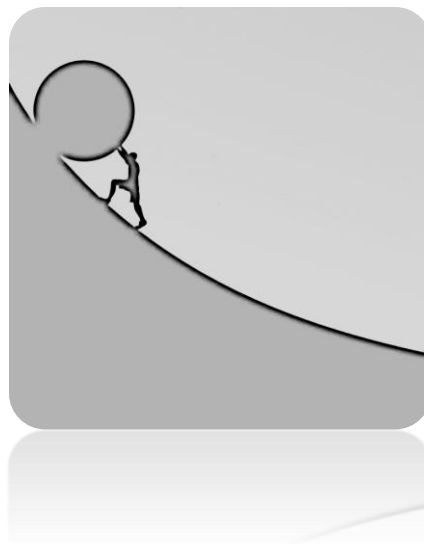

Introduction To The 4G Guide

GATHER – GOD – GROUP – GIVE

It's important that we *GATHER* each week as a church family. Still, God wants us to take what He's teaching and apply it to our daily lives. This is the heart of the 4G Guides. These guides are written to encourage you in your personal *GOD TIME* and in your small *GROUPS*. They are designed to help you understand what God is teaching and apply it to your life. This understanding through application enables you to take what you are learning and *GIVE* it to others.

USING THE 4G GUIDE

Each week is divided into four sections:



Gear Up

Each week starts with the Gear Up section. This section introduces the weekly topic and expounds on Scripture. Also provided are some practical steps to putting the subject matter into practice.



God Time

Personal time with God is vital to the Christian walk. Five daily devotionals are provided for each week's topic. This is your one-on-one time in a guided devotional format. At the conclusion, we encourage you to pray, seeking direction for the day and the rest of the week.



Group Time

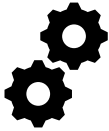

Family worship glorifies God. Each week we have simple devotionals just for Families. Plan ahead though, as many of these lessons include fun experiments or video shorts to discuss.



Gear Up: Faithful Commitment

God calls ordinary people to a faith that perseveres.

One great example of this is the story of Elisha from the Old Testament. Elisha became a bold and daring prophet to the Kingdom of Israel during a time when the majority of people had turned away from God and turned to the false god, Baal. Elisha was mentored by his predecessor, Elijah. Eventually, after Elijah was taken up to heaven, Elisha succeeded him in prophesying to Israel. Let's look at Elisha's beginnings.

1 Kings 19:19-21 says:

¹⁹Elijah left there and found Elisha son of Shaphat as he was plowing. Twelve teams of oxen were in front of him, and he was with the twelfth team. Elijah walked by him and threw his mantle over him. ²⁰Elisha left the oxen, ran to follow Elijah, and said, "Please let me kiss my father and mother, and then I will follow you."

"Go on back," he [Elisha] replied, "for what have I done to you?"

²¹So he turned back from following him, took the team of oxen, and slaughtered them. With the oxen's wooden yoke and plow, he cooked the meat and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he left, followed Elijah, and served him.

You Don't Have to Understand Fully to Obey Immediately

When Elijah first approached Elisha, he threw his mantle, or cloak, over him. This signifies that Elijah recognized that God had chosen Elisha as the next prophet, so he was "passing the torch," so to speak. Though Elisha may not have understood all the details and specifics the future would hold for him, he was prepared to follow Elijah. His one request was to pause for a minute in order to cut ties with his family in order to follow the Lord. In addition, he cut ties with his livelihood by slaughtering (or sacrificing) his oxen.

Like Elisha, we don't have to have all the details about our future in order to obey God now. God has given us the Bible which shows us the way to salvation through faith in Jesus and how to live a life of godliness. Armed with that sword, we can obey God in our lives right where we are, right now.

Those Whom God Uses the Most Are Those Who Hold On to the Least

God calls us to follow Him. When we follow, it means we leave something else behind. Whether it's leaving a life of sin, self-indulgence, control, comfort, pride, or rebellion, following God means giving Him control and submitting to His Lordship.

Like how Elisha sacrificed his oxen and shared them with his people, God may ask us to let go of something in order to go all in for Him. It takes courage to follow God, and we can't be afraid of losing what we have. When we follow, God provides. This is something Elisha seems to have understood. He didn't have a backup plan if being a prophet didn't work out because he didn't plan to turn back! Instead, he simply let go and followed. We, too, need to let go (and stay ready to let go) so that we can follow God. That mindset reveals our commitment.

Take a Step Toward the Unbelievable

God does things that are unbelievable. Often, we can't see those unbelievable things coming. Instead, we see them in hindsight after we've stepped out in obedience. Living with a faith that perseveres means that we follow God, trusting that as we partner with Him, He will do unbelievable things. We must obey, even when we don't understand, and let go of anything that gets in the way of our obedience. That type of committed faith is faith that perseveres!

God Time Day 1: Be Faithful Where You Are



The Prophet Elisha is a significant figure of faith. While he may not be as well known as some other prophets, Elisha performed more miracles in recorded Scripture than anyone in the Old Testament. Yet, before he was a prophet, Elisha came from humble beginnings.



Read 1 Kings 19:19.

¹⁹ Elisha left there and found Elisha son of Shaphat as he was plowing. Twelve teams of oxen were in front of him, and he was with the twelfth team. Elijah walked by him and threw his mantle over him.

Elisha was not a priest, did not work in the temple, nor did he have a seminary degree. He was only a simple farmer when God called him. Yet, Elisha's faith was dedicated to God.

What are your "humble beginnings?"

How do you, or can you, live out your faithfulness to God in your current situation?

God Time Day 2: The Obedience of Elisha



Read 1 Kings 19:20-21.

²⁰ Elisha left the oxen, ran to follow Elijah, and said, "Please let me kiss my father and mother, and then I will follow you."

"Go on back," he replied, "for what have I done to you?"

²¹ So he turned back from following him, took the team of oxen, and slaughtered them. With the oxen's wooden yoke and plow, he cooked the meat and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he left, followed Elijah, and served him.

As Elisha is living out his normal life, God leads the great prophet Elijah to call him into service. Elisha immediately drops everything to follow God's calling.



Take some time to reflect on what may hold you back. What might keep you from pursuing God's calling when it comes?

God Time Day 3: You Don't Have to Fully Understand



Go back and read 1 Kings 19:19 & 21 from Days 1 & 2.

Elisha is plowing a field when the Prophet Elijah comes along and throws his "mantle" over him. This might seem weird to us but this was a very symbolic act during that time. It signified a type of "adoption" into that person's care and responsibility. Essentially, "I am taking you under my wing."

Immediately after this, the two of them sit down and begin to negotiate the terms of Elisha's contract. After all, if Elisha was going to become a prophet like Elijah, he needed to fully understand the benefits package and 401K. No?

No, Elisha immediately drops everything to follow Elijah. He has no details about what to expect but only knew that God is calling him. (Much like Matthew 19:18-20.)

There are reasons why God doesn't give us all the details. Perhaps we can't handle it, we can't understand, or we'd mess it up.

We like having "all" the information because it gives us a sense of control. But knowing too much in advance can cause overwhelming stress and anxiety, often resulting in us giving up before even trying.



Read Proverbs 3:5-6.

⁵ Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own understanding; ⁶ in all your ways know him, and he will make your paths straight.

Is there an idea or action you feel God calling you to pursue?

What would be the first step to pursuing that calling?



Now, pray for God to give you the courage to both step out in faith and take that first step! Then trust God to lead you into the next step when the time is right.

God Time Day 4: Be Willing to Let Go



Go back again and read 1 Kings 19:21 from Day 2.

After Elijah calls Elisha into service, Elisha throws a big party by cooking his oxen using the yoke and plow as firewood. This was no small act. These were essentially the tools of his trade and his prized possessions. Once Elisha does this, there is no turning back.

For many of us, this seems very unwise. After all, shouldn't Elisha have a backup plan just in case this new occupation doesn't work out? What if he fails at being a prophet? How could he return to being a farmhand if he just destroyed all his tools?

We need to understand something:

The people that God uses the most are
those who hold on to the least.

There are many stories in Scripture of those who struggled to follow God because of fear of losing what they had.

- The Rich Young Ruler in Matthew 19:16-22.
- Parable of the Talents in Matthew 25:14-30.
- The Israelites grumbling throughout Exodus.

Living a life of obedience to God means giving up control. This includes letting go of the “safety nets” we might put into place – just in case God doesn't come through like we expect He should.



We ended Day 3 by talking about what God is calling you to do and having the courage to take the first step in doing it. Today, take some time to reflect on what might be holding you back. Write down the things you are afraid of losing and pray for God to help you trust Him and let go of them.

God Time Day 5: Take a Step Towards the Unbelievable



As we look back at the faithful obedience of Elisha, we might be tempted to think, “But that was way back then in Bible times. Things are different now.” But are things all that different today? No, the journey of obedience always begins with a single step of faith. And conversely, the journey of faith always begins with a single step of obedience.

So, let's put it all together.

What is God calling you to do now? Is there a passion or a need God has laid on your heart? (Note: It doesn't have to be big to be important for God's kingdom.)

Now, what would be the first step towards being obedient to that calling? (Is it a conversation for guidance, or simply saying yes to an opportunity?)



What fears might be preventing you from taking that step?

What will you have to give up or let go of to pursue God's calling? What kind of sacrifices do you need to make? (Material, financial, emotional, expectations, comfort, etc.?)

Look back at the fears you mentioned and the possible sacrifices you will need to make. Consider which is more valuable: living according to God's will and the blessings that come from following Him, or avoiding those fears and holding on to those things you listed.



Spend some time praying about the priorities in your life, and then plan to take that first step today.

3. Starting a new series.

 What do you hope to gain from this series?

LOOK UP:

Question: What does God need from you? Do we often act like we have something to give Him that He needs?

1. Review your notes from the Gathering Time (Sermon).
2. **Context:** The prophet Elijah's reign is coming to an end, and he chooses a successor. He comes upon Elisha, a farmer. (Note: 12 yoke of oxen is like the John Deere 9R 540 Tractor of his day.) Elijah puts his cloak on Elisha, symbolizing – "you're going to be me one day, so let's get busy" – like "follow me and I will make you a fisher of men." Elisha says goodbye to family and friends and in doing so, sacrifices and cooks the oxen. Like Cortez burning his ships, he's all in – "Elisha has left the building."
3. **Discussion:** Read 1 Kings 19:19-21.
 - Based on what he has, how he acts, and what he does, and without speculating too much, come up with a profile of Elisha pre-prophet. (Do you think he was well-off? Well-liked? Hard-working? Etc.)

- When Elijah put his cloak around him, how much knowledge and understanding of his future do you think Elisha had?
 - Whether the answer is a little or a lot, how much did Elisha give up (sacrifice) to pursue that future?
 - How much of his soon-to-be past life did he hold on to?
 - How did he prepare to pursue his new future?
- In light of this, explain this statement:

To serve God the most, it's not what you have, it's what you don't hold on to.
- How is this counterintuitive to the world?

LOOK FORWARD: Application

Point: *To serve God the most, it's not what you have, it's what you don't hold on to.*

At the end of our "Who Are You?" series we asked four questions:

- What need are you called to meet?
 - What hurt are you called to heal?
 - What's the first thing you will do?

This week we will follow up those questions with these:

- Well, what are you waiting for?

- What's holding you back? (What is your 9R 540 Tractor?)

- What do you need to let go of?



Family Time

Main Idea:

Obeying God



Key Verse: 1 Kings 19:19-21

¹⁹ Elijah left there and found Elisha son of Shaphat as he was plowing. Twelve teams of oxen were in front of him, and he was with the twelfth team. Elijah walked by him and threw his mantle over him. ²⁰ Elisha left the oxen, ran to follow Elijah, and said, “Please let me kiss my father and mother, and then I will follow you.”

“Go on back,” he replied, “for what have I done to you?”

²¹ So he turned back from following him, took the team of oxen, and slaughtered them. With the oxen’s wooden yoke and plow, he cooked the meat and gave it to the people, and they ate. Then he left, followed Elijah, and served him.

Ask:

What are some rules or chores you are expected to do?

What happens if you don’t do what we want you to do?

What if your punishment was to smell fish for a full day?



Discuss:

That was the punishment for the man named Jonah. God wanted Jonah to go to a big city named Nineveh. The people there did not know about God and were not following God’s ways. In fact, they were not nice at all. They were very bad! God wanted Jonah to tell the people to stop being bad.

What do you think Jonah did? Did he go to Nineveh?

What happened to Jonah when he took a boat the opposite way from Nineveh?

Jonah chose to disobey God and ended up in the belly of a giant fish. While he was inside the fish, Jonah prayed and told God he was sorry. After three days and three nights, the big fish spit Jonah out, and Jonah went to Nineveh.

Why do you think we should obey God?

In the verses we read from 1 Kings, did Elisha obey God? What was the difference between what Elisha did and what Jonah did? (He obeyed)

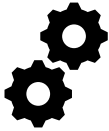
God wants us to be loving by obeying Him because he made us and knows what is best for our lives.



Pray:

Thank you God for showing us how important it is to obey. You want good things for us, and we need to obey you because you know us best. Thank you for caring for us. In Jesus’ name, amen.





Gear Up: Faithful Activity

We all have needs in this life. Food, shelter, provision, and safety would rank high on the list. Sometimes our need is that a lack be filled. Other

times, we may need something to be removed. Either way, our greatest need can become a blessing when it drives us to depend on God. We see this in a story involving Elisha.

Our Greatest Need Becomes a Blessing When It Drives Us to Depend on God

Three kings join together to wage war with the King of Moab who had rebelled against the King of Israel, not paying the tribute he owed.

Read 2 Kings 3:9-12

⁹So the king of Israel, the king of Judah, and the king of Edom set out. After they had traveled their indirect route for seven days, they had no water for the army or the animals with them. ¹⁰Then the king of Israel said, “Oh no, the Lord has summoned these three kings, only to hand them over to Moab.” ¹¹But Jehoshaphat said, “Isn’t there a prophet of the Lord here? Let’s inquire of the Lord through him.” One of the servants of the king of Israel answered, “Elisha son of Shaphat who used to pour water on Elijah’s hands, is here.” ¹²Jehoshaphat affirmed, “The word of the Lord is with him.” So the king of Israel and Jehoshaphat and the king of Edom went to him.

Israel, Judah, and Edom had a need: water! Though the Kings of Israel and Edom were far from God, the King of Judah at least asked about a prophet of God. Though these men may have turned to God for selfish reasons, they turned to Him nonetheless.

When Elisha arrived, he told the King of Israel to go to the prophets of his parents— meaning the prophets of the false god, Baal. Elisha only agrees to help the kings because of Jehoshaphat.

Read 2 Kings 3:15b-19 (NIV)

^{11b}...the hand of the Lord came on Elisha ¹⁶and he said, “This is what the Lord says: I will fill this valley with pools of water. ¹⁷For this is what the Lord says: You will see neither wind nor rain, yet this valley will be filled with water, and you, your cattle and your other animals will drink. ¹⁸This is an easy thing in the eyes of the Lord; he will also deliver Moab into your hands. ¹⁹You will overthrow every fortified city and every major town. You will cut down every good tree, stop up all the springs, and ruin every good field with stones.” The next morning, about the time for offering the sacrifice, there it was—water flowing from the direction of Edom! And the land was filled with water.

Only God Can Send the Water, But...

You may have some work to do. When we turn to God in faith, we still have responsibility to do our part. For example, in the story of these warring kings, only God could send the water. Yet, the three allied kings still had work to do... they had to overthrow the cities and towns and more in order to win this war.

Real Faith Believes Big, But Is Willing to Start Small

A persevering faith will be an active faith— that is, a faith that expresses itself in faithful activity. Our faith should be big because we have a big God, worthy of all of our trust! He can do abundantly more than we can ask or imagine! But our faith should also be willing to start small. Before these kings could win this war, they needed to first turn to God. Then, they needed to obey. What small step of active obedience is God asking you to take? Step out in faithful activity today!

God Time Day 1: Seeing a “Mean” God When in Need

This week we will see how God works through a seemingly impossible situation to reveal Himself. Three allied kings have set out to attack the land of Moab who has rebelled against the king of Israel. On their journey, they marched far into the desert and ran out of water. In our God Time Days 1 & 2 we will find a major contrast between how the kings of Israel and Judah see the situation.



Read 2 Kings 3:10.

Then the king of Israel said, “Oh no, the Lord has summoned these three kings, only to hand them over to Moab.”

Because he does not trust God, the king of Israel sees a hopeless situation. He assumes all is lost and that God either caused the impending disaster or is powerless to help.

When you face a seemingly impossible situation, what does your attitude say about your trust in God?

God Time Day 2: Seeing a Good God When in Need

Unlike the unbelieving king of Israel from Day 1, Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, doesn’t start with the assumption that God is hostile. Instead, he focuses on seeking guidance from the Lord.



Read 2 Kings 3:11.

But Jehoshaphat said, “Isn’t there a prophet of the Lord here? Let’s inquire of the Lord through him.”

Instead of assuming the worst and giving up hope, Jehoshaphat believes God can at least bring clarity to this seemingly impossible situation. He doesn’t waste energy blaming but seeks God’s intention.

What challenge are you facing where you need to stop blaming and start seeking God’s guidance for clarity?

God Time Day 3: When God Speaks

Even after the kings send for the prophet Elisha, the unbelief of the king of Israel prevents him from being able to hear from God. Only because of the faith of the king of Judah does Elisha even agree to seek God’s answer to their situation. When the answer comes, it makes clear that God can do more than they even imagine.



Read 2 Kings 3:16-19 (CEV).

¹⁶ *The Lord says that this dry riverbed will be filled with water.*

¹⁷ *You won’t feel any wind or see any rain, but there will be plenty of water for you and your animals.* ¹⁸ *That simple thing isn’t all the Lord is going to do. He will also help you defeat Moab’s army.*

¹⁹ *You will capture all their walled cities and important towns. You will chop down every good tree and stop up every spring of water, then ruin their fertile fields by covering them with rocks.*

The prophet’s words make clear that rescuing the allied armies from dying of thirst in the desert is just a simple thing for God – even though the unbelievers had given up hope.

Underline what else God says He will also do. (v.18)

Compare that to what the king of Israel believed in verse 10 on Day 1 (and v. 13).

How does this promise from God reframe the planned attack on Moab?

Whenever God speaks, it always results in one of two possible responses:

- 1) We obey and open our hearts to His goodness.
- 2) We refuse to listen and harden our hearts against Him.



In the challenge you are facing right now, how are you responding to what God says about it? Are you moving forward in faith and obedience or stubbornly holding on to self-determination?

God Time Day 4: Riding on God's Coattails



The account in 2 Kings is far from the only one in the Bible where God opens a miraculous path forward and His people follow along in His wake.

Here are some other well-known examples:

- The Israelites crossing the Red Sea (Exodus 14:10-31)
- The conquest of Jericho once the walls fell (Joshua 6)
- The defeat of Midian which began with the enemy fighting themselves (Judges 7)
- Throwing the Philistine army into confusion with a thunderstorm (1 Samuel 7)

This pattern of “God acts, and His people follow” is so frequent in both biblical history and church history that many regard this as a rule of faith: “Find where God is working and join Him.” Only when we join what God is already doing will we see great and lasting victories.

Living this faith rule begins with how we look at the world around us. Review the contrast between the kings of Israel and Judah on Days 1 & 2. Only one sought an answer from God regarding their impossible situation. One looked at his circumstances and became a victim, while the other looked to God for a solution.

As you look at the state of our world, it would be easy to feel hopeless – that it's impossible to make any significant difference. But that is not the way of faith!



Take some time and consider where you see God at work around you. Describe one way that you can align yourself with how you see God working:

Commit to pursuing what you see as your ministry, pouring fuel on God's fire. (Journal the results. This is important.)

God Time Day 5 – Believe Big, Start Small



In this week's lesson (2 Kings 3:9-20), God's provision first becomes visible right about the time of the morning sacrifice. In yet another battle involving King Jehoshaphat, God brought about a victory to the sound of the people singing God's praises. The full account is in 2 Chronicles 20:15-22, below are some highlights.



Read 2 Chronicles 20:15b,17, 21-22 (NIV)

¹⁵ *This is what the Lord says to you: 'Do not be afraid or discouraged because of this vast army. For the battle is not yours, but God's. ¹⁷ You will not have to fight this battle. Take up your positions; stand firm and see the deliverance the Lord will give you, Judah and Jerusalem. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged. Go out to face them tomorrow, and the Lord will be with you.'*

²¹ *After consulting the people, Jehoshaphat appointed men to sing to the Lord and to praise him for the splendor of his holiness as they went out at the head of the army, saying:*

"Give thanks to the Lord, for his love endures forever."

²² *As they began to sing and praise, the Lord set ambushes against the men of Ammon and Moab and Mount Seir who were invading Judah, and they were defeated.*

Once the battle was over, there was so much plunder that it took the people three whole days to carry it away (v.25). But this great victory began with a fear of the enemy and a plea to God to act. Each step of the way, as the people trusted God's word, they experienced increasing levels of confidence and victory as they obeyed and gave praise.



It may be very difficult at first, but in what ways can you offer praises to God regarding the challenge you are facing?

While it may seem like a small step, how has your attitude towards the challenge and your faith been affected by the decision to give God praise in this situation?

Group Time

Question: "Because I said so" is a statement every parent knows well. What are you really asking for by using it?

2. Review your notes from the Gathering Time (Sermon).

3. **Context:** In 2 Kings, chapter 3, the Moabites have been living under Israel's rule and now decide to rebel. So, the king of Israel recruits the kings of Judah and Edom to join him in quashing the rebellion. They set out with their armies and after seven days, they run into a drought. About to die of thirst, they decide, "Hey let's see if we can get a prophet of God on our side to solve this." They retrieve Elisha. God acknowledges their recognition of a need and solves the problem.

4. **Discussion:** Read 2 Kings 3:9-20.

- Do you, or does someone you know, have a "had to hit bottom before giving their life to the Lord" story? Share it with the group.

- Do you, or does someone you know, have a "had to hit bottom before coming back to the Lord" story? Share it with the group.
- Do you, or someone you know, have a "didn't know what else to do before getting on board with God" story? Share it with the group.

Verse 16 is very different depending on the Bible version you are using. Some say God will fill the valley with pools of water, and others say God commanded them to dig ditches to hold the water that he would fill the valley with. Either way:

- Reread verse 17. How was the water going to be provided?
- Reread verse 18. Who was going to cause the defeat of Moab?
- Reread verse 19. Yet, who would still have to fight the battles?



LOOK FORWARD: Application

Point: *God wants our relationship with Him to be teamwork. When we show Him our faith, He shows us His faithfulness.*

What step of faith is God asking you to take this week – because He said so?

Examples:

- Get some education or training.
- Improve a relationship.
- Be an example for your children.
- Sacrificially give of your time, talent, and/or treasure.
- Stop living as an island.

Think BIG but start small and keep stepping.

Family Time



Main Idea:

A Faith That Works.



Key Verse: 2 Kings 2:12-15

¹² As Elisha watched, he kept crying out, “My father, my father, the chariots and horsemen of Israel!”

When he could see him no longer, he took hold of his own clothes, tore them in two, ¹³ picked up the mantle that had fallen off Elijah, and went back and stood on the bank of the Jordan. ¹⁴ He took the mantle Elijah had dropped, and he struck the water. “Where is the Lord God of Elijah?” he asked. He struck the water himself, and it parted to the right and the left, and Elisha crossed over.

¹⁵ When the sons of the prophets from Jericho who were observing saw him, they said, “The spirit of Elijah rests on Elisha.” They came to meet him and bowed down to the ground in front of him.

Set it up:

Before family devotion, look through the closets in your home to see if you can find any “hand-me-down” clothes, or clothing that belonged to one member of the family and now belongs to a different member. Gather a few pieces of clothing like this and bring them with you. Then ask the family to identify who the owner is of each piece of clothing. Explain that this might be a difficult question because the clothing has been worn by multiple people and passed from one to another. Transition to today’s part of the story. Explain that in the story, too, we will see a piece of hand-me-down clothing. In this case, though, the clothing represented something far greater than the person who owned it.



Explain:

Elijah had gone up to heaven, but he had left behind a piece of clothing. His mantle, which was a kind of cloak, had fallen off, and this was a sign to Elisha. Elisha had asked for a double share of the spirit of Elijah, knowing he would need the power and presence of God if he were to be the next prophet. As a symbol of the transition, the mantle was left behind and then passed to Elisha who put it on.

Like Elisha, when we choose to follow Jesus we receive a new mantle, the Holy Spirit. We must have God’s spirit in us if we are to accomplish anything worthwhile for God. And God does not withhold any of His Spirit; we have total access to God’s Spirit. For us as Believers, the question is not whether we have the Spirit (we do); it’s whether we are going to obey God by surrendering to the influence of the Spirit in our lives.



Questions:

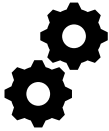

Gear Up: Faithful Offering

The average American often feels overwhelmed by life. Maybe you can relate? Sometimes we feel like we just don't have enough money, time, health, peace and so we are left feeling anxious and troubled. There is a story of how God used the prophet Elijah to provide for a widow that may offer us some encouragement today.

Read 2 Kings 4:1

One of the wives of the sons of the prophets cried out to Elisha, "Your servant, my husband, has died. You know that your servant feared the LORD. Now the creditor is coming to take my two children as his slaves."

The widow in this story was suffering extreme hardship! In Old Testament times, there weren't many options for a widow. She had no one to provide for her and since she owed money, the creditor was coming to take her children as slaves. She went to Elisha for help, since he had been her husband's teacher. What happens next is a miraculous event that teaches us to offer God our trust because He is who we really need.

God is Who We Really Need

Read 2 Kings 4:2

Elisha asked her, "What can I do for you? Tell me, what do you have in the house?" She said, "Your servant has nothing in the house except a jar of oil."

The widow was facing a desperate need— basically a life or death situation. She trusted that Elisha could help. He began by asking her what she had in her house. He knew that God is who she really needed and that He was able to help her. Like in her situation, God is who we really need when desperate times arise.

Stop Waiting and Start Working

So, what do we do when we find ourselves overwhelmed by struggles? Like the widow who offered up the only jar of oil she had, we can stop waiting for the things we want to land in our laps and instead start working with our mustard seed of faith (Matthew 17:20-21). In other words, we trust in God's ability to do the miraculous in our desperate need.

Offer God What You Have; Trust Him to Provide

Read 2 Kings 4:3-7

³Then he [Elisha] said, "Go out and borrow empty containers from all your neighbors. Do not get just a few."⁴Then go in and shut the door behind you and your sons, and pour oil into all these containers. Set the full ones to one side."⁵So she left. After she had shut the door behind her and her sons, they kept bringing her containers, and she kept pouring.⁶When they were full, she said to her son, "Bring me another container." But he replied, "There aren't any more." Then the oil stopped.⁷She went and told the man of God, and he said, "Go sell the oil and pay your debt; you and your sons can live on the rest."

When we offer God all we have, we must then trust Him to give us exactly what we need. This oil would have provided for her family. Now that she had so much, she could sell the oil to pay her debts. God provided what she needed, and He will do the same for us. When we face overwhelm and struggle, we must remember to offer Him all we have and trust that He will provide just what we need! What will you offer? And how will you trust Him today?

Dwell on 2 Corinthians 4:7 (NIV)

But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us.

God Time Day 1: Hope for the Hopeless



Read 2 Kings 4:1.

One of the wives of the sons of the prophets cried out to Elisha, "Your servant, my husband, has died. You know that your servant feared the LORD. Now the creditor is coming to take my two children as his slaves."



This widow (whose husband had been a prophet under Elisha) was in a hopeless situation. Rewrite verse 1 in your own words:

In that time, without someone to help her, this widow could have lost everything – *everything*. She went to her husband's teacher, Elisha, who she knew looked out for his students' wellbeing.

Everyone goes somewhere when they feel hopeless. Where do you go?

God Time Day 2: God Is What You Really Need



Read 2 Kings 4:2.

Elisha asked her, "What can I do for you? Tell me, what do you have in the house?" She said, "Your servant has nothing in the house except a jar of oil."

Elisha asked the woman how he could help and then asked what she had in her house. Underline her answer.

Imagine, the woman's husband has died, she has no means of income, and her children are about to be taken away! She has absolutely nothing of value in her home except a jar of oil. She is desperate; she needs God's help.

God is always what we really need. How have you seen this in your life or in the life of someone you know?

Share this with someone today.

God Time Day 3: Stop Waiting and Start Working



Sometimes, we get so busy looking ahead to all the things we want, that we forget about what's right in front of us – all the blessings that God has given us in the here and now.



Reread 2 Kings 4:2.

Elisha asked her, "What can I do for you? Tell me, what do you have in the house?" She said, "Your servant has nothing in the house except a jar of oil."

The woman only had a small jar (or flask) of oil in her home. She needed a solution to her problem but probably never imagined what would happen next. Even though she had so little, Elisha knew that it wasn't too little for God to work with! As we will see, God would use Elisha to work a miracle with this jar of oil.

God supplied her with what she needed and would use it in the way He wanted to solve her dilemma. Likewise, God has supplied us with what we need so that we can do the things He wants us to do – the things He will empower us to do! (Remember: We don't work to earn anything, or so that God will do things for us, but we obey because we love and worship the Lord.)



Read Ephesians 2:10.

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared ahead of time for us to do.

God has called you to good works. Identify one thing that you can do in obedience to God:



Now, make plans to do it. (E.g., worship Him, help a friend, pray, visit a neighbor, etc.)

God Time Day 4: Offer God What You Have



Read 2 Kings 4:3-7.

³Then he [Elisha] said, "Go out and borrow empty containers from all your neighbors. Do not get just a few." ⁴Then go in and shut the door behind you and your sons, and pour oil into all these containers. Set the full ones to one side." ⁵So she left. After she had shut the door behind her and her sons, they kept bringing her containers, and she kept pouring. ⁶When they were full, she said to her son, "Bring me another container." But he replied, "There aren't any more." Then the oil stopped. ⁷She went and told the man of God, and he said, "Go sell the oil and pay your debt; you and your sons can live on the rest."

Underline what Elisha told the widow in verses 3 and 4.

The widow did just what Elisha told her to do (verse 5), and she poured that oil into jar after jar! It was only when she ran out of jars (verse 6) that the oil stopped flowing.



What was the conclusion in verse 7?

Charles Spurgeon was a famous preacher who lived long ago. He said, "If she borrowed few vessels, she would have but little oil; if she borrowed many vessels they should all be filled, and she should have much oil. We make our blessings little, because our prayers are little."

How would you explain this quote to a friend?



One thing that builds our faith is looking back at all the times God has been faithful to us. In another notebook, journal about a few times when you have noticed God's faithfulness. Thank Him for those times.

God Time Day 5: Trust God to Give What You Need



Read 2 Corinthians 4:7 (NIV).

But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us.

God is who we really need. What a wonderful treasure to be filled with! Sometimes (often?) we take Him for granted.

Regardless of where we find ourselves today, we can know that yes, He is all we need. Because of His kind generosity, He will meet our other needs, too.



Read Luke 12:27-31.

²⁷Consider how the wildflowers grow: They don't labor or spin thread. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendor was adorned like one of these. ²⁸If that's how God clothes the grass, which is in the field today and is thrown into the furnace tomorrow, how much more will he do for you—you of little faith? ²⁹Don't strive for what you should eat and what you should drink, and don't be anxious. ³⁰For the Gentile world eagerly seeks all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. ³¹But seek his kingdom, and these things will be provided for you.

Underline what we should not strive for and what not to be (verse 29).

God will meet our needs; He promises to. Though sometimes we can't understand His plan, He knows what we need in both time and eternity.

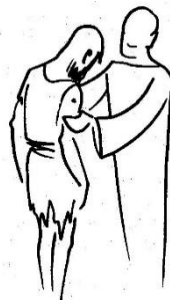

1. Review your notes from the Gathering Time (Sermon).
2. **Context:** In 2 Kings, chapter 4, we come to the story of *The Widow's Oil Multiplied*. The woman's husband has died; she's now a widow with no means of income. As such, the "creditors" are coming to take her children. They must owe money, perhaps living paycheck-to-paycheck, and have no possessions of value. It was common practice to put family members in debtors' prisons, a practice that continued into the mid-19th century. Thankfully, through Elisha, God multiplies her one valued possession, a jar of oil, to relieve her debt.

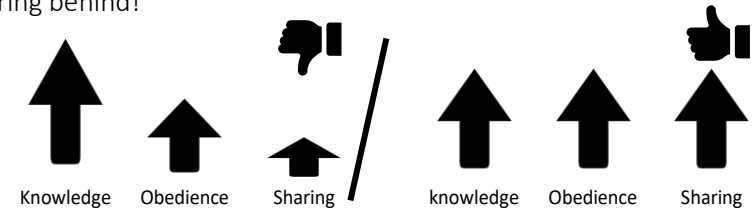
When we offer God what we have, He will multiply what we need to advance His kingdom. God loves to do big things with what we see as little. Don't fill your life with so much junk that you miss what God offers.

Family Time

Main Idea: God's Care



Key Verse: 2 Kings 4:6-7

⁶ When they were full, she said to her son, "Bring me another container. But he replied, "There aren't any more." Then the oil stopped. ⁷ She went and told the man of God, and he said, "Go sell the oil and pay your debt; you and your sons can live on the rest."

Get ready:

You will need a pitcher with very little water in it, a second pitcher full, and enough cups for everyone in the family to have one.



Say:

The Bible talks about a woman whose husband had died, and now people were coming to collect money he owed them. In Bible times, someone who owed money might have to pay by giving up a child to be a slave or a servant! The woman had sons, and she was afraid that the people who wanted her to pay the debt would take her sons. The woman told her problems to a man of God named Elisha.

God wanted Elisha to help the woman so she wouldn't lose her sons, but the woman had just a little oil. **Hold up the pitcher with just a tiny bit of water in it to show the family the water.** Elisha told her to ask her neighbors for empty jars, as many jars as she could find.

Have one child pass out the cups to everyone in the family. While this is happening switch the pitchers to a full pitcher of water.

Elisha told her to pour the little oil she had into the jars. She did that and the jars filled with oil. She kept saying bring me another one, and she kept pouring oil into all the jars she had gathered until each one was full.

Have everyone from the family bring their cup up to you and fill it with water from the full pitcher. Say, "Each jar became full of oil until every jar was filled because God took the little bit of oil and turned it into lots of oil. It was a miracle! Then Elisha told her to sell the jars of oil and pay off her debts. The woman and her sons would be okay."



Ask:

What would you be thinking or feeling if you were the woman or one of her sons?

How does God show He cares for you?

God sent Elisha to show the woman that He cared for her and her sons. God performed a miracle to provide for the woman and her sons, a miracle of lots of oil. The woman sold the oil and was able to pay her husband's debts. She and her sons would be okay. Don't we have an amazing God?

Pray:



Dear God, you truly are amazing. You cared for the woman and her sons in such a surprising way. You care for me, too, in amazing ways. Thanks so much for your love and care. In Jesus' name, amen.



Gear Up: Faithful Recovery

Our God is the God who restores. If you have been a Christian very long, you know there are ups and downs in this walk of faith. Sometimes, we lose a little spiritual fervor due to grief, illness, stress, and good old-fashioned hurt. Thankfully, we don't have to stay in those spiritual lows. We can reach out to God as He pulls us up. He cares about every detail of our lives, and He knows how to help!

God Cares About Every Detail of Our Lives

Read 2 Kings 6:1-4

¹The sons of the prophets said to Elisha, "Please notice that the place where we live under your supervision is too small for us.

²Please let us go to the Jordan where we can each get a log and can build ourselves a place to live there." "Go," he said. ³Then one said, "Please come with your servants." "I'll come," he answered.

⁴So he went with them, and when they came to the Jordan, they cut down trees.

In this story, one of Elisha's students asks his permission to build a larger place for the students (or sons of the prophets) to live. Elisha agrees and goes along. What happens next is a miracle.

Read 2 Kings 6:5-7

⁵As one of them was cutting down a tree, the iron ax head fell into the water, and he cried out, "Oh, my master, it was borrowed!" ⁶Then the man of God asked, "Where did it fall?" When he showed him the place, the man of God cut a piece of wood, threw it there, and made the iron float. ⁷Then he said, "Pick it up." So he reached out and took it.

When this student lost the axe head in the water, it was a serious situation. Since it was borrowed, he likely couldn't afford to replace it. By performing this miracle that caused the iron axe head to float, Elisha helped him avoid a major debt and possibly worse. God cared about this detail, and He cares about our details, too!

God Knows How to Help Us Find What We Didn't Mean to Lose

God is in the business of restoration. We see it all throughout the Bible. And that's what this miracle is about: God cares about the details, knows our needs, and is gracious enough to restore us. Like the axe head, no one wants to lose spiritual fervor. For example, no one wants to go from praying passionately to struggling to bless a meal. But when we find that we are in a spiritual low like that, we can talk to God and trust that He will help us recover what we never meant to lose in the first place.

But does that mean we have no responsibility? Not at all. We need to first ask ourselves, do we really want it back? (Because, let's be honest, sometimes we are content in a spiritual low, and we don't want to invest in our relationship with Him. If we find ourselves there we need to confess to Him and pray!) And second, we have to turn to Him and trust Him. This is like how Elisha told the student to reach out and pick up the axe head.

We have responsibility in the work of faithful recovery. Perhaps we need to stop doing something that gets in the way of our spiritual fervor, or maybe we need to start doing something that will build it. For example, if we're participating in an activity we shouldn't, we need to stop. If we haven't picked up our Bibles in several months, we need to start. As we submit to God, we will find Him restoring us.

Yes, God is faithful to restore us when we repent and turn to Him. Revelation 2:4-5 and Deuteronomy 30:2-4 also warn of the seriousness of abandoning "the love [we] had at first" and tell us that God helps us recover what we never meant to lose. He is the God who restores!

God Time Day 1: Have You Lost Fervor?



If you've been a Christian for very long, you know that our spiritual journeys can sometimes resemble a roller coaster with lots of ups, downs, twists, and turns. Some of those downs can be times when we have lost spiritual fervor.



Read Romans 12:11 (NIV).

Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord.

God tells us to *"never be lacking in zeal."* Zeal can be defined as great energy or enthusiasm. More than a feeling, this fervor serves God.

God Time Day 2: God Cares About the Details



Read Matthew 10:29-31 (NLT).

²⁹*What is the price of two sparrows—one copper coin? But not a single sparrow can fall to the ground without your Father knowing it.* ³⁰*And the very hairs on your head are all numbered.* ³¹*So don't be afraid; you are more valuable to God than a whole flock of sparrows.*

Underline what doesn't escape the Father's notice (v. 29) and what He numbers (v. 30).



God cares about the details. This means that there is no burden too small to bring to Him in prayer. He cares about our every concern. Don't worry that you might "bother God" with your little concerns. Make a list of some of them and praise God for caring about the details of your life!

God Time Day 3: God Knows How to Help You...

Read 2 Kings 6:1-4.

¹*The sons of the prophets said to Elisha, "Please notice that the place where we live under your supervision is too small for us.*

²*Please let us go to the Jordan where we can each get a log and can build ourselves a place to live there."* *"Go," he said.* ³*Then one said, "Please come with your servants."* *"I'll come," he answered.* ⁴*So he went with them, and when they came to the Jordan, they cut down trees.*

The *"sons of the prophets"* were a guild of prophets who collected under a headmaster to study, praise, and worship. (The widow's husband from last week was one of these men. Elisha did not teach men how to prophesy – only God could create a prophet.)



Rewrite in your own words the problem this group of prophets had and what the solution was.



Read 2 Kings 6:5-7.

⁵*As one of them was cutting down a tree, the iron ax head fell into the water, and he cried out, "Oh, my master, it was borrowed!"* ⁶*Then the man of God asked, "Where did it fall?"* *When he showed him the place, the man of God cut a piece of wood, threw it there, and made the iron float.* ⁷*Then he said, "Pick it up." So he reached out and took it.*

Underline anything that stands out to you.

As we talked about yesterday, God cares about the details. We could look at this story and let Elisha steal our focus; he performed a really cool miracle! But ultimately, God was the one who manipulated the axe head's weight or the water's density—all because the axe head was borrowed, and the borrower would be in great trouble for losing it.

Look at your list from Day 2. Spend time praying about those little concerns. God knows how to help!

God Time Day 4: Growing the Fervor



Praying shows that we trust God. It's important to trust Him with both the little and the big things. This is one way we exhibit zeal and spiritual fervor. When we don't go to Him, we are relying on ourselves, other people, or things to meet our needs. Remember the first commandment?



Reread 2 Kings 6:1-4 from Day 4.

Elisha helped someone he cared about, and God worked a miracle. Sure, God brought the opportunity, but Elisha had to be obedient. We could call this true spiritual zeal.

But what do we do when we realize we've lost zeal or need more fervor? We position ourselves to get it back! But first, we need to ask ourselves two questions:

1. **Do I want my spiritual fervor back? OR Do I want more spiritual fervor?** It's easy to say yes, but it's harder to do something about it. Spiritual fervor takes effort.
2. **Will I let God help me?** Again, it's easy to agree to help. It's harder to accept it and then follow God's lead in developing spiritual disciplines like prayer, Bible study, and making godly decisions.



Take some time and journal your answers to the above questions. Don't try to find solutions yet; just try to answer honestly. Look at the rating you gave yourself on Day 1 and keep it in mind while you answer the questions.



Read Jesus' words in John 15:10-11.

¹⁰If you keep my commands you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commands and remain in his love. ¹¹I have told you these things so that my joy may be in you and your joy may be complete.

Keeping God's commands fill us with joy. Yes, obedience is one way to grow fervor!

God Time Day 5: Don't Lose Your First Love

Read Revelation 2:4-5.

⁴But I have this against you: You have abandoned the love you had at first. ⁵Remember then how far you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. Otherwise, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place, unless you repent.

The prophetic words above are spoken by Jesus to the church at Ephesus.

Underline what He has against them. (Verse 4)



Circle what He wants them to do (verse 5).

Verse 4 tells us that the church had abandoned the love they had at the beginning. What do you think this means?

Some scholars say that verse 4 means that the church stopped loving Jesus as much as they did at first. Others say it means they stopped loving one another. Others say that it means they stopped loving mankind at large. And guess what? Others say that it means all three. There's good reason to think the last option is right. If we love Jesus less, it only follows that our love for those inside and outside the church will also dwindle.

There is a solution! It involves the three easy steps found in verse 5:

Remember, Repent, and Do.

Love for the Lord (and His people) go hand-in-hand with obedience, and that grows fervor.



Ask God to show you what "solution" you need to follow up on. Do you need to remember, repent, or do?

(Loving God fervently will be demonstrated through our praying, worshiping, praising, reading our Bibles, fasting, serving, giving, sharing, connecting, helping, encouraging, and more.)

Remember what we've learned from Elisha: a faith that is committed, active, trustful, and fervent is a faith that perseveres!

Again, God solves the problem through Elisha. Via a miracle, the axe head floats to the surface where the student can grab it. All is well – back to building!

- Read Deuteronomy 30:2-4.

Main Idea:

Lost and Found



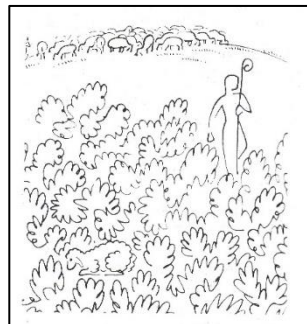
Key Verse: Luke 15:4-7

⁴ “What man among you, who has a hundred sheep and loses one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the open field and go after the lost one until he finds it? ⁵ When he has found it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders, ⁶ and coming home, he calls his friends and neighbors together, saying to them, ‘Rejoice with me, because I have found my lost sheep!’ ⁷ I tell you, in the same way, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who don’t need repentance.”

Set it up:

Before family devotion, gather paper, pens, and colored pencils or crayons. Ask the family to imagine that they have a pet who is lost, or if you have a pet, ask them to imagine that your pet is lost. Then ask them to create a poster you might hang up in the neighborhood to find him or her. Explain that in the next part of the story, you will hear Jesus tell a story about something that was lost, then found, then celebrated.

Read: Luke 15:4-7 above.



Explain:

In Jesus’ story, one of the sheep was lost. Perhaps the man who owned the sheep might have thought, I still have 99 sheep; it’s not that big of a deal that I’ve lost one. But that would not be the attitude of a Good Shepherd. And the shepherd in Jesus’ story was a good one. This shepherd set out to find the one sheep rather than waiting and hoping the sheep would come home. And when he found him, the shepherd threw the sheep on his back and carried him home. And if that wasn’t enough, he threw a huge celebration when the sheep was returned.

The point of Jesus’ story was to show us just how intent God is on rescuing people. He did not wait for people to come to Him but instead sent His own Son, the Good Shepherd, to seek out those who were lost and bring them home. Jesus is still seeking sinners out, and every time He brings one back into the right relationship with God, there is a huge heavenly celebration. This is how much God values each person. This is how much each person matters.

Reflect:

1. Summarize Jesus’ story in your own words.
2. Why do you think Jesus told this story?
3. What does this story teach us about God?

Pray:

You are calling us, Lord Jesus, to follow you. Help us not to look back at what we leave behind but instead, keep our eyes fixed on you.

The 3-Step “1-on-1 Encouragement” Process

Let us hold on to the confession of our hope without wavering, since he who promised is faithful. And let us consider one another in order to provoke love and good works, not neglecting to gather together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging each other, and all the more as you see the day approaching.

Hebrews 10:23-25

1. Partner-up: Partners should be of the same gender. If there is an odd number three is okay but work swiftly.
2. Partners ask each other these five questions:

	1) Did you spend specific personal time in the BIBLE <u>each day</u> this past week?	These are “Yes” or “No” questions.
	2) Did you spend specific time in PRAYER <u>each day</u> this past week – not just for meals?	Any hesitations or “Well...” responses are circled “No.”
	3) Did you do something specific to show Godly LOVE to someone this past week?	• If so, the partner briefly shares the encounter(s) with their partner and, on the provided line, writes the name(s) of the person(s) they showed love to, shared the gospel with, or discipled. • If not, leave the line blank.
	4) Did you intentionally share the GOSPEL with anyone this past week?	
	5) Did you DISCIPLE anyone this past week? (Ex: Sharing with others from any of the Gathering, God, Group, or Family Times)	

3. Each partner prays for the other: No matter how or what the partner has done over the past week, this is an intentional prayer of **encouragement** for the coming week!
