



Off the Wall submitted by Pastor Alan

The other day I drove by a Christian school with a sign stating: Trust in the Lord and not your own understanding. Now, that sounds like it's from the bible, but it's not. The verse they attempted to share is Proverbs 3:5. In the NRSVUE edition, it's translated: Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. Verse 6 continues, in all your ways acknowledge him and he will make straight your paths.

We make think, what's the issue? We may think the school got the essence of the meaning with limited letter space. Yet, on the sign, there is no note of where the verse came from. I noticed it and thought to myself, there's something not right here. I cycled through scripture I have memorized over my life and thought, they dropped an important phrase: with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding (NIV, the way I learned the verse in elementary school).

Again, most people may wonder pastor, what's the big deal? Let's say we are good people driving by this school every day. We read their signs and appreciate the encouraging scripture the school shared. Yet, those who do not attend church and/or know scripture well, may look at the words and take them at face value. We could think the words are scripture, therefore these words are a full representation of what Christian's believe. But maybe they are not. Maybe there's a 'verse' on the board at some point saying, hate the sin, love the sinner. Whether or not it's a good phrase, it sounds 'churchy', but it is not scripture.

The other concern I have is the theological implications of condensing a verse like Proverbs 3:5. Again, as we drive by the sign, we may conclude our trust in God removes us from thinking. After all, this verse tells us trust in the Lord, but not our own understanding. This is a concern. We could think, finally, just trust in God and that's all we need. It's just me and God and whatever God tells me is true and I can ignore or reject all others. True, trusting in God is very important, but the shorter version on the sign allows us to distrust science, discount those we disagree with, and become closed in a discussion because all we're doing is trusting in God and not in our or your understanding.

This misses out on the truth of the verse. The verse tells us to trust in the Lord with all our heart. This echoes back to the command Moses gives the children of Israel from Deuteronomy (6:4-6), "Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. Keep these words that I am commanding you today in your heart." We see the foreshadowing of Jesus reminding us of what the greatest commandment is in the gospels. We are to trust in the Lord with all our heart. With our entire being. And when we do that, we do not rely on our own insight. Meaning, we have a healthy trust of science, others, school, leaders, and discussion. A healthy trust means we do not need to agree fully, we can disagree, we can respectfully listen, we can advocate another way, we can wrestle over ideas without condemning another person, and through it all, we note there are ideas, processes, and information we may not be able to comprehend.

This is why we trust God. There are things we will not understand, but we are not to curb or restrict our curiosity and just blatantly ignore those who do have solutions and answers. God has given us minds to think, be creative, and explore our world. We have the capabilities to solve problems and work together. If we just rejected those talents and gifts, then we would be unfaithful to the amazing God who we lean on and who we trust.

Also, the verses in Proverbs are not isolated. The context of the first chapters of Proverbs encourages the reader to hold on to, to seek, and to learn wisdom. Wisdom is not easy. We are tempted by other voices trying to lead us down paths away from God. The writer is reminding us to trust God. To seek wisdom. To not go down the slippery path promising riches, power, and prestige. Those goals fade and fall away, leaving us worse off than if we had just leaned on God.

Travel with Outreach in 2024

We invite you to travel with The Outreach Foundation to spend time with our global partners, experience the presence of Christ through their work, and participate in opportunities to fuel the spread of the Gospel. As we exchange stories and testimonies with our siblings in Christ, we both provide and receive encouragement for our faith journeys.

UKRAINE, APRIL 11-23

We will begin in Warsaw, Poland, where we will meet teams from City Church in Lithuania and The College of Theology and Social Sciences. In Lviv, Ukraine, we will facilitate a 3-day resiliency retreat for



staff of the Ukraine Evangelical Theological Seminary (UETS), military chaplains, and pastors from various denominations along with their spouses. Following the retreat, we will travel to Kyiv to bring encouragement and assistance with relief efforts, as well as meet other relief partners including Radooga, Peter's Work, and Mission Eurasia. At the request of our partners, we will bring IFAKs (Immediate First Aid Kits) for soldiers. These are a critical need, and each kit is \$110. Please consider donating!

WARSAW, POLAND, APRIL 30 - MAY 9

The highlight of this visit will be leading a "Healing the Healers" retreat for staff and students at The

College of Theology and Social Sciences (CTSS) in Warsaw. The staff of CTSS has been faithful to God's call by providing quality humanitarian relief, trauma healing training, and maintaining its core education mandate throughout the war in Ukraine. The team arrives in Krakow, where we will visit Auschwitz and Bikenau to gain appreciation of the context of regional oppression that has scarred their history. After the retreat in Warsaw, we will tour Old Town and develop deeper conversations with CTSS leadership.

LIVERPOOL, UNITED KINGDOM, AND PORTUGAL, AUGUST 25 - SEPTEMBER 4

As a Persian Diaspora Partnership visioning visit, this trip begins in Liverpool, United Kingdom, with Shapoor Ahmadi of Frontline Centre, who works among the Persian-speaking community that lives as refugees in Liverpool, Manchester, and Portugal. Led by Shapoor, we will participate in worship and evangelistic outreaches, hear testimonies and bring hope to many Muslim background believers, facilitate Alpha courses and assist in relief work as we gain understanding of the powerful work of transformation God is achieving through Persianspeaking Muslims in exile from Iran, Afghanistan, and Tajikistan.

Travel with Outreach in 2024

NUREMBERG, GERMANY, SEPTEMBER 10-18

The Outreach Foundation team has been invited to bring support to the annual conference of the Synod of Iran in Diaspora with the Presbyterian Church of Bayern and Pastor Sergez. Our team will visit a refugee community where Sargez serves a small house church community, enjoy rich Persian hospitality, share in worship, and participate in a day of intercessory prayer at the church's new training and worship center. Throughout the visit, we will receive many testimonies from Muslim background believers.

CHINA, OCTOBER 11-21

This visioning visit will begin with a day of worship and touring in Shanghai with representatives of the National CCC/TSPM before traveling to Zheijiang Province to meet with church leaders and theology faculty in Ningbo and Hangzhou. Afterward, we will travel to Jiangsu Province to meet with church leaders in Wuxi and Jiangvin. The Outreach



Foundation has accepted Amity Foundation's invitation to participate in and attend its national ping pong tournament.

TÜRKIYE, NOVEMBER 3-13

This trip provides you with an opportunity both to have a tour of the 7 Churches of Revelation with our



expert tour guide, and a rich visit with two phenomenal ministries in the Persian Diaspora Partnership. Following our arrival in Istanbul, we will gather and fly together to Izmir. There we will begin with our tour of the 7 Churches of Revelation and lead a 3-day conference for house church network leaders of our partner Forouzan/Gates of Heaven. Then we travel to Denizli to see the church site at Laodicea and meet with nearly 50 students of Pars Theological Center to worship, hear their testimonies, and participate in rich dialogue.

From the Organ Bench: Time, God's Gift to Us

Seasons of biblical drama on a unique calendar guides the organist's choice of music. Time is God's gift to us. Our calendars mark the passing of time. Your mother told you, "Be on time" and, "Don't waste time!"

For centuries, and especially the reformation, the Christian church established its own calendar called "The Calendar of The Christian Year". It provides the church at large, and each believer, a framework of the most significant biblical events. These events hold before us special seasons including:

11 12 1 9 3-8 7 6 5

- 1. Advent: the anticipation of the coming of our Lord
- 2. Christmas: the birth of our Lord
- 3. Epiphany: the arrival of the wise men
- 4. Lent: the launching of our Lord's ministry ending with Holy Week, Maundy Thursday and His death on Good Friday
- 5. Easter: the celebration of His resurrection
- 6. Pentecost: the gathering of the disciples in Jerusalem. The Holy Spirit descended and sent them out to preach (we just celebrated this)


We are now in what is called Ordinary time, those Sundays after Pentecost (May 19) and Trinity Sunday (May 26), and lasting until the first Sunday in Advent, (December 1, 2024).

Our Presbyterian church along with Protestant, Anglican, and Roman Catholic churches have print material that provide resources for each Sunday. These resources include hymns, scriptures,

prayers, affirmations of faith, prayers of confessions, anthems for choirs, bell choir music, and art.

With my membership in the Presbyterian Association of Musicians (PAM), I receive a 52 Sunday illustrated notebook entitled, "Call to Worship." Stop by after a Sunday service and I will offer it to you to examine as I will have it with me at the organ bench.

Our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters have what is called a "Missal" (from the Latin word meaning sent) in their pews. The Missal, distributed annually, provides a service for each Sunday along with 100 hymns.



Together, let us make this time of God's "ordinary time" **extra ordinary** as we gather for worship, grow in our faith, rejoice in God's grace, and move out in service to our community.




Thursday Bible Study

Scrabble continues in June on the first and third Wednesday of the month.


