Answering our questions

- 1. Is the relationship between Esther and Ahasuerus really the beautiful, godly romance that movies often portray it to be?
- 2. Is Mordecai really the pious faithful man that movies portray him to be?
- 3. Is Esther a really godly young woman (at least at this point in our story)?
 - Daniel 1:8—resolved that he would not defile himself with the king 's food, or with the wine that he drank
 - Daniel 1:9—God gave Daniel favor and compassion in the sight of the chief of the eunuchs
 - Proverbs 16:7—When a man's ways please the Lord, he makes even his enemies to be at peace with him

Lessons from our story

- 1. God will use sinners and their sin to accomplish his glorious purposes
 - Genesis 50:20—As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many
 people should be kept alive
 - Acts 2:23—this Jesus, delivered up according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of lawless men
- 2. This truth is meant for our encouragement!
 - 1 Corinthians 15:9-10—For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. 10 But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain
- 3. This truth does not give us permission to sin!
 - Romans 6:1-2—What shall we say then? Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? 2 By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it?
