#### **LAODICEA** (3:14-22)

Introduction:

"Oh, that you were cold or hot" or "Give me all your hate or all your heart."

# A. *The Dynamic Christ!* (3:14)

- 1. The All-Conquering One! (14a)
  - The God of Amen carries the meaning of finality.
  - Revelation begins and ends with two double-amens. (1:6-7 and 22:20-21)
- 2. The All-Convicting One! (14b)
  - The God of Truth.
  - He neither dilutes nor distorts.
- 3. The All-Controlling One! (14c)
  - The God who is the origin of creation.
  - He controls it all.

## B. *The Deluded Church!* (3:15-17)

- 1. Their compromise is nauseating. (3:15-16)
  - This is a spiritual condition.
  - Their curse is neutrality they have been reduced to room temperature.

- This condition is illustrated by the story of Lot.
- A condition without hope.
- 2. They were ignorant of their own condition. (3:7)
  - The symbolism of hot and cold spiritually.
  - Luke people offer no confrontation of the world and distinctive witness of Jesus.
  - The Archetype of the present-day church.
  - Only one conclusion.

# C. *The Choice!* (3:18-19)

- 1. Restoration of spiritual values!
  - They took pride in their wealth and said they were rich, but Jesus said they were poor.
  - Conflicting value systems.
  - Eternal riches are appropriated by the blood of Jesus and are available only by faith. Isaiah 55:1
- 2. Restoration of spiritual virtues!\_(3:18)
  - This indicates the righteousness required to come into God's presence.
  - Laodicea was a great center for the manufacturing of clothing.
  - Isaiah 61:10 God's provision of "garments of salvation" and the "robe of righteousness."

- 3. Restoration of spiritual vision! (3:18)
  - Worldliness clouds spiritual vision.
  - Laodicea was famous for its eye salve.
  - Proverbs 29:18

# 4. "As many as I love, I rebuke, discipline, be zealous therefore, and repent! (3:19)

- Can a church recapture spiritual values, spiritual virtue, and spiritual vision?
- The answer is simply REPENT.

#### 5. What can we learn from these churches?

## D. *Christ's challenge!* (3:20-22)

- 1. The Lord is standing outside the church at Laodicea. This is the primary meaning of this verse.
- 2. However, it is legitimate to apply this text to sinners.
- 3. What a view of Jesus!
  - In an act of unbelievable condescension, he requests permission to enter.
  - Three promises.

4. The last word is to the overcomer.
