


Second, I gave myself and others grace to be present in summer. Why is it that summer may feel different? True, it usually is warmer, but while we may like other seasons better, summer has that vibe of 'suns out, let's get out'. Being at camp taught me the whole was better than the parts. Every day there were things, activities, lessons, and people to be around, engage, and learn from. If I did not get to swim one day, then the pool was there the next. If my lesson was not the best, then the speaker and other Christ-like leaders were there. It was more than enough knowing no matter the time, camp sought to be a place of grace where loving God and loving others was good news.

I think we need more 'free time', a good reason to get out, explore, laugh, be calm, jump in the pool or into a good book, and be present for God and each other. I want to enjoy grace and be present for grace more. I believe we all do. This does not have to be just a summer thing. God wants us to have free time – the space in our days and lives to know his love, experience Jesus' grace, and be comforted and present through the Holy Spirit deeper. It is counter intuitive in our fast-moving world to know we are amazing, talented, interesting, accomplished, and worthy just as we are. God loves us lavishly. In turn, we are free to be present to each other. In Christ's body, we do not need to punch a clock or figure out how to be the best. We are loved and appreciated as we are. I hope you know you are loved, you are worthy, and grace has no strings attached. We can have fun, be silly, get to know each other, try s'mores, and know there are more days and time to finish your craft, sit on the beach, jump in a puddle, and be present for each other.

Remember you are welcome at worship every Sunday in-person or online. We have two Wednesday evening programs in August on the 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>. Plus, in a first, we will be having s'mores on the 21<sup>st</sup> outdoors in our north parking lot. ### From the Organ Bench by Gary Norris, Organist

Come and listen for a rich variety of sounds on a beloved hymn tune and the classic *Toccata and Fugue in D* Minor by JS Bach played by an internationally acclaimed organist, Hector Olivera.

A small but versatile and powerful digital organ, a Roland C330, will be heard on Sunday, August 11 as worship is started with an improvisation on the hymn tune, *Crusader Hymn*, which you will recognize as the tune for the familiar and beloved *Fairest Lord Jesus*! See background on hymn and words below.

The service will conclude with a postlude — J. S Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor — played by Olivera.

Come prepared to absorb the sounds of the music and pray the words of this great hymn:

Fairest Lord Jesus, ruler of all nature O thou of God and man the Son Thee will I cherish, Thee will I honor Thou, my soul's glory, joy, and crown

Fair are the meadows, fairer still the woodlands Robed in the blooming garb of spring Jesus is fairer, Jesus is purer Who makes the woeful heart *to sing* 

Beautiful Savior! Lord of all the nations Son of God and Son of Man Glory and honor, praise, adoration Now and forevermore be thine

The author of these words is unknown. The tune is *St. Elizabeth*, an eighteenth-century tune from the Glaz area of Silesia.





### It's time to update the FPCE member photo directory!

The Deacons would like to put together a new photo directory of FPCE members and friends.

Rather than having photos taken by a professional photographer in a studio setting, as was the case for the previous photo directory, we thought that it would be more interesting to have members submit their own photos. These photos could be informal and could bring out the personalities of the members. For example, a photo might include a pet, a child or grandchild, a favorite vacation spot, or a favorite hobby – things that would be hard to show in a studio photo.

We would like to produce the photo directory sometime this fall, so please start thinking about an appropriate photo. Maybe you can have a relative or friend take a photo of you during a summer vacation, with your favorite mountain or lake in the background. Or maybe you can get your photo taken in front of your restored 1930 Ford Model A (we wish!), in your fishing boat, in your garden, on your front porch, or in your favorite easy chair with your cat on your lap.

Whatever photo you decide on, be sure that your face fills enough of the frame so that you are recognizable. And be sure that the image resolution is as high as possible, since we may need to crop or enlarge your photo to fit the space available. Here are a few ways you can create a photo for the directory:



- ⇒ You can have someone take a digital photo of you, using a camera or smart phone, and you can submit the photo via email or thumb drive.
- $\Rightarrow$  You can submit a photo print, which we can scan and return to you.

 $\Rightarrow$  You can have a volunteer take a photo of you at church or in your home (if you have trouble getting to church).

If you have a photo from a few years ago that you like, that's OK. The main thing is that it should help other members recognize you.

We will provide more details in the next few weeks, but please start planning now how you will get a photo for the directory. Our goal is to collect photos from as many members as possible.

### VOTE!

In our amazing country, we have the privilege of being able to vote. We vote for a variety of representatives, initiatives, and laws. As Christians, we can and should engage in our civic duty to learn, discern, advocate, and vote. Our Book of Order in the PC(USA) reminds us "God alone is Lord of the conscience, and hath left it free from the doctrines and commandments of all persons which are in anything contrary to his Word, or beside it, in



matters of faith or worship. (F-3.0101 Book of Order, from Westminster Confession of Faith (The Book of Confessions, 6.109))" This means, we the church, do not tell you who or how to vote, because the way one votes is a private conversation between you and God.

This August, those in Everett will vote on Proposition One. This is a property tax levy lid lift. If approved, this will support public safety, like police and fire, and essential public services that contribute to quality of life, like street paving, libraries, parks, the animal shelter and more (from https://bit.ly/FPCEProp1). There are valid reasons for and against this proposition. We want to highlight a part of the proposition that may be helpful for those who are senior citizens or disabled.

Seniors and persons with disabilities may qualify for tax exemptions or deferrals. Learn more: <u>https://bit.ly/FPCETaxExempt</u> or 425-388-3540.

No matter the vote, if you qualify, then please use these resources to help ease financial strain.

### Library Update - August 2024

August is a time for fictional treasures old and new. It's a time to rediscover and reread old favorites or discover new titles on their way to becoming favorites. Here are a few suggestions from your church library:

Remember *Peace Like a River* by Leif Enger? Shortly after its publication at the beginning of this century, Valerie Ryan of the *Seattle Times* wrote: "If you like a ripping good story told in robust prose that gives you goosebumps, latch onto this book. . . . More than a novel of miracles, it is truly a miraculous novel."

Enger's 2018 creation, *Virgil Wander*, again features quirky characters, small town ambience, intriguing relationships, and surprising happenings, presented in the author's spare descriptive prose. Textures and colors give that "you are there too" sense. *Wall Street Journal:* "... brings out the charm and the downright strangeness of the defiantly normal."

Author Barbara Davis has given us *Echo of Old Books* and *The Keeper of Happy Endings*, two engaging historical fiction tales to enrich the summer hours.

For another title in this vein, try *The Hidden Child* by Louise Fein. See how only a few decades ago it was considered a family's shame, perhaps dangerous to their other aspirations, to have given birth to a youngster beyond the bounds of "normal". Today's term "special needs" does little to conceal the family challenges.

*A Short Walk Through a Wide World*, a 2024 publication by Douglas Westerbeke combines travel and fantasy. "Cursed with immortality at the age of 9, but with a requirement that she stay in perpetual motion, Aubry flees Paris and embarks on a century-spanning, globe-trotting odyssey, seeking a cure and discovering a world beyond the boundaries of time and space."

In addition, this fruitful year has provided a new Kristin Hannah [remember *The Four Winds?*] historical novel, *The Women*. In the words of Bonnie Garmus, this tome: "Stuns with sacrifice, uplifts with heroism...an important, long overdue tribute to the brave women nurses who served in Vietnam."

These are just a few of the "fiction treasures old and new" available in our library. Browse the shelves of the main library on the first floor by the office or check the availability of a particular title in our online catalog: <u>https://15781.rmwebopac.com</u>.
