There are three options for the extent of the atonement.

- Universal salvation
- Hypothetical universalism
- Definite atonement

Definite Atonement

The doctrine of definite atonement states that, in the death of Jesus Christ, the triune God intended to achieve the redemption of every person given to the Son by the Father in eternity past, and to apply the accomplishments of his sacrifice to each of them by the Spirit. The death of Christ was intended to win the salvation of God's people alone.¹

Universal Atonement

Universal atonement states that Jesus died for every single person.

The Success of the Atonement

Isaiah 51:9-10 – the "arm of the Lord" refers to the Lord himself providing salvation.

Isaiah 52:13 – the Servant will succeed in his mission and be exalted.

Because the Servant succeeds there is no uncertainly as to who is saved and that salvation is guaranteed.
