Welcome to Multiply

Over the next four weeks, we as a church, will be taking a look at what it really means to live out the call Jesus left for us in his ascension. Before he prepared to leave the his followers in Matthew 28 he left them with a single mission. He didn't tell them to pursue holiness. He did not tell them to have a deep relationship with Him. He didn't even say give him all glory. Jesus had something bigger, more important in mind for the church. They were called to go and make disciples in the entire world. Some two thousand years later the same mission has been left to us. We're called to make disciples. This is not conversions, or baptisms, or classes, but real disciples who model their life after Jesus.

While Jesus did not give us an exact road map to fulfilling this mission, he did give us some guiding principles to what it might look like to successfully disciple the people God has put in your life. More importantly, in his own life we are given an amazing example of what it means to disciple a group of people and teach them. So as we begin to dig into different text that talk all about our calling, how we life that calling out, and how we see that fleshed out in Jesus life, we have to ask the question of ourselves first, do I truly want this?

It is one thing to say I want to see people's lives changed by the gospel. It's another thing to get into life with someone and actually be a part of God's work doing that. Jesus lived and exemplified this perfectly and it wound up sending him to a cross. We must realize that the path and process of making true disciples of Jesus isn't always easy. It doesn't always fit conveniently into our schedules. It does not always show results either. Yet when it does, the rewards are eternal.

The question to ask of yourself before you start to dig deeper into this is simply, do I want to be a part of Jesus plan to make disciples and multiply?

Week 1: Static or Dynamic



Summary:

Where are you shinning?

In a story there are multiply types of characters. They play different roles and effect the story in different ways. Some characters are known as static characters. They are involved in the story, but never actually make any decisions that alter the story. They are there and the story just happens to them. All the while they react, they adapt, and the conform, but they never move the story themselves.

The opposite of a static character is a dynamic one. Dynamic characters are ones who are involved in the story, but they make decisions and chose paths that ultimately end up driving and changing the direction of the story. They're actively in control of making their own story move forward.

In Matthew 5 Jesus is talking to a. Crowd and to his followers and describes them as "salt" and as "light." He encourages them that they, in the same manner as a static or dynamic character have choice in whether they are going to just let life happen to them or if they are going to be in control and be intentional about their calling to disciple.

When Jesus was speaking with his followers in John 13 he gives them a very important commandment. He tell them that that they should have love for one another. It wasn't just any kind of love though, he tells them in verses 33-35 that the kind of love they should have for each other is the same kind of love that He has for us. And he tells them that the entire world will know that they are followers of Jesus because of the way they love each other.

Jesus didn't say that the church would be recognized because of the type of building we build. We would not be recognized for our political associations or for our dress code. Instead he tells them that we should be recognizable by the way we love each other. So this week we want to take a moment and look at the way Jesus loved us so that we can better love each other and those who are in our midst as a church.

Jesus loved us sacrificially

God became flesh. Paul tells us that he didn't cling to or hold onto his place and authority but emptied himself to become like us. He did all of that so that we could follow him. His love for us was sacrificial. It cost him something to love us. He had to suffer. He was embarrassed. He was murdered. All of this was because he loved us. What are you willing to sacrifice to love like Jesus? What are you willing to give up to love others the way Jesus did?

Jesus loved us unconditionally

Jesus offer of love and salvation to us is unconditional. He didn't look at the world and decide who was worth it as opposed to who was not. Instead, he died for the sins of the world. The famous verse in John 3:16 tells us he so the world that he gave his only begotten son. Jesus love for us does not come with requirements or admission standards. The point of the gospel was that no one is worthy and Jesus died so that we all could be worth is we could believe and repent. Do you love people unconditionally? Is your love available to everyone or do people have to earn it? No one earned God's love and yet it was freely given to us.

Jesus loved genuinely

Jesus really cared about people. He didn't just say he cared about people, he truly did. He stopped in the midst of major crowds to recognize and help the hurting. He would stay up late into the night talking and answering questions for people who wanted to know more about him. He was patient with his closest followers when they failed. He didn't just say he loved people. He truly did. We must learn to not only love in word but also in deed. We must make sure that the way we love people is in our actions towards them and not just our words about them.

The church will be known by the way we love. We should love like Jesus. We should be lights, shinning a selfless, unconditional, genuine love into a dark world full of fake.

Questions to Go Deeper

- 1. Do you think your efforts in discipling people are dynamic or static? Why?
- 2. In what ways can we lose our "saltiness" in the environments God has placed us?
- 3. How can we both as a church and individuals begin to show hospitality to the world around us?
- 4. How do you think you do in representing Jesus to the world? Do you think you have to be perfect to represent him or is there a way that even in our sins we can represent him well?
- 5. What is the one environment where you think you need the most growth in being a light? What can you start doing now to begin making that change?

Week 2: Perfectly Unqualified



Summary:

A recent Barna study showed that over seventy percent of those who consider themselves Bible believing Christians do not have not shared their faith. It also found that over half the Church felt like it was inappropriate to initiate faith conversations with other people. Some of the reasons they gave included fear, anxiety, and appropriateness but the biggest concern given was a feeling of inadequacy. Most people who felt uncomfortable about sharing their faith felt that way because they did not feel qualified to have such conversations. They wouldn't be able to answer questions. They wouldn't have the right words. They didn't have the tools needed to engage in those types of conversations.

So what does the Bible say about this? We're called to share our faith and begin the conversation, but what do we do when we feel like we aren't capable or even the right person to have those conversations? What does the Bible say to me in those moments?

YOU ARE NOT QUALIFIED, YOU ARE EQUIPPED

It's easy to feel unqualified about sharing our faith because we are. How can we, broken people, adequately describe and represent a holy and perfect God. The truth is we cannot. Our words would always fall short. We will never be perfect, and that is okay. God doesn't call us to be perfect examples, instead he calls us to be available so that he might work through us.



Yet we often have this voice in our head discouraging us from taking a step, having a conversation, and beginning a relationship with someone where we might begin the process of making a disciple. It reminds us of failures. It creates fear and doubt in us and leaves us stagnant in our efforts to disciple the people around us.

What we need is another voice. We need to hear a voice that reminds us of all that God has promised us about and his assurance that when we speak in his name He is there and speaks through us.

Remind yourself of God's promise to not only put you in the right place, but to equip you for the places he puts you. And no matter how uncomfortable it may feel or how unqualified you may feel, remind yourself that you are equipped and called.

Let this be the voice you hear to combat and speak truth into the voice we so often hear creating doubt and fear.

Dear me,		



It's crazy when you stop and think about the kind of people God used in his story. Start all the way back in Genesis and we see God start calling imperfect people to do wondrous things. Let's run through some of them real quick to get the crazy level of brokenness that God decided to use in his amazing story.

Abraham was a mess. He had so much doubt in his life. God made a real and powerful promise to Abraham but he constantly doubted it. God had to remind Abraham of this promise three times throughout the chapter of Genesis. It went so far, that after God had promises Abraham a son, he goes to extremely uncomfortable lengths (some would say sinful) to try and make God's promise happen. Abraham was a huge bag of doubt and God still used him.

Noah was a hot mess. Understandable in some ways, he still was an undeniably broken man. After Noah gets off the ark and God is restarting creation with Noah and his family and the first thing Noah does, build a vineyard and get wasted. This leads to a very uncomfortable striking moment between him and and his sons. Don't believe me, go read Noah's story. He had issues.

When God call Moses to be the leader and Voice to the people there was one major problem. Moses had a stutter and didn't want to speak in front of people. Can you imagine how terribly inadequate Moses must have felt when God told him all that was planned? And we cannot forget he was a fugitive for murderer. He killed a guy and had to flee because of it.

The list just goes on and on. There were reluctant prophets, adulterous kings, and then to top it all over Jesus led a rag tag group of misfits into ministry with more issues than space to list here. God has a long history of using the people no one would expect. To take it the extreme, in Numbers 22 God actually speaks through a donkey.

We go down this long road of unqualified individuals in God's master plan simply to prove the point that God is in the business of taking broken people and using them in miraculous ways. If God can use all those people he can use you. God doesn't look for people who are qualified he looks for people who are available.



This week think about the people around you who don't know Jesus and the people who do. What can you do to get these people in the same room? Look for an opportunity to have people over and together. This doesn't need to be a religious thing. Just an opportunity to break down stereotypes about who church people are and what they're like.

NOTE: these things can backfire if you're not careful about the people you invite. Look to invite people who you know are great at connecting with new people or who have things in common to talk about.



It's all about meeting people where they are at. Far too often we want people to come to the church, take all the steps, and get come where we are comfortable to start showing them Jesus.

The example we have from Jesus is that he would go to people where they are and connect with them. He met them at weddings, their homes, city squares, and any place else they might feel comfortable. He connected with them and got to know them. He never sinned, yet he spent time with sinners.

It's important for us to remember this. We're called to be in the world and not of the world. This is a fine line to walk but both parts are important. We tend to lean into one side or the other. We isolate ourselves into a "safe place" and away from people who aren't in the church or we dive into the world and lose our uniqueness that Jesus called us to have. It might not be the easiest path to navigate but we are called to both. We're called to be people who are unique and lights in the dark but also among those in the dark.



Who are you bringing? It's a question we shouldn't just be asking around easter and Christmas but we should always be asking.

You may not feel qualified but the beauty of Phillip's role in this whole story is that he was no where near qualified for this. He wasn't able to explain Jesus or convince someone about his saving work. Instead Philip just said what he could, come and see.

We're called to be "come and see" kind of people. We don't have to have sophisticated answers to deep theological questions about God's existence and the world he created. We need only have our own story and the willingness to invite someone to come and see.

What does it look like to invite someone to come and see then? It's inviting them into your life. Making real disciples starts with real relationships and that requires much more than a random invite to church. It requires me to be open and hospitable with my life. It requires me to let people in to see the good bad and ugly as I let Jesus work in my own life.

Come and see requires me to invite people into my home. Maybe this isn't letting someone live with me (maybe it is) but it is definitely about letting people into your personal space. People can tell when you keep them at arms length. They know when you're only giving them part of the picture. Are we willing to open up our space to people and courageous enough to walk into theirs? Jesus, like we talked about last week, was constantly going to meet people where they were. This includes us getting into someone else's personal space to make a real connection. Going over for dinner, having a beer on the porch, watching the game together, or just sitting and talking for hours about everything are opportunities for us to create real relationships and real opportunities to allow people to come and see Jesus at work in me.
