"Coming Clean"

Growth Group Discussion Guide Psalm 51

Intro questions

- Share about a time, during your childhood, when you were "caught red-handed." How did you respond to being caught in something wrong?
- Today's discussion deals with confessing our sin. Take a moment to <u>pray</u>, asking for God's Spirit to lead your discussion.

1. Review 2 Samuel 12:7-14, then discuss the following.

- What made Nathan's confrontation of David effective?
- How do you think David handled being confronted in this instance?
- What do you think of God's response—through Nathan—to David's confession?
- How do you feel about the prospect of confessing your sin to God? To another person?

2. Read Psalm 51:1-12, then discuss the following.

- How would you summarize David's pleas to God? What is he asking for?
- What is the basis (grounds for) David's cry for mercy?
- Could you earnestly say what David says in v. 3? Why or why not?
- Pastor Josh said on Sunday that an essential part of confession is <u>agreeing with God about our sin</u>. How do you see this principle in David's prayer (Psalm 51)?
- That agreement includes acknowledging the following four aspects. (See discussion prompts below).
 - We have real, objective guilt.
 - Our sin is not a fluke; it reflects our heart.
 - Our sin is first and foremost against God.
 - o God would be right to judge and even condemn us.
- Discuss each one of these aspects, using these prompts:
 - o Do you agree that this is a necessary aspect of confession? Why or why not?
 - o How do you feel about this aspect?
 - o What questions does this raise for you?

3. Read Psalm 51:13-19, then discuss the following.

- These verses describe what David will do as a result of God's cleansing of him. What stands out among these actions?
 - o Why might a fallen and forgiven sinner be more effective at these things?
- Pastor Josh said that another essential part of confession is <u>agreeing with God about our cleansing</u>. How do you see this principle in David's prayer?
- That agreement includes acknowledging the following two aspects. (See discussion prompts below).
 - o Agreeing that your cleansing can only happen because of what Jesus did.
 - Agree that you really are clean!
- Discuss:
 - Why is each one of these aspects *theologically* important?
 - What is the *practical* importance of each of these aspects?

- "What other aspects of David's prayer, or the topic confession, jump out at you? Is there some aspect of this topic that you're hoping we will discuss?
- Is there any area of this content that push back against? Please share about that area.

4. Prayer

- Pray for the ability to act on what God has shown you through this study. Today might be a time to invite confession in prayer—perhaps even sub-dividing into gender-based smaller groups, if your group is at this level of vulnerability.
- Pray for one another about any other needs that have been mentioned.
