## Pastor's Ponderings

What do these stories have in common?

When our team of five disciples arrived in Alaska on a mission journey, three churches greeted us, each with a project list as long as my arm! Not to mention that our host church had two people developing independent lists for us. Did I mention that there were FIVE of us?!?! It was obvious that we would not be able to accomplish everything they needed done – not even close.

One ministry we helped with in Anchorage was a mobile food pantry. The church my friend Corey attends helps in this ministry every Friday. We gathered and bagged food that was delivered by the food bank and then handed out the bags to people driving through and those walking up. They expected to hand out 160 bags that day. Some of the folks who walked up or rode a bicycle, sat down in the grass right after getting the bag and rifled through it and started eating – they were hungry.

Our WV Disaster Response Ministry has sent one Early Response Team (ERT) to work in WV after the flash flooding in June. If you recall, the areas of Wheeling and Fairmont were hit with 4 inches of rain in 30 minutes and experienced widespread destruction with at least nine lives lost besides many homes and businesses destroyed. Our team went to the Fairmont area and worked three days (the maximum allowed in succession) and finished two jobs. There has been additional flash flooding since that initial episode.

Calvary is in the process of assembling UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) cleaning kits (a.k.a. flood buckets). I am not sure how many we will complete, but 20 buckets would be a pretty good accomplishment. The New Vision Depot warehouse has sent out maybe 300 buckets to be used in the regions in WV that were flooded in June.

While there are probably many different illustrations and things these real-life examples have in common, I want to highlight two. First, in each of these cases, and in so many other different areas of ministry, the scale of the need can be depressing. One of the reasons it can be depressing is because it is overwhelming when you try to make a difference. When you are handed a needs list of 40 projects to be completed and you can maybe finish 10 of them, it can lead to a feeling of failure. When hundreds of people are affected by flooding and you can help two of them, I mean what is that? They need 1,000 cleaning kits and we are going to provide 20?

Here is a quote and a story that speaks to this:

"I cannot do all the good the world needs, but the world needs all the good I can do." And this story:

A businessman was on "vacation" at the beach. I put quote marks around vacation because he was a workaholic and always continued to work when he traveled. He was a real mover and shaker and was used to spreadsheets and analysis and getting things done. He was walking along the beach one morning (while checking his email on his phone) and noticed that there were thousands of starfish washed up on the beach. They were everywhere. And as the impending sun began to rise, it was certain that they would dry out and die – it must be a natural phenomenon, he surmised. What a shame. Then he saw a family walking toward him and the young boy, maybe 8 years old, would pick up a starfish and walk down to the ocean and throw it back in the water. He chuckled to himself at the naivety of the boy's work. The man said, "son there are thousands and thousands of starfish, what possible difference do you think you can make." The boy picked up another starfish, walked to the oceans edge and threw it in, and said, "I made a difference to that one."

The scripture we read on the first Sunday in July, said to not grow weary in doing good. When we are faced with great need, we can grow weary because we cannot possibly make a dent in the total need. But as the quote and story reminds us, we can make a difference to one! We aren't expected to fix the world, just our little part of the world. We will never share the love of Jesus with everyone who does not believe, but we can tell someONE about Jesus. We may not eradicate world hunger, but someONE in our neighborhood will have food because of us.

The second and related point to be made is that I am not the only one working for good in this world – it is a collaborative effort. The church where we stayed in Alaska (The United Methodist Church of Chugiak), hosted a work team the week before we arrived and they were going to host another work team beginning July 11th. I cannot accomplish everything, but just think of how much all of us can do together. One key is to DO YOUR PART! Make a difference to one. Contribute in the ways you can and according to your gifts, abilities, and resources. Please try not to be discouraged by the enormity of the need and yet at the same time be motivated because there is need. Let's all covenant together to make all the difference in the world that we can – one person, one task, one day at a time.

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism said:

"Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

Mother Teresa of Calcutta said:

"Give the world the best you have, and it may never be good enough; give the best anyway."

You might think your little contribution doesn't make a difference – but it makes all the difference in the world!





## Bet Ya Didn't Know. . . or Maybe You Did

Have you ever thought about why we do what we do during worship on Sunday mornings? More specifically, have you ever thought about why we do what we do when we do it (not why it is on Sunday, but I am referring to the order of worship)? The elements of worship are not included in a haphazard order. There are theological reasons that guide our decisions.

The basic order of worship listed in the United Methodist Book of Worship includes:

#### **ENTRANCE**

Gathering Greeting and Hymn Opening Prayer and Praise

#### PROCLAMATION AND RESPONSE

Prayer for Illumination
Scripture
Sermon
Response to the Word
May include a hymn, the Affirmation of
Faith, installation of officers, etc.
Concerns and Prayers
Confession, Pardon, and Peace
Offering

#### THANKSGIVING/HOLY COMMUNION

The Great Thanksgiving
The Lord's Prayer
Taking the Bread and the Cup

#### SENDING FORTH

Hymn or Song Dismissal with Blessing Going Forth

This is not a "set in stone, have to do it this way" command straight from Jesus. But it is the best work of a Holy Spirit inspired Church through the centuries to reflect our understanding of what corporate worship is intended to be or accomplish or facilitate. Sometimes we (most congregations) adjust the order of worship for specific circumstances to allow for a better flow if there are infrequent elements included - like the VBS celebration, etc.

As you can tell, we (Calvary) normally do a few things "out of order." For instance, the sermon should be much earlier in the service. And things like the offering and affirmation of faith are best considered a response to God and God's Word and should come later in the service. We might adjust our order of worship some in the near future to better reflect this more theologically sound order. However, I think God is

pleased when we gather and focus our attention and our heart on God in praise and worship, in most any form that it might take.

Vision and mission are important. Indeed, much has been written across the years about both.

Vision: The Book of Proverbs says, "Where there is no vision, the people perish . . ." (Proverbs 29:18 KJV). Similarly, agricultural scientist and inventor George Washington Carver is quoted as saying. "Where there is no vision, there is no hope." Author and political activist Helen Keller made a statement about vision that was especially impactful because of her physical deafness and blindness. "The only thing worse than being blind is having sight but no vision."

**Mission**: American Psychologist Arnold H. Glasgow stated, "Make your life a mission - not an intermission." German author Johann Wolfgang von Goethe said, "Every person above the ordinary has a certain mission that they are called to fulfill." Rick Warren wrote, "God has given you a mission in life, and only you can fulfill it.

I am thankful for The United Methodist Church's vision statement which was released in mid-May, 2025 to complement our oft-quoted mission statement. **UMC Vision**: The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections. **UMC Mission**: To make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Our West Virginia Conference's focus is in alignment with the General Church's vision and mission. West Virginia Conference Vision: In the West Virginia Conference, we live into the worldwide United Methodist vision by transforming Appalachia through God's love—growing disciples, healing communities, and casting a future of hope rooted in Christ. West Virginia Conference Mission: To Discover, Develop, and Deploy passionate spiritual leaders of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

**Central** to both West Virginia and the worldwide United Methodist Church **is the formation of disciples of Jesus Christ**. West Virginia adds an emphasis on developing leaders. Below are West Virginia's definitions of a passionate spiritual disciple and a passionate spiritual leader.

**Spiritual Disciples:** A Passionate Spiritual Disciple (PSD) is a Christ-follower committed to imitating Jesus' example. Filled with and guided by the Holy Spirit, PSDs demonstrate the fruit described in Galatians 5:22-23 as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. A PSD is in covenant with other Christ-followers to grow spiritually, missionally and relationally.

I will add that Passionate Spiritual Disciples and Leaders embody the characteristics of our new United Methodist Church vision of loving boldly, serving joyfully and leading courageously, both locally and around the world.

**Spiritual Leaders:** A Passionate Spiritual Leader (PSL) is a Passionate Spiritual Disciple leading other Passionate Spiritual Disciples. Though not all Christians are Passionate Spiritual Leaders, hopefully we are all Passionate Spiritual Disciples.

Yes, vision and mission are important. Without vision, we struggle to thrive, find hope and see clearly. Without a mission we do not have purpose.

How grateful I am that our United Methodist Church and the West Virginia Conference have clarity around vision and mission. My prayer for us is that we will become increasingly successful in moving toward them both as a denomination and conference.

In a recent national survey of public water systems, it was discovered that the three county water systems with the most violations in the US were:

- 1. McDowell County, WV
- 2. Boone County, WV
- 3. Mercer County, WV

Did you know that there are communities in the southern coalfield counties of McDowell, Mingo, and Wyoming (primarily) that cannot use their tap water? But they are still required to pay a monthly fee! In some of those communities, the tap water is brown and if you try to shower with it, it burns the skin.

Does it surprise you that in the United States of America in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we are talking about the lack of the basic necessities of life?!??!

There are also folded brochures in the sanctuary that articulate the problem.

But there is still much work to be done – these are merely band aids on the symptoms. We need systemic change and new water systems in place. ## **Quote(s) of the Month**

This month's theologian in the spotlight is Martin Luther. b. 1483 – d. 1546

Luther was a German priest and THE seminal figure in the Protestant Reformation of the mid-16<sup>th</sup> century. He was ordained into the priesthood 1507 but came to reject much of the teaching of the contemporary Roman Catholic Church, especially around indulgences and papal authority. When he published his "Ninety-five Theses" in 1517, the pope demanded that he renounce all his writings. When Luther refused, he was excommunicated and that was still in effect when he died.

Luther emphasized the theological position that justification is by grace alone and does not rely on human merit. However, good works were a necessary fruit of living faith.

Martin Luther as also a hymn writer and one of his hymns is still in our UM hymnal (number 110) and widely sung in worship services, "A Mighty Fortress is our God."

Here are a few quotes:

"The whole being of any Christian is faith and love. Faith brings the person to God, love brings the person to people."

"God does not need your good works, but your neighbor does."

"We need to hear the Gospel every day, because we forget it every day."

"Pray like it all depends on God, then when you are done, go work like it all depends on you."

And one fun quote that shows his German heritage:

"Whoever drinks beer, he is quick to sleep; whoever sleeps long, does not sin; whoever does not sin, enters Heaven! Thus, let us drink beer!"



#### 100 YEARS OF CALVARY

(4 new windows recognized)
The stained-glass windows are 100 years old too! Many of these have been noted as in memory or honor of people connected with this church building. Starting down the left side of the sanctuary are windows

dedicated in memory of Mr. & Mrs. A.F. Parsons by their children, in Honor of Mr. & Mrs. R.P. Shinn by their family, in Memory of Mr. & Mrs. Elias Stone by their children and in Honor of Mr. & Mrs. L.M. Parsons by their children. I have not been able to find much information on these people except that Mr. R.P. Shinn (Ray) died in 1962 and was a member of this church and his wife's name was Audrey (Hall). Also Mr. L.M. Parsons passed away in 1940 and Mrs L.M. Parsons passed away in 1954. What little information I did find came from 3 very old membership record books for the E.U.B. church dating back to the early 20's. I just discovered these books and am looking forward to searching them some more. Anyone want to join me?
