 - 2. Wanting to turn the conversation to highlight something you have done.
 - 3. Not asking for counsel, advice or perspective about dating, marriage, parenting, finances, evangelism and other vital areas.
 - 4. Knowing that you are wrong, but resisting admitting it to yourself and then to others.
 - 5. For leaders: preaching what others ought to be doing, but not being open about the fact that you are not doing those things.
