The sacrificial language of Leviticus has nothing to do with God's anger against sin.

The suffering servant in Isaiah chapter 53 is not presented as an atoning sacrifice, in particular a substitutionary sacrifice.

The Greek word translated propitiation in Romans 3:25 and other places does not mean that Christ's death satisfied the wrath of God.

The idea of Christ "absorbing" sin is common among critics of penal substitution.
