

## Hybrid Worship - Sundays at 10am




As always, we want to know your needs for reading material and to provide for them best we can. Your ideas for ways we can better serve you are always welcome.



A bare-all account of Daley's cardinal sins as well as his milestone achievements, this scathing work by Chicago journalist Mike Royko brings to life the most powerful political figure of his time..."

## Peacemaking Puerto Rico Travel Study Seminar Report by Katherine Campbell

This is a report on a Peacemaking Travel Study Seminar to Puerto Rico that I took in March with some support from the Mission Committee.

The title of the Seminar was *In the Aftermath of Catastrophe: The Political, Social and Racial Dynamics Revealed by Multiple Catastrophes and How the Church is Responding to Them.* It included a study of resources and three webinars ahead of time with all 14 participants and was co-led by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. Since we have supported PDA for as long as I can remember, I particularly wanted to report on the PDA responses I saw.



Puerto Rico was struck by Hurricanes Irma and Maria in September 2017, by

large earthquakes in January 2020, by the pandemic from 2020 on, and by Hurricane Fiona last September. Hurricane Irma was a category 5 storm that passed close to the main island of Puerto Rico and left the ground saturated. Aid was sent to nearby islands that were harder hit, leaving supplies short when category 5 Maria hit 2 weeks later. It was 5 months before significant electricity and water began to be restored. Fuel and nearly all food are shipped in and were restricted since they rely on ports that were damaged. The swarm of large earthquakes that struck the southern part of the main island in 2020 at 6.4 magnitude destroyed or damaged many buildings and left people living outdoors for fear of further collapses. The pandemic cut off volunteer assistance in recovery for 3 years. And Hurricane Fiona last year, while only a Category 1, lingered over the island with long heavy rains, causing landslides and flooding. These catastrophes, one after another, left residents in a state of emotional exhaustion and a loss of the sense of hope. Pastors reported struggling in these circumstances.

PDA is not a first responder but works with groups already on the ground to provide support and on-going assistance. Here are some of the places we visited and how PDA has been active there:

<u>The Martin Pena Canal</u> on the north coast near San Juan had needed to be dredged to restore its function. The 8 surrounding communities organized with help from Self Development of People and established a land trust, working to restore the ecosystem which included installing sewage treatment to disrupt the pollution of the canal. PDA repaired over 100 roofs in those communities after the hurricanes.

The Presbyterian Church in Lares is a small elderly congregation that serves a very poor remote agricultural community in the western mountains. They lost windows and part of their roof and had water damage from Maria that PDA helped repair. They say they "worship through service" and established a community kitchen with solar power using PDA funds and became a receiving center for relief supplies including food, water cisterns, solar lamps, and water filters. They helped residents with required papers to access FEMA funds and stored insulin in their refrigerators.

<u>Camp El Guacio</u> in the western mountains had a generator and their own water spring. With PDA assistance, they supplied water to the community, a laundry facility, medical resources, lawyers to help with FEMA forms, and access to psychologists. They also were able to obtain an ice machine with funds from Presbyterian Women to help supply the community with ice for storing medicines. They became a PDA volunteer site for groups working in the camp and in the community.

<u>Ensenada</u>, a community on the southern coast, was in the center of the area struck by earthquakes. Houses were damaged or collapsed and the church had to be structurally inspected before it could be used. Assistance provided by PDA also included attention to psychosocial needs and a pastoral retreat.

<u>The Mutual Support Center</u> in the community of Bucarabones utilizes part of a school that had been closed for ten years. It started as a community kitchen, shifted to tutoring, and is now solely centered on education. They have solar panels that support the internet, computers and classes for the community. PDA volunteers have been sent to the area for cleaning, painting, and repairs.

<u>The Women's Alliance</u> on the island of Vieques was originally involved in the fight against the Navy base that had been present for 60 years, including a bombing practice site. Incidence of cancer there is 27% higher than on the main island. They worked to establish a community clinic because the only hospital was destroyed by Maria. Members also worked against women's violence, child abuse and gentrification that takes advantage of homeowners.

<u>Vieques Center for Resilience and Conservation</u> was started ten years ago in a former school building. After Maria there was no communication from Puerto Rico with the outside world. A local ham radio station was able to connect people via email using computer assistance with PDA funding. There also was funding for solar power to continue off the grid and provide refrigeration for medicines. Mangrove losses there were about 30% and there is a project underway to grow, acclimatize to salt water, and transplant mangroves that will preserve the ecosystem of the bioluminescent bay on Vieques which is the brightest in the world.

I hope this gives you some insight into how PDA works with local groups already on the ground to serve in the aftermath of catastrophes.
