We witness Nehemiah, a cupbearer to the king whose prestigious position could turn fatal in an instant, modeling what it means to integrate prayer as a natural reflex in every situation. The text reveals how Nehemiah's heartbreak over Jerusalem's ruins wasn't just emotional sadness, but a response to the ravages of sin that had destroyed his beloved city. What's particularly striking is how Nehemiah prayed to the God of heaven right in the middle of a tense conversation with an earthly king who held his life in his hands. This teaches us that prayer shouldn't be reserved for quiet moments alone, but should become as automatic as blinking when something threatens our vision. The sermon draws beautiful parallels between Nehemiah and Jesus, both cupbearers in their own right: Nehemiah tasted wine to protect the king from death, while Jesus tasted death itself to make it safe for all believers. When we see how God granted Nehemiah's requests beyond what he could ask or imagine, we're reminded that operating within God's will opens doors we never knew existed. The question we must ask ourselves is profound: How far apart are our will and God's will today? Are we merely pursuing our own plans and asking God to bless them, or are we seeking His plan first and aligning ourselves accordingly?

Title: Aligning Your Will with God's Will: Lessons from Nehemiah

Sermon Summary: This sermon explores Nehemiah chapter 2, examining how Nehemiah's will perfectly aligned with God's will as he undertook the rebuilding of Jerusalem's walls. Key Points:
