Pastor's Ponderings

I decided that I should find something to help pass the time this winter. I stay pretty busy, but with the short days and long nights of winter, there are times that I do get lonely—and bored. So, I decided to get a jigsaw puzzle. I haven't worked on a puzzle in years, but my dad liked to work on them and several people I know find it to be a great pastime.

When I went to Walmart to see what I could find, they had several to choose from. I thought I needed one large enough to be a challenge and take a fair amount of time. I may have overdone it! I bought a 2,000-piece puzzle! It is huge! When completed (if I ever get there), it will be over three feet long and over two feet tall. I have a six-foot table and it would not hold the outline of the puzzle and all the pieces—I had to put a lot of the puzzle pieces on another table. It is definitely a way to pass the time and I am enjoying it so far, but I have mostly been working on the easiest parts. If the other sections become so difficult that I cannot make progress, I might get frustrated, and this will become a chore or task instead of entertainment and enjoyment.

But let me ask you a question, how is it that I can look for a particular piece and not find it and then maybe the next day look down and it is right there? Or there might be a very distinctive piece that should be easy to spot, but I have overlooked it numerous times. And one other thing, I thought I had all of the border put together but I had another edge piece left! I found where I had put the wrong pieces together—they were almost an exact match, but not quite. The border looked perfect, but it wasn't.


There are many life analogies to be drawn from a jigsaw puzzle. Are there things/people/signs that you are searching for to make your life more complete? If so, are they right in front of you but something has blinded you to their presence? Are you focused on something else? Are you distracted by all the options and choices? Sometimes it might be easier for someone else to see it—be open to the suggestions and advice of others (I may get some of you to come to the parsonage and look for a piece or two on this puzzle!).

But I want you to consider something else. Are there areas in your life where you do not have the right puzzle piece? Oh, it may look good, or it may appear to be all lined out, but it just isn't quite right. Or is something missing? In my puzzle, if I had not found the last edge piece, I would not have known I was missing a piece. The

border looked good! And I may not have found out until I was trying to get the other pieces in that area placed.

For way too many people, they appear to have their life together, but they are missing a key piece—the presence of Christ. They may not even realize it until some other pieces don't fit right. Like how do I deal with disappointment, why can't I find peace, what is my purpose, where is the joy in living, what do I have to look forward to, or where does this life ultimately lead? Perhaps you have tried to piece together your life without this most important piece.

The jigsaw puzzle box included a picture of what the completed puzzle should look like. We have something similar for our lives—the life of Jesus as presented in the Gospels. When we look at the life of Jesus, we see what God has intended for humanity. Below is a picture of what my puzzle currently looks like. I have made some progress, but there are holes to be filled insome small one-piece holes in the middle of a completed section and some big gaping holes. I am afraid that my life is the same. When I measure it against the life of Jesus, I see where I have some holes. The good news is that God and I are still working on this puzzle called Steve's life. There aren't as many holes as there were a few years ago. I am moving closer to the picture of what God has intended for my life. But I am a work in progress. So are you. Maybe we should all ponder on this a bit, especially during the season of Lent.

ASH WEDNESDAY WORSHIP

So, what is Ash Wednesday and why do we have a worship service on that day? Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent – a 40-day journey (not counting Sundays) that takes us to the Cross of Calvary and the crucifixion of Jesus. Forty days was chosen to correspond to the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness being tempted by the evil one after Jesus' baptism and before he started his public ministry.


An Ash Wednesday service is normally somber with muted colors and offers a time of reflection and introspection. We think about our mortality and realize that all of us will die at some point. A physical representation of this reality is the imposition of ashes in the shape of a cross on the forehead of the worship participants. You will normally hear the phrase, remember that you are dust and to dust you will return. Or, alternatively, repent and believe the gospel. But our themes of sin and death and repentance are always held against the light of redeeming love in Jesus Christ.

This year, we will have our Ash Wednesday service on February 14th (yes, that is also Valentine's Day), at 6:30pm. The service usually lasts about 45 minutes. This can be a very meaningful service and I hope that you will plan to join us.

GRIEFSHARE GROUP

Our GriefShare support group will begin on Tuesday, February 6, 2024, @ 5:30 pm. If you, or anyone you know, is grieving the loss of a loved one, please consider joining us as we learn how to navigate life and gain some tools to continue our journey and support one another in Christian love. It is suggested that you go through all 13 sessions at least twice as you will learn things you missed the first time.

We will be starting our Lenten Bible study on Wednesday, February 21st. We will once again have two sessions from which to choose – join us at 11am or 6pm. office at your convenience. The daily readings begin on Ash Wednesday, February 14th. **This study will conclude on April 3rd.**

If you were in worship last Sunday (January 28th), you saw a video from our District Superintendent, Rev Loretta Isaiah, advertising an upcoming workshop focused on congregational vitality. Ken Willard is the director of the Congregational Vitality (CV) ministry team in the WV Conference, and he will be leading our time at this workshop which will be on February 18th from 4-6pm at Wayside UMC in Vienna. The goal of the CV team is to help congregations reach their maximum vitality! They provide finances, trainings, on-site visits, and other resources to support the work of the local congregation in reaching people in their community with the saving love and grace of Jesus Christ. I hope that at least 5 of us from Calvary will attend and learn from others around the conference to help us better minister to the people in Jackson County.

Food Pantry Ministry January

During January we worked clearing out some of our inventory. We almost had more food in inventory than we had room for. This was from an abundance of donations over the Christmas season and over buying for Thanksgiving and Christmas distributions.

Still, we brought in 4,206 pounds, 3,350 lbs. were donated and 856 lbs. were purchased. The donated pounds included 1,792 lbs. from USDA, 828 lbs. Walmart, and 489 lbs. Kroger. The 856 lbs. purchased was from Mountaineer Food Bank to purchase primarily shelf stable milk. We like to provide shelf stable milk in each food box at every distribution.

For the month we served 172 households or 456 individuals.

FOOD PANTRY MINISTRY

On Sunday, January 28th, we recognized the people who serve in our food pantry ministry. In the church we often do not say "thank you" often enough. This group of folks work diligently to make the food pantry ministry a rousing success and we wanted to make sure we said thank you. Here is a list of those who served in some capacity in 2023 and some of the statistics of that ministry.

FOR 2023

Served 2,076 households – the average was 173

households per month

Served 6,023 individuals – the average was 502 per month

We purchased 62,536 pounds of food – about 5,211 pounds per month

The food we distribute comes from various sources. In 2023, our food came from:

Donations from Facing Hunger (USDA Commodities)	27%
Purchased from Mountaineer Foodbank	25%
Purchased from Kroger and Walmart	22%
Donations from Kroger and Walmart	18%
Other donations – Churches, community, drives, etc.	8%

As you can see, about 53% of the food we distribute comes from donated food and we purchase 47% of the food to distribute.

MEETING WITH THE WV CONFERENCE DELEGATION TO GENERAL CONFERENCE

As you are probably aware, the United Methodist General Conference will convene on April 23, 2024, in Charlotte, NC. Each Annual Conference and members of the Central Conference sends a representative number of people as voting delegates and as a body they make decisions that affect the entire denomination. The WV Conference delegation will make themselves available at regional gatherings that will include a time of prayer, reflection, information regarding legislation, and a time to talk with one another. They will be at Bridgeport UMC on March 17th, at 3pm. They will also gather in Beckley at 10am on March 23rd and Charleston at 2pm on March 23rd, the location to be determined.

Do you ever encounter someone in need? Like, in need of help to pay a utility bill, need food, need to talk to someone about substance abuse, someone looking for a job, etc., really most any need? Almost all of us do at some point and usually we struggle with knowing what to do, where to send them, or how to help. The United Way Alliance of the Mid-Ohio Valley has worked in partnership with 211 to make a "one call" resource available. If a person calls 211, or visits 211 ORG, or texts their zip code to 898-211, the operator will get information about their specific need and be able to connect them with local programs that address that need. They are friendly and nonjudgmental – they just want to get the person in need connected to someone who may be able to help. I will have some handouts available soon, but if you encounter a person in need, and you cannot help them yourself, please make sure they know about this resource.



WINTER WEATHER WORSHIP

As we are heading into the winter season, I wanted to remind you of my inclement weather worship policy. In

the event that our area is affected by inclement winter weather on a Sunday morning (and it seems like for some reason it happens on Saturday nights and Sunday mornings!), I will still be at the church and the church will be open and we will worship with whoever shows up! If Jeremy or a couple of others make it on those days, we will still livestream the service. The only time that worship in the sanctuary will be cancelled is if the governor (or other official) has declared a state of emergency and/or closed the roads.

However, with that said, just because we have the church open does not mean that you should attempt to join us in person. Each of you will have to decide if you can safely make it to the church and back home. I cannot even guarantee that the parking lot or sidewalks will have the snow/ice removed. Please do not take unnecessary risks; I am sure the Lord understands.

Bet Ya Didn't Know (or maybe you did)

Why does Easter fall on a different day each year and how is it determined? Let's start with the easiest part to answer - Easter is always on the first Sunday, after the first full moon, after the spring equinox. Therefore, this year, the spring equinox (the first day of spring in the northern hemisphere) is on March 19th (usually March 20th or 21st). The next full moon is March 25th. Thus, Easter is on Sunday, March 31st. For 2025, Easter will fall on April 20th! The earliest it can be is March 22nd and the latest is April 25th.

But why this calculation? Scholars, theologians, and officials knew that the resurrection occurred on a Sunday during Passover. But the dates for the 7-day Passover celebration change each year, as well. The dates for Passover are calculated with the help of the Hebrew calendar and are also based on the lunar cycle. Passover is the Jewish observance of the freeing of the Israelites from captivity in Egypt - remember Moses and the plagues? When God spared the

Hebrew people from the last plague, the killing of the first-born males, it is said that God "passed over" their homes. Passover always begins in the middle of the month of Nisan when the moon is full. So, Passover and Easter are often very near each other. However, with leap years and other variables, they can be farther apart as they are in 2024; Passover begins on April 22nd.

Then, those early officials had to decide what was most important for the date of Easter - a fixed date or that it be celebrated on a Sunday. By the fourth century, it was decided that it should always be on a Sunday, so the first Sunday after the first full moon.

Church Conference booklet

STATISTICAL REPORT

One of the many roles and duties of a pastor in the UM Church, and one of the areas of my ordination, is to Order—order the life of the church. This area includes administrative obligations. Of course, the annual Charge Conference is a big responsibility each year. But one thing that you may not have even known about is that we must file a statistical report each year. The stats report includes everything from changes in membership to the number of baptisms to worship attendance and financial information about giving and spending. This report is used by the conference statistician (Jamion Wolford) to compile information from across the conference to help the UM Church in WV evaluate our progress in ministry as a whole and it is used to calculate our Fair Share apportionments. It is also an opportunity for the local church to recognize strengths and weaknesses and identify trends and respond in appropriate ways. That can often get lost when we are necessarily focused on our immediate day to day ministry opportunities and obligations. I want to share with you a few highlights from the 2023 stats report.

- We celebrated 11 baptisms in 2023 (zero in 2022).
- Seven young people completed confirmation classes.
- We received 12 new members through profession of faith and 4 new members by transfer. Two members withdrew and we celebrated the life of 3 saints who passed away.
- Our total membership increased from 532 to 544.
- Our average weekly worship attendance increased from 154 per week in 2022 to 168 per week in 2023.
- The average weekly Sunday school attendance increased from 97 to 102.
- We offer 12 Sunday school classes and 10 other small group opportunities.
- We have 11 different active community outreach ministries and served at least 7,900 people.
- We paid down our mortgage from \$399,997 at the end of 2022 to \$288,144 at the end of 2023...
- While the total amount of giving did decrease almost 10%, we still received more in donations that we had in expenses including spending over \$20,000 on a new HVAC unit.

We remain very strong financially and very blessed because of your faithfulness in giving.

As you can see, it was a very good year of ministry at Calvary. We have much to be thankful for and we are reaching the community with the love of Jesus. Obviously, there have been challenges and we did see a number of people decide that they no longer wanted to remain United Methodist and have since found a new church family. We wish them well and trust that they will continue to be faithful disciples of Jesus.

So, what is in store for Calvary in 2024? Only God knows for sure. But let us all commit to loving God and loving our neighbors, to remain a faithful disciple of Jesus, to be in ministry in the church and in the community, to be diligent in seeking the direction of the Holy Spirit, and fulfill the vow we took when we became a member of the church to support the church with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness.
