


The Jews considered the Old Testament canon closed almost 400 years before Jesus was born.


From the time of Irenaeus in the 2nd century A.D. the church was already referring to the Canon of Truth and by 350 A.D., in the time of Athanasius, the Bible was accepted as the completed, established cannon of Scripture.



But what if we are missing an essential inspired passage in our Bibles?

Eph 1:11 In Him also we have obtained an inheritance, being predestined according to the purpose of Him who works all things according to the counsel of His will,

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2. It is certain that there will not be any additions to the Old Testament.

The Jews were very careful when handling Scripture:

They possessed an almost "superstitious" reverence for the Bible.

- There were specifications not only for the kind of skins to be used and the size of the columns, but there was even a religious ritual necessary for the scribe to perform before writing the name of God.
- Rules governed the kind of ink used, dictated the spacing of words, and prohibited writing anything from memory.
- The lines, and even the letters, were counted methodically.
- If a manuscript was found to contain even one mistake, it was discarded and destroyed.

- 3. The only additions to the Bible would be to the New Testament.
- 4. Many books have been suggested as candidates for canonization in the N.T. only to fail under strict scrutiny.

The Book of Thomas:

"Let Mary go away from us, because women are not worthy of life. Lo, I shall lead her in order to make her a male, so that she too may become a living spirit, resembling you males. For every woman who makes herself male will enter into the kingdom of heaven."

Gospel of Thomas, 94.197

The apocryphal forgery known as the Gospel of Peter:

"Now when the soldiers saw that, they woke up the centurion and the elders (for they also were there keeping watch). While they were yet telling them the things which they had seen, they saw three men come out of the tomb, two of them sustaining the other one, and a cross following after them. The heads of the two they saw had heads that reached up to heaven, but the head of him that was led by them went beyond heaven. And they heard a voice out of the heavens saying, 'Have you preached unto them that sleep?' The answer that was heard from the cross was, 'Yes!'"

5. The canon is closed theologically & historically – it is open only hypothetically.

- The canon is closed theologically:
 - In the last days God speaks through Christ -

Heb 1:1 God, who at various times and in various ways spoke in time past to the fathers by the prophets, ²has in these last days spoken to us by His Son, ...

- The apostolic age ended with the apostles -

Acts 1:21-22 "Therefore, of these men who have accompanied us all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, ²²beginning from the baptism of John to that day when He was taken up from us, one of these must become a witness with us of His resurrection."

God's revelation is complete –

Rev 22:18-19 For I testify to everyone who hears the words of the prophecy of this book: If anyone adds to these things, God will add to him the plagues that are written in this book; ¹⁹and if anyone takes away from the words of the book of this prophecy, God shall take away his part from the Book of Life, from the holy city, and from the things which are written in this book. ²⁰He who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am coming quickly." Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus! ²¹The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen.

The canon is closed historically:

No one with verified "apostolic gifts" has arisen since the death of John.

The canon is open hypothetically:

It is historically unlikely & providentially improbable that we will discover a "lost" manuscript qualified to be added to the New Testament.


Remember:

For a book to be included in the New Testament canon, among the many tests it had to pass, it had to pass the "Apostolicity Test" – meaning, it had to be written by an apostle or under the direct supervision of an apostle by an associate.

New Testament written by apostles or under the close scrutiny of an apostle:

- 1. Matthew, an apostle, wrote the book of Matthew
- 2. Mark was an associate of Peter 1 Pet 5:13, Acts 12:25, 2 Tim 4:11
- 3. Luke was an associate of Paul Col 4:14, Phile 24
- 4. John, an apostle, wrote John, John 1, 2, & 3, & The Revelation
- 5. Acts was written by Luke Acts 1:1
- 6. Paul, an apostle, wrote Romans Philemon
- 7. Hebrews was written by revelation from God (1:1) & was confirmed by the apostles (2:3-4) Paul is generally believed to be the author
- 8. James wrote the book of James he was the half brother of Jesus (Js 1:1, Gal 1:19) & was the leader of the church in Jerusalem (Acts 15:13, Gal 2:9)
- 9. Peter, an apostle, wrote 1 & 2 Peter
- 10. Jude was written by Jesus Praffbrotheriable Jude 1:1, Mt 13:55

7. It is important to note that the New Testament church is built upon the apostles and and their teachings

Eph 2:20 having been built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief cornerstone,

Acts 2:42 And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine

Gal 2:9 and when James, Cephas, and John, who seemed to be pillars

8. An apostle had to meet these strict requirements:

 They had to be among those who had followed Jesus throughout His earthly ministry

Acts 1:21-22 "Therefore, of these men who have accompanied us all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, ²²beginning from the baptism of John to that day when He was taken up from us, one of these must become a witness with us of His resurrection."

They had to be hand picked by Jesus

They could not "choose themselves to follow (Mt 8:19-22)

Mt 4:18-22

Mt 9:9


Mt 10:1-4

1 Cor 9:1 Am I not an apostle? Am I not free? Have I not seen Jesus Christ our Lord? Are you not my work in the Lord?




Some ask how Paul could have been an apostle

 He was handpicked by Jesus





 He saw the resurrected Jesus



Therefore, it also safe to say that, other than with the discovery of some authentic writings that meet the test of apostolicity, the New Testament canon is closed!
