When God moves His children on, He goes before them, protects them behind, and provides everything needed for the journey. Leaving Laban is sometimes the only way to follow the Lord.

- Laban's sons resent Jacob.
- Laban's attitude shifts.
- God speaks clearly: "Return... and I will be with thee."

- Jacob calls his wives privately.
- He recounts God's faithfulness despite Laban's deceit.
- God prospered Jacob supernaturally.

III. GOD SOMETIMES USES UNLIKELY VOICES TO CONFIRM HIS WILL	
Genesis 31:14-16	
Rachel and Leah agree: their father mistreated them.	
 They support Jacob's obedience: "Whatsoever God hath s thee, do." 	aid unto

IV. OBEDIENCE OFTEN REQUIRES SWIFT, QUIET ACTION	
Genesis 31:17–21	
 Jacob gathers his family and goods quickly. 	
 Rachel secretly steals Laban's idols. 	
 Jacob leaves without telling Laban — wisdom, not deceit.

V. WHEN YOU STEP OUT IN OBEDIENCE, THE ENEMY WILL PURSUE Genesis 31:22-25

- Laban chases Jacob for seven days.
- God confronts Laban: "Speak not to Jacob good or bad."
- Obedience is always protected by God's presence.
