <u>are</u>.
 - 1. You aren't what you do, but what Jesus has done.
 - 2. You aren't what's been done to you; but what Jesus has done for you.
