Off the Wall by Rev. Dr. Alan Dorway

As I planned for a Thursday bible study in August on Luke 14:15-24, I was reading from Luke Timothy Johnson's commentary, when I stumbled on this thought: what is required of discipleship is bearing one's own cross and following the path of the prophetic Messiah. He goes on to note "the call of God issued by the prophet must relativize all other claims on life."

In my life, I have found it easy to say Jesus has claim on my life without picking up my cross and following him. I have also found it easy to pick up my cross and forge on ahead on routes I think or believe Jesus would have me go down without checking with him first. To stabilize this tendency and prevent ourselves from getting bored or overwhelmed in our journey, the conclusion we arrived at in study was the need for being persistent and humble in prayer.

This is difficult when there are so many things to pray for and situations that change all the time. Yet, one thing that has given direction to me and us over the summer has been the reading list. I have appreciated using the psalms and verses to guide my focus as I start my day and then reflecting on where I saw, noticed, or experienced God in my prayers at night. While I have not worked on a reading list for the fall, I hope we continue to open God's word to the psalms and other sections of scripture to guide our discipleship.

Instead, I have wondered about my prayer life as the summer draws to a close. Have or do I pray in a persistent and humble manner (Luke 14:15-24)? Am I like the woman who comes to the unjust judge just seeking an opportunity to have my case presented? Am I humble enough like the tax collector to come into Jesus' presence with my heart open?

I'd like to believe so, but there are days when I have my doubts.

This fall, I hope to lead us deeper in our collective prayer life. I have some ideas, but the Spirit is working them out. To help, we will be having specific topics to pray for over a week. We will come back to worship and reflect or share how those prayers affected us and we will continue to pray.

September is a special month. We have great events like Summer Aire and the All-Church Retreat at Warm Beach. Plus, the Everett Cooperative Preschool begins their fall program, and their students, teachers, and administrators return to the classroom. I hope you join us in worship as we sing and glorify God together. There we will take time to pray, to listen, and to respond to how Jesus is calling us to follow and deepen our walk with him.



Indonesian Partners of Frontier Fellowship by Katherine Campbell

In June, I was privileged to visit Indonesia with Frontier Fellowship who invite believing communities to engage with people groups where the good news of Jesus and His kingdom is not yet known. Indonesia is the fourth most populous country in the world and is more than 80% Muslim believers.

Indopartners is helping make the Gospel known in the local Bahasa language through the creation of digital materials that help point curious individuals to Jesus. Through web tools and social media platforms, Indopartners invites questions and refers serious seekers to field workers for follow up. Some of their videos (translated into English) are available on YouTube.

Light of the Islands is one of the primary indigenous church planting networks sharing the good news of God's kingdom with Indonesians who have not yet heard it. Through village libraries and reading posts, and initiating relationships in places like village squares, opportunities to share faith are cultivated. Careful mentorship and local connection are used to establish locally led house churches.

Library Update - September 2023

Books come and go in every living library. As summer fades to fall, our library changes as well.

One new acquisition, highly recommended by Steve Hammond who has been generously leading both our Christian Formation and Discipleship Committee and the current adult Sunday School class, deserves special mention.

To Love and Be Loved: A Personal Portrait of Mother Teresa by Jim Towey serves both as biography of the famed saint and as appreciation of her spiritual impact on the author. The subtitle aptly describes memories of Towey's role as personal friend and trusted advisor during the closing twelve years of Mother Teresa's unique life.

Replete with anecdotes and quotations from Mother Teresa, the book recounts her cheerfulness in all situations, her unfailing, even mischievous, sense of humor, and her breathtaking resilience through illness, hardship, and tragedy. Her often dramatic meetings with many of the world's leaders are depicted in smoothly readable text and clear photographs.

However, as books are added one by one to our shelves, we must make room for them. Clearly not all donated books, much as they are appreciated, can be added to our shelves. Some duplicate current holdings. Others do not fit our church's needs, are in poor physical condition, or contain outdated information or language. Other books, long on our shelves, are for some of the same reasons no longer helpful in our mission and have been weeded.

So it is that we have a small but growing assortment of books that need to be lovingly dismissed from the premises. Those that simply do not fit our needs must find other homes, often with the help of Half Price Books. Any cash received for them, of course, goes to the church library fund.

In consultation with the CFD Committee, we have chosen to make these items available first to members and friends of our congregation. Watch for a book retirement event this fall, probably in October. To facilitate your opportunity to say farewell or give some of our retiring books a forever home, we plan to display them in the chapel after worship for several Sundays.

A book sale then? Not exactly, but monetary contributions to the library fund are always welcome. Watch for further announcements.

Please note: the books on our own "Burgundy Bookmobile" are still part of the active collection, available for ordinary checkout. I plan to be on hand for the "retirement event" to answer any questions.

August 28Lessons in ChemistryBonnie GarmusLeader: TBAA witty, light-hearted novel that explores women's worth and work through the adventures ofElizabeth Zott, a memorable heroine. Her career as a 1960s research chemist "takes a detourwhen she becomes the unlikely star of a beloved TV cooking show." Recently and deservedlyon best-seller lists this novel is worth the effort to locate a copy.

September 25 *The Healing of Natalie Curtis* Jane Kirkpatrick Leader: Dottie Villesvik Historical fiction about a very real woman who traveled with her brother from New York to the Southwest in the early twentieth century in search of healing. A gifted pianist, she is intrigued by the music of the Indigenous people and infuriated by laws that prohibit them from practicing their own culture. Her story touches ecology, education, music, friendships, advocacy, and women's place in society.

October 23Dear Committee MembersJulie SchumacherLeader: TBAFor the first time in many months, we have a set of 10 copies from the Everett Public Library.They're not just promised: they are already on site - plenty early!

Schumacher lays out this novel, first book in a just-completed trilogy, in a scant 180 pages of most unusual letters of reference. Jason T. Fitger, English professor in a small, undistinguished midwest college sends these missives to a variety of prospective employers and department heads alternatively extolling a student supplicant and expressing his own pain as the English department is passed over for amenities other departments enjoy. NPR's Maureen Corrigan writes: "*Dear Committee Members* deftly mixes comedy with social criticism and righteous outrage."

STILL TO COME: a **book set** for *The Thursday Murder Club* by Richard Osman. We are next in line so will read it when it becomes available.

No book set for memorable novel *The Extraordinary Life of Sam Hell* by Robert Dugoni slated for **January** (but we need to be flexible and do the murder mystery when our turn comes).




Thanks for your donations to the Volunteers of America Food Bank. Your donations support those in need here in Everett.
