Our stories are not meant to glorify our mistakes, but to magnify the mercy and patience of Christ, who redeems even the worst of sinners.

Being prepared to share means living with a readiness to give an account of the hope within us. Opportunities may come unexpectedly—a conversation at a county fair, a chance encounter with a stranger, or a moment with a friend in need. We may not always get it right, but God's grace gives us new chances to speak of His goodness. Our hope is not wishful thinking, but a confident assurance rooted in the resurrection and promises of Jesus. This hope is desperately needed in a world that is often marked by despair and uncertainty.

Compassion must be our motivation. We share not to win arguments or prove ourselves right, but because every soul is precious to God. Gentleness and respect are the hallmarks of a heart that truly loves the lost. Our stories, no matter how ordinary or extraordinary, are designed for divine encounters—moments when God uses our words to touch another's heart in a way only He can orchestrate.

Never underestimate the power of your testimony. Whether your story is one of dramatic transformation or quiet faithfulness, it is a tool in God's hand to bring light into darkness. Speak boldly, with humility and love, and trust that God will use your story to draw others to Himself.

The world is hungry for hope, and our testimony must point to the living hope found in Christ. Whether through answered prayers, healing, or simply the peace that comes from knowing Jesus, our stories should radiate the assurance that God is present and active. Even in suffering or uncertainty, the hope we have in Christ is unshakeable and compelling. [54:54]

- Compassion and Humility are Essential Motivations

The motivation for sharing our story must be love for lost souls, not self-promotion or religious pride. Gentleness and respect open hearts far more than arguments or arrogance. When we approach others with authentic care, our words become vessels of God’s love, and our stories become invitations to experience His grace. [57:39]

Bible Study Discussion Guide: The Power of Your Story

Bible Reading

1 Peter 3:13-16 (ESV)

> Now who is there to harm you if you are zealous for what is good? But even if you should suffer for righteousness’ sake, you will be blessed. Have no fear of them, nor be troubled, but in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect, having a good conscience, so that, when you are slandered, those who revile your good behavior in Christ may be put to shame.

Observation Questions

1. According to 1 Peter 3:15, what should be the attitude of our hearts before we share our story or testimony?
2. In the sermon, what does the pastor say is the difference between a genuine relationship with Jesus and just “religion”? [[41:49]]
3. What does Peter say about the way we should share the reason for our hope? What two qualities does he mention? (See 1 Peter 3:15-16)
4. How does the pastor describe the world’s need for hope, and what role does our story play in meeting that need? [[53:47]]

Interpretation Questions

1. Why does Peter emphasize “gentleness and respect” when sharing our hope with others? How might this change the way people receive our story? (1 Peter 3:15-16)
2. The pastor shares that being honest about our past allows God’s grace to shine brighter. Why is it important not to hide or sugarcoat our failures when sharing our testimony? [[45:01]]
3. What does it mean to “revere Christ as Lord in your heart” before sharing your story? How does this affect the authenticity of your testimony? [[39:52]]
4. The sermon mentions that opportunities to share our story can come at unexpected times. Why is it important to be ready “in season and out of season”? [[51:51]]

Application Questions

1. The pastor said, “Your story must be about a genuine relationship with Jesus.” Is there any area of your faith that feels more like a ritual or tradition than a real relationship? What would it look like to make Jesus the true King of your heart this week? [[39:52]]
2. Think about your own story. Are there parts of your past you are tempted to hide or gloss over? How might sharing honestly about your failures help someone else see God’s grace? [[45:01]]
3. The sermon encourages us to always be ready to share our hope. Can you recall a recent moment when you had an opportunity to share your faith but hesitated or missed it? What could you do differently next time? [[51:51]]
4. The pastor said our hope is “not wishful thinking, but a confident assurance rooted in the resurrection and promises of Jesus.” How does this kind of hope show up in your daily life, especially during hard times? [[54:54]]
5. Compassion and humility are essential motivations for sharing our story. When you think about people who don’t know Jesus, do you feel more compassion or frustration? How can you grow in gentleness and respect toward them? [[57:39]]
6. The pastor shared that every story—whether dramatic or ordinary—can be used by God. Do you ever feel like your story isn’t “special enough” to share? What is one way you can trust God to use your story this week? [[01:01:17]]
7. The psalmist says, “I do not seal my lips, Lord, as you know.” Is there someone in your life who needs to hear your story of faith? What is one step you can take to share it with them soon? [[01:06:18]]

Invite group members to pray for courage, authenticity, and compassion as they prepare to share their stories. Pray that God would open doors for divine encounters and use each person’s testimony to bring hope to others.
