Pastor's Ponderings

Welcome to the month of November, the month of Thanksgiving. So, what are the things for which you are thankful? This is normally a good exercise to put things in perspective. One old Southern Gospel song said, "Count your blessings, name them one by one." Focus on the positive is another way to phrase it. The idea is that if you are struggling or feeling sorry for yourself or facing challenges, stop for just a minute and think about and name your blessings.

However, consider these Bible verses: James 1:2 - My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy,

1 Thess 5:16-18 - Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.

Really? Consider it joy in times of trials and give thanks in ALL circumstances? Really? The choir is practicing a Thanksgiving song called, "Sing Your Thanks to God," by Storm, Backstrtom, Cory, and Larson. Listen to some of the selected lyrics:

For new life we see in springtime, thanks for colors of the fall. Thanks for tears we've long forgotten and for peace within the soul.

Okay, so far so good. Then we get to this: Thanks for prayers that have been answered and for those that were denied. Thanks for storms of life we've weathered. Thanks for pain and for pleasure. Thanks for comfort in

When was the last time you gave God thanks for trials, trouble, heartache, pain, affliction, storms, sorrow, etc.? That doesn't even sound right when I speak it out loud. So, here is my take.

The passage from 1 Thessalonians does not say to give thanks FOR all circumstances, but rather IN all circumstances – that is the will of God for us. While I may not be able to give thanks that a painful situation is occurring in my life, I should be able to give thanks to God who is with me in the pain. Sometimes God removes storms and at other times God walks with us through the heart of the storm. We are never alone.

But there is one caveat – there is a reason to give God thanks FOR the difficult circumstances in my life. Romans 8:28 says that ALL things work together for good for those who love God and are called according to his purpose. We see that ultimately fulfilled in the cross of Christ. There is nothing in this life that could be worse than murdering the Son of God! And yet, God used that for the greatest good we could experience - the forgiveness of sins and an eternal relationship with God! God is the great recycler – He takes our junk and turns it into something beautiful. Therefore, whatever evil or distressful or challenging or hurtful thing happens in my life, I have the promise that God will use that very thing to bring about something good. So, if my attitude is, "Okay God, this is terrible,

what good thing are you going to bring about because of this tragedy? How will you redeem this circumstance or situation?", then I have a reason to thank God for the thorns and not just the roses.

And while I know this is true, when it takes what seems like a long time for God to bring the good (and I may never even actually see what the good is), it sure is hard for me to keep giving thanks FOR the hurt... That is when I focus on giving God thanks IN the pain and not FOR the pain, because I know that God is with me and will never leave me.

Friends, I am thankful for many things because I am blessed beyond measure. I consider the people of Calvary to be one of my greatest blessings for which I am most thankful. Have you stopped to give God thanks lately? If you think about it, I am sure you can find many reasons to be thankful.

Confirmation Class – with a new twist!

It is time to once again be thinking about a

confirmation class. As a reminder, the purpose of confirmation is to give young people (typically between the ages of 10 and 15, with 12-13 being most common) resources and directed teaching about the Christian faith so they can claim the faith as their own.

Frequently, young people in the church were baptized as a baby and "adopted" as a child of the church. The family and the church pledged to help teach the child about Jesus and the Christian faith until they are ready to make that decision for themselves. In other words, the young person will now be confirming the faith pledged on their behalf when they were baptized.

However, it is also often the case that some (or all) of the kids in any particular year's confirmation class have not yet been baptized. When that is true, the kids will have the opportunity to be baptized as part of this process. But no one will be baptized more than once.

For the last few years, Calvary has been using a mentor approach to confirmation that pairs one youth with one adult who has been a Christian for a few years to share this part of their faith journey. The program curriculum we use has 13 sessions. We have been starting the class close to the beginning of the year in an attempt to complete the course sometime between Easter and June 1st.

Here is the new twist...We are considering making a retreat at Spring Heights part of confirmation. We are working with camp director, Louisa Smith (who will be transferring her membership to Calvary in October), to plan and implement this aspect of confirmation. Being in a retreat setting would help remove a few distractions and should greatly enhance the experience.

What I need from you – please help us identify youth in the 11-14 age range who may be ready to participate and make the decision to claim the Christian faith as their own and make a commitment to follow Jesus. They will also have the option (and most choose it) to join the church as a full member at the conclusion of the class. But no one will be under the obligation or forced or coerced into making this decision and we will emphasize

this throughout the experience. So, if your child or grandchild or other kid you know, is ready to start this journey, please let Pastor Steve know by November 1st so we can make the necessary arrangements and plans.

From online sources that summarize it well:

Origins and Establishment

All Saints Day, also known as All Hallows' Day or Hallowmas, has roots tracing back to the early Christian Church. Initially, Christians commemorated martyrs who died for their faith, dedicating specific days to remember those who sacrificed their lives. As the number of martyrs grew, it became increasingly difficult to assign individual feast days for each one. To address this, the Church created a collective feast to honor all martyrs, which laid the foundation for what would eventually become All Saints Day.

The first evidence of a specific date for All Saints Day is linked to Pope Gregory III (731-741), who dedicated a chapel in St. Peter's Basilica on November 1 in honor of all saints. This act formalized the observance of the day and broadened its scope to include not just martyrs but all saints who had attained eternal life in Heaven. In 837, Pope Gregory IV ordered its general observance on November 1, solidifying its place in the Church's calendar.

Celebration and Significance

In Western Christianity, All Saints Day is celebrated on November 1, while the Eastern Orthodox Church observes it on the first Sunday after Pentecost. The day is significant as it emphasizes the communion of saints—a belief that saints continue to intercede for those on Earth. It is a Holy Day of Obligation in Roman Catholicism, where the faithful are encouraged to attend Mass.

The celebration begins with its first vespers on the evening of October 31, known as All Hallows' Eve or Halloween, and concludes with the Compline of November 1. This three-day observance, which includes All Souls' Day on November 2, is a time for Christians to remember and honor all the faithful departed.

Cultural Practices

All Saints Day is marked by various cultural practices around the world. In many countries, it is a public holiday, and traditions include visiting cemeteries, lighting candles, and offering prayers for deceased loved ones. In some cultures, families create altars featuring images of saints and deceased relatives, while in others, special foods are prepared to honor the day.

In summary, All Saints Day serves as a profound reminder of the spiritual connection between the living and the saints, celebrating their lives and contributions to the Christian faith throughout history. It reflects the Church's understanding of the communion of saints and the belief in

the intercession of those who have attained eternal life.

Thomas Merton OCSO (January 31, 1915 - December 10, 1968), was an American Trappist monk, writer, theologian, mystic, poet, social activist and scholar of comparative religion. "For each one of us, there is only one thing necessary: to fulfill our own destiny, according to God's will."



100 YEARS OF CALVARY Stained-Glass Restoration

On or about September 19, 2025, Calvary entered into a

contract with Lynchburg Stained Glass to restore the windows in our sanctuary. This has been an interesting and challenging process for the trustees! The farther we got into the process, the more we realized how little we knew! I think all of us are glad that this only happens about once every 100 years or so!

I want to commend the trustees for their diligent work with this project. Lynchburg was selected from four different contractors after much debate, revisions, the checking of references, etc.

The current anticipated schedule is that they will remove the windows with the sash sometime in early January 2026. They anticipate this project to take 4 – 6 months to complete. So, if all goes well, the restored windows will be in place by July 4th. They should definitely be in place for our 100-year celebration in October 2026. There are 56 windows and 54 of them have been funded. We will still accept any donations you want to make for the remaining 2.

The second trip is a two-week trip (but you can go for just one week, if you prefer) from July 24th through August 7th. That departure date is the Friday of the Junior County Fair but if I go, I will not leave here until Sunday, July 26th after the completion of the fair. This trip is to Anchorage, and the team will stay and work at Anchor Park UMC. At least some of the work will be using equipment to dig around the building to work on a water drainage issue. But there will be plenty of other projects to complete. I hope to go on this trip as well, but I am undecided.

As with almost every mission trip there will be work for everyone who goes – at every level of skill, ability, or giftedness. You do not have to know how to put on shingles. You do not even have to get on the roof! You don't need to know anything about "French drains" to contribute to the team effort. It does take a willingness to learn and to pitch in and help with any and everything the team is tackling.

There will be more information available soon, but I wanted to get the dates to you so you can be praying about going and getting it on your calendar.

Also, I am confident that there will be additional short-term (no more than three days at a time) disaster response teams deployed throughout the year. I will try to keep those opportunities before you for your consideration. AND...our mission team

intends to take teams to some of the WV Conference mission sites to learn about their ministry and volunteer for a day. Be praying about how you can contribute to this vital work of Christ in the world.

CHURCH CONFERENCE

Our 2025 Church Conference was held on Sunday, October 26th, at 2:00pm with the Rev. Amy Shanholtzer presiding. We successfully completed all the business before us regarding the receiving of reports from the various ministries and programs in the church, recognized the lay servants and CLM in the congregation, set the salary for the pastor, and elected the officers who will serve the church in many different capacities beginning January 1, 2026.

All who were at the conference received a copy of a bound booklet with this information. The intention is for every household in the congregation to have a copy of the booklet to which they can refer throughout the year. We also plan to give a copy of the booklet to any guest/visitor who wants to know more about our congregation. This is a great resource! If you have a question about the building and want to know who is on the board of trustees, you can find that info with their contact information quickly. If you are curious about something financially, the members of the finance committee are provided. How much money does your ministry have allocated in the church budget for ministry in 2026? The budget is included. Do you want to know more about the ministry of Junior Church? They have a report. How much food and how many people did the pantry serve in 2025? It is in there! There are copies of the booklet at the entrances to the sanctuary and in the church office. We will print more copies as needed.

Once you set up an account and log in, you have access to dozens and dozens of short, targeted, informational videos and interactive programs designed to equip you to become a better disciple of Jesus and be more effective in ministry. Lunch Bunch

Do you normally eat alone? Do you find it difficult (not to mention lonely) to cook for one? Do you eat out more than you should or settle for cereal or a PB&J sandwich? Would you rather have some company about once a week?

Pastor Steve has a group affectionately known as the Lunch Bunch that is comprised of people in the community who share a lunchtime meal once a week - normally on Thursday at 12:30pm. We rotate to different restaurants and even have birthday cake once a month to celebrate everyone in the group who has a B-day

that month. We have almost 25 people in the group, and we average around 16 each week. There are people from Calvary, but there are also folks from other churches and those with no church affiliation. Men and women. Some are widowed, some never married, and others who have been divorced or separated. A diverse group except in one way - we normally eat alone, and we find this time of food and fellowship life-giving. It is often the highlight of the week for many. There are a lot of smiles and conversations!

Everyone is welcome to join us. If you are fortunate enough not to have to eat alone, perhaps you know someone who would benefit from this group. Just let Pastor Steve know that you would like to participate, and he will make sure you get the invitation and information about the next gathering.
