They (those who worship Caesar) could surrender their faith in Christ, but for John, this would be to surrender "the crown of life." They could lie about their loyalty to Christ, but John reserved a place in "the fiery lake of burning sulfur" for liars. They could try to change the laws, but this was not possible since Rome was not a democracy and Domitian would never accept a rival "Lord." They could fight the Roman government, but this was not practical. They could "adjust" by confessing Caesar as "god" without meaning it, but John rejects even feigned idolatry as unworthy of Christ. Finally, they could die, as Jesus himself had died. John affirms death for Christ's sake as the only true Christian response. There is no other way. —Eugene Boring

⇒ The book of revelation is a crisis letter that responded to the severe persecution of Christians as well as strengthening the church for the near future martyrdom of her leaders.
