### Discussion Questions

3. The text says Daniel prayed "as he had done previously." How does a consistent spiritual routine prepare believers for difficult moments?
4. Compare Darius' reaction to Daniel with Nebuchadnezzar's reaction to Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego in [Daniel 3](#). What differences stand out?
5. Daniel was delivered "because he had trusted in his God." What does biblical trust look like in real-life situations today?

6. The punishment of Daniel's accusers and their families feels harsh to modern readers. How should we wrestle with difficult passages like this in Scripture?
7. The chapter begins with a decree exalting Darius and ends with a decree praising Yahweh. What does this ending communicate about who is truly in control?
