Suffering in the World?

This topic is tough because suffering and evil are all around us. When it hits close to home our ideas cease to be merely academic or theoretical. We started this series last week with an explanation of why the Bible is a trustworthy source. This is important because it gives us a solid foundation to address all topics – especially ones that are personal and emotional. In the message notes this week there were a number of passages referenced. Please review the notes and look up those that were not printed in full.

What does it say about God that He doesn't just wipe out the world today and get rid of all suffering? As you think about this keep in mind that the primary source for suffering in the world is human caused. God will close out history one day but until then...

Three Questions This Issue Raises

- 1. Why is there evil and suffering?
 - The world isn't <u>in its original state</u> (Genesis 1 & 2).
 - Suffering and evil have several sources (Genesis 3; Romans 8; James 1; 1 John 5):

Ignorance.

Sin.

The curse.

Satan.

God.

- The primary source is people.
- 2. Why doesn't God eliminate evil and suffering?
 - It would require <u>eliminating us</u> (Isaiah 53:6; Romans 3:23).
 - Or eliminating our <u>dignity</u> (Genesis 1:26-27).
- 3. Why doesn't He do something about it?
 - He has.

⁴ Yet it was our weaknesses he carried; it was our sorrows that weighed him down. And we thought his troubles were a punishment from God for his own sins! ⁵ But he was wounded and crushed for our sins. He was beaten that we might have peace. He was whipped, and we were healed! ⁶ All of us have strayed away like sheep. We have left God's paths to follow our own. Yet the Lord laid on him the guilt and sins of us all.
