Like a refiner who sits attentively over silver, God watches over us in the fire, knowing exactly how long to keep us there so that we are not destroyed, but transformed. The goal is not comfort, but Christlikeness—so that our lives reflect His glory and love to those around us.

It is easy to focus on the brokenness and sin outside the church, but God’s refining work begins within. We are called to examine our own hearts, to deal with the “clutter” and hidden sins that we may have ignored or justified. True revival and transformation in the world always begin with repentance and renewal among God’s people. When the church humbles itself, seeks God’s face, and turns from its own sin, God promises to heal and move in power.

Apathy and loveless religious activity can creep in, even when outwardly things look good. The call is to return to our first love—a passionate, wholehearted devotion to Jesus. Repentance is not a word of condemnation, but an invitation to come home, to be changed by the God who loves us deeply. As we surrender in the fire, God forges us into vessels that can carry His light and hope to a world in need.

5. Surrender in the Fire: The refining process requires our surrender.

Running from pain or numbing ourselves only delays God's work. When we choose to stay in His presence during trials, inviting Him to purify and change us, we emerge transformed—never the same, but more like Christ, ready to shine His light in the world. [46:41]

### Bible Reading

Ephesians 5:25-27 (ESV) — > Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish.

1 Peter 4:12-13 (ESV) — > Beloved, do not be surprised at the fiery trial when it comes upon you to test you, as though something strange were happening to you. But rejoice insofar as you share Christ's sufferings, that you may also rejoice and be glad when his glory is revealed.

Revelation 2:2-5 (ESV) — > I know your works, your toil and your patient endurance, and how you cannot bear with those who are evil, but have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and found them to be false.
