PART 2 The Definition of Prayer

Prayer is the rightful, personal response of the creature to his Creator in light of His revelation and redemption.

It is the ultimate act of worship, dependency, and love, whereby the worshiper pours out his soul before God.

What is prayer, specifically?

The "ACTS" approach:

- Adoration
- Confession
- Thanksgiving
- Supplication

The three "Rs" approach

- Rejoice
- Repent
- Request

Prayer's components...

1. Worshipful Adoration

Worship is rendering to God the honor, respect, glory, and love due His holy majesty in light of how worthy He is.

Psalm 33:1 – "Sing for joy in the LORD, O you righteous ones; praise is becoming to the upright."

Daniel 9:4 – "I prayed to the LORD my God and confessed and said, 'Alas, O Lord, the great and awesome God, who keeps His covenant and lovingkindness for those who love Him and keep His commandments . . ."

Matt 6:9 – "Hallowed by Thy name"

- 1.1. As is often seen in the Psalms, we are to have a spirit permeated by a sense of God, who He is as the God who hears and answers prayer.
 - → He is *righteous* (Pss 5; 145:7, 17)
 - \rightarrow He is strong and does mighty works (Pss 21:13; 46:1; 59:16-17; 65:6-13; 74:12-17; 145:1-21), as is especially seen in His work of creation.
 - → He is the *sovereign king* (Pss 5; 10:16-18; 145:11, 13; 149)
 - → He is *loving and gracious* (Pss 107:1; 111; 118:1-4, 29)

1.2. In the Psalms we see praise mingled with other components of prayer, as worship undergirds these other elements.

Psalm 119 especially shows the interconnectedness of praise with other elements of prayer:

- → thanksgiving ("I shall give thanks to you" v. 7)
- → commitment ("I shall keep Your statutes" v. 8)
- \rightarrow petition ("Deal bountifully with Your servant" v. 17)
- → confession ("I cling to Your testimonies!" v. 31)
- \rightarrow separation ("I hate those who are double-minded" v. 113)
- \rightarrow etc.

- 1.3. *Praise* and *thanksgiving* appear to be virtually <u>synonymous</u> in many Psalms.
 - → Conceptually, praise especially mingles with thanksgiving (Pss 75; 103-105)
 - → Lexically, the terms express the main though of *appreciation*, acknowledgement, or recognition—whether of God's person, His works, or His gifts.
 - → Careful, neat distinctions between the terms cannot be maintained (e.g., "praise" is for God's person; "thanksgiving" is for His words).

Rosscup: "Both English words 'praise' and 'thanksgiving' are words under one umbrella—acknowledgement/appreciation/respect for God's excellent worthiness. Both give credit or glory or magnification for His **attributes** and for His **acts**."

If any distinction is to be made:

- → PRAISE: focuses more particularly on **God's greatness** in His person and His performance.
- → THANKSGIVING: focuses more on **our gratitude** for His person and His performance (i.e., it is our response to the direct and personal intersection of God's greatness **in our lives**).

1.4. Praise is practiced through biblical and personal observation, consideration, and remembrance.

David MacIntyre (*The Hidden Life of Prayer*) summarizes the worship component of prayer in three categories:

- (1) it is acknowledgement of daily mercies;
- (2) it is praise for the gift of redemption; and
- (3) it is contemplation of the Divine perfections.

ATTRIBUTES

of GOD

To study God's attributes is to study his character, to answer questions like, Who is God? and What is God like? A typical classification of God's attributes divides them into those that are incommunicable (those that he does not share or "communicate" to anyone or anything else) and communicable (those that he shares with other beings). Like most theological classifications, this one is imperfect but still helpful as we seek to understand what is so far beyond ourselves.

God's communicable attributes can be further categorized into: attributes of God's being, mental attributes, moral attributes, attributes of purpose and "summary" attributes (attributes that, in a more particular way, modify each of the others).

It is important to consider that God is not simply the sum of his attributes. His attributes are not separate from one another, but each one modifies or qualifies each of the others.

ASEITY

God is self-existent and selfsufficient and has no need of human beings or the rest of creation.

BEAUTY

Summary attributes

God is the possessor and the sum of all desirable qualities.

BLESSEDNESS

Summary attributes

God delights fully in himself and in all that reflects his character.

ETERNITY

God has always existed, having no beginning and no end, and experiencing no succession of moments.

FREEDOM

Attributes of Purpose

God does whatever he pleases.

GLORY

Summary attributes

The created brightness that surrounds God's revelation of himself.

GOODNESS

Moral attributes

God is the final standard of all good, and all he is and does is worthy of approval.

HOLINESS

Moral attributes

God is separated from sin and he is committed to seeking his own honor.

IMMUTABILITY

God cannot change in his being, perfections, purposes, and promises.

INVISIBILITY

Attributes describing God's being

God's total essence, all of his being, will never be visible to us.

JEALOUSY

Moral attributes

God always seeks to protect his own honor.

KNOWLEDGE Mental attributes

God's omniscience)

God fully knows himself and all actual and possible things. (This is also know as

LOVE

Moral attributes

God eternally gives of himself to others.

MERCY

Moral attributes

God is good to those in misery and distress and he is good to those who deserve punishment.

OMNIPOTENCE Attributes of Purpose

God is able to do all his holy will. (This is also known as God's sovereignty)

OMNIPRESENCE

God has no size or shape and is present in all places with his entire being.

PEACE

Moral attributes

God, in his being and actions, is separate from all confusion and disorder.

PERFECTION

Summary attributes

God fully possesses all excellent qualities and lacks no qualities that would be desirable for him.

RIGHTEOUSNESS

Moral attributes

God is the final standard of what is right and he always acts in accordance with what is right. (This is also known as God's justice)

SPIRITUALITY Attributes dose

Attributes describing God's being

God is a being who is not made up of matter and who cannot be perceived by our bodily senses.

TRUTHFULNESS

Mental attributes

God is the true God whose knowledge and words are both true and the final standard of truth.

UNITY

God's whole being includes all of his attributes at all times. These attributes are never in opposition.

WILLAttributes of Purpose

God approves and determines to bring about every action necessary for the existence and activity of all that exists.

WISDOM Mental attributes

God always chooses the best goals and the best means to those goals.

WRATH Moral attributes

God intensely hates all sin.

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Q: What does it mean to bless the Lord?

PSALM 103

Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, *bless* His holy name. Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget none of his benefits. (vv. 1-2)

. . .

Bless the LORD, you His angels, Mighty in strength, who perform His word, Obeying the voice of His word!

Bless the LORD, all you His hosts, You who serve Him, doing His will. Bless the LORD, all you works of His, In all places of His dominion; Bless the LORD, O my soul! (vv. 20-22)
