Dinner at the Bell Reopens for Indoor Dining

On May 18 Dinner at the Bell opened the doors of Stocker Hall to serve the homeless a warm meal.

Pastor Alan opened the evening with a greeting and shared our policies for conduct and facility use. Dottie Villesvik shared grace as we welcomed our guests to dinner. Jimmy Sharp and his team of servers provided a hearty hot meal that was well received.

No major issues were noted. We do need one of our volunteers to take on the coordination of assigning server tasks for the evening. Additional volunteers will be needed to serve when vacations, illness and other factors arise.

D@B (Dinner at the Bell) is moving forward with serving inside and making changes to how we will serve. Here are some examples:

- Being better neighbors to the surrounding business community by eliminating all use of the alley.
- Frank Fargo's (Shower to the People) hot shower mission has moved into our north lot.
- The coffee mission (Jessica Holden Dietsch) has agreed to move indoors as our coffee service.
- The laundry trailer is in disrepair and will not be rejoining the ministries here.
- Mercy Watch and Lifelong, who provide access to testing and healthcare, will locate its van in the north lot with the showers. During inclement weather they will serve in the room adjacent to Stocker Hall.
- A group of volunteers will provide security each week, enforcing that no food leaves the hall, as well as our documented code of conduct.
- A bathroom monitor ensures no backpacks or personal belongings go into the bathrooms.
- Loitering after the meal and showers is no longer accepted.
- Guests are asked to leave the premises and failure to comply will result in a warning that a trespass notice will be issued. The trespass notice will be issued for 30 days and is enforceable by the Everett Police Department. There has been no need to issue any trespass notices through our first four weeks.

We are not doing this alone. Our fellow missionaries include the group Encourage to Change (cooking 2-3 times a month and providing security), Kathy Batts and her group of volunteers cooking on the second Wednesday, and our own cooking team and volunteers on the third Wednesday. We were also joined our first time back by Ben Breeden (City of Everett/Homelessness) and the City of Everett's COET team (police officers and social workers addressing homelessness). Jack Harris from The Hot Meals Coalition (which provides food through grants from the city and business community) has been serving as well.

We are hopeful that the worst of the pandemic is behind us, allowing us to engage with our guests in a more peaceful environment. Our guests are grateful to be able to break bread together indoors. The alley is relatively clear for the businesses behind us. Litter is less of a problem. Things just seem calmer now.
