## **Running for Dear Life**

Growth Group Discussion Guide 1 Samuel 23:13-29, Psalm 57

## **Intro questions**

- When you think of the wilderness (literally—off-the grid, "great-outdoors" wilderness), what sentiment do you have? Is it a place you want to be? Why or why not?
- Take a moment to <u>pray</u>, asking for God's Spirit to lead your discussion.
- Besides the instance in today's sermon, try to think of all the stories you can recall in Scripture, when people spend a long time in "the wilderness" (literally or figuratively). What role does that season play in their life or the lives of their people? (Pastor Josh described "the wilderness" as a season when someone is stuck between point A and point B, in a place they don't want to be, or in a time of painful waiting.)
- **1. Invite anyone who feels comfortable to share about a** *past* **season when they were in** "**the wilderness,**" **figuratively.** How did they survive or thrive during that season? What effect did it have on the trajectory of their life? (*Feel free to spend a good deal of time on this portion of the discussion, if your group members are interested. Knowing this history about each other will bring great relational value).*
- **2.** Do any of you feel that you are in a season of wilderness presently? If so, please share. How are you experiencing this season? How can we support you as you walk through it?

**We'll spend the rest of our time looking at David's prayer in the wilderness, in Psalm 57.** *If you prefer to spend time reviewing the narrative passage in 1 Samuel 23:13-29, feel free to do so. You might discuss it using the "Swedish Method," provided in this week's email.* 

## 3. Read Psalm 57, then discuss the following.

- For anyone who missed the sermon, describe the season of life that David was experiencing. What were his present circumstances?
- What parts of David's prayer are most striking to you?
- What honest emotions does David express to God here?
- What is the difference between taking refuge in some entity such as a cave (in David's case), versus taking refuge in God himself?
  - What other kinds of things tend to be refuges for you?
  - What does it look like to find refuge in God himself?
- Do your prayers contain this kind of raw, honest emotions? Why or why not?
- In v. 3, David describes how God sends his love and faithfulness.
  - Have you ever had an experience when you felt God sending his love and faithfulness especially for you, in your difficult circumstances? How did that experience come about?

- What seems to be David's chief desire here, based on the repeated refrain of vv. 5 and 11?
  - $\circ$  What would this desire look like practically, if it came to fruition?
  - How do you think David arrives at this place, when he is so concerned over the immediate threat?
- Where does the mood of the prayer seem to turn, in your estimation? Why?
- On Sunday, Pastor Josh said, "If you want to experience God's love and faithfulness with you in the wilderness, you need to see him going there for you."
  - How does this work out practically? How can your understanding of the gospel impact the way you experience God in the wilderness?

## 4. Prayer

- Praise God for the gospel, and ask him to make it real to your hearts.
- Pray for one another about the present challenges that have been mentioned.
