*For our liturgy this evening, **BOLD** text invites all to join in the reading.

The service for Ash Wednesday offers us the opportunity to begin the journey of Lent together. While it has not always been celebrated in the Presbyterian Church, the service has become an increasingly occasion for Presbyterians to mark the themes of penitence and repentance from sin that characterize the Lenten season as the church moves toward Holy Week and Easter.

Ash Wednesday services include the outward symbol of our humanity and our need for repentance — ashes that are imposed on worshipers' foreheads. While we often think of the penitence of Lent as a personal and inward matter, a service of worship tonight, on Ash Wednesday, gives us the opportunity to repent as a community, to pray together, to enact the ritual of the imposition of ashes in public, to make our commitment to a Lenten discipline together, and to realize that no one is alone on the journey.
