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

I mean, I have these great ideas and plans, but no one acts, and it feels like forever to get even one thought to completion. Sure, I don't tell anyone these ideas. I am not sure why no one else can read my mind.

Okay, this is silly, but (sadly) for me, at times, it is true. I see a way through, to, or getting towards a goal, but this thought, or idea sticks in my brain and does not make itself known. I have a communication problem. This is not anyone else's fault. You, Vicki, Barley, or others do not need to feel guilty, nor do you need to solve this issue. It's on me. I know it.

I have talked about this a lot. I've mentioned it in other Carillon articles, from the pulpit, and in conversations. This has led to my own mind not being as clear. There are times when ideas, sermon illustrations, notes, plans, and a grocery list are crammed into my head and while I may make sense of it, this does not mean I'm clear. This has affected the way I desire clarity and transparency in our church and express that to our members and friends.

So, what am I going to do? How will I correct this?



Thirdly, I need your help. I like to say something, demonstrate an action, or outline a procedure one time (this is how my mind works) and then assume everyone gets it. Well, we know what happens when we assume. To help me, we can ask questions. Yes, anyone can get defensive with questions, and I know that not all answers are the same, but when we ask honest, open questions, we can be clear and understand each other.

Lastly, our vision, mission, and goals have not changed: we are a beacon of Christ, radiating his love in worship, discipleship, and mission. We have been blessed with a building, a sanctuary, a legacy of service, a desire to learn and grow in our faith, and dedicated, amazing people. We have a solid foundation and the tools to minister into our next chapter as a congregation.

Library Update - April 2024

April often ushers in Easter. Not this year. In 2024, April 1, the moment beloved by jokesters, is the first *post* Easter day. We then wait 22 days to feature Earth Day, special to FPCE's Estuary Angels. This group is coming back into its own, post pandemic, to guide us in care for God's gift of Earth and all its creatures.

In addition to special days, April hosts a special week. National Library Week, started in 1958 by the American Library Association. This special week reminds us to celebrate and support the gifts of all our country's libraries. In 2024 National Library Week—which typically is celebrated the second full week of April—runs April 7 through April 13. This year's theme, "Ready, Set, Library!" is clearly a call to action.

In the words of this year's chair, "Get ready to explore, become inspired, and connect with your library... Libraries are there for you, all the way to the finish line." These words apply to our own beloved church library as well as to the city's treasure, the Everett Public Library. This essential institution provides numerous services well beyond collecting, collating, and promoting books. We especially appreciate their book group sets.

Let's not forget our remarkable national treasure, the Library of Congress. Across the country in the other Washington, it may seem far removed from us. However, its cataloguing undergirds our ResourceMate computer database. Online information about each item in our collection is largely Library of Congress cataloguing. That each of us can search for books by author, title, subject, or keyword from any online computer is a gift from the mid-eighteen hundred promoters of the Library of Congress.

Their insistence, hotly debated at the time, on identical size and shape of each card, placement of that perfectly punched hole, the content and format of information made way for the traditional card catalog. Remember those? Drawers and drawers of 3 x 5 cards held in place by a metal rod?

Yes, if you carry a cell phone connected to the internet, you have in your pocket a complete "card catalog" for our collection. Go to <u>https://15781.rmwebopac.com</u> and try it out: a miracle to my generation of great grandparents if not to our young followers. Once a year for National Library Week, take a moment to give thanks to our library forebears.

And now, just in time for Earth Day, our library offers a new upbeat climate book:

Not Too Late: Changing the Climate Story from Despair to Possibility, edited by Rebecca Solnit and Thelma Young Lutunatabua, offers a "dispatch from the front lines of the struggle for the future of the planet...a cause for hope." Not a how-to but an encouraging account of what has been accomplished by committed thinkers and activists around the globe.


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Adult Sunday School Study: Biblical Wisdom Literature

"Celebrating Eastertide in Music" submitted by Gary Norris, Organist

Eastertide is the period between Easter and Pentecost. April 7th – May 19th. During the Easter season, the church extends the joy and gladness of Easter day for several weeks. The solemnity of Easter itself (and the great Easter vigil) is the highpoint of the liturgical year. Since the celebration of the Easter feast is of such pre-eminence, the church extends that celebration for seven days, called Easter week. Each day of Easter week is a solemnity of high rank. Rituals peculiar to Easter are continued each day during the week. The importance of the "Week of Easters" is such that the church multiplies it seven times, creating a season of joy and festivity. Thus, the Easter season is highly symbolic in length, a season of seven times seven days, culminating in the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (pente meaning "fiftieth").



Please come worship, pray, and sing as Easter joy to our hearts bring. In the words of that great Methodist hymn #316:

"When Easter to the dark world came, Fair flowers glowed like scarlet flame: At Eastertide, at Eastertide, O glad was the world at Eastertide. When ten disciples met in fear, Then "Peace" said Jesus, "I am here." At Eastertide, at Eastertide,"
