Mark 12:28-34

Pressing questions demand our attention and dictate the use of our calendar and resources—what's for dinner, completing and paying taxes, task lists, meetings—the flurry of activity that these concerns press upon us threaten to suppress our attention to the most primary questions of life—our ultimate purpose and how our lives are part of God's master plan.
