First Peter: Standing firm in the hope and encouragement of the grace of God!

Lesson Title: The War Against the Soul!

Introduction

The central section of Peter's letter (2:11-3:12) emphasizes *submission* in the life of the believer. Peter applies the theme of submission to the life of a believer as a citizen (2:11-17), a worker (2:18-25), a marriage partner (3:1-7), and a member of the Christian assembly (3:8-12).

WAR AGAINST THE SOUL!

- A. The bad news. (2:11)
 - 1. Our fleshly passions are at war within us.
 - 2. Their aim is to cripple you, harm you, and make you ineffective.
 - 3. Peter has two goals in these verses:
 - Know who your enemy is.
 - Fight the enemy.
- B. What are the passions of the flesh?
 - 1. Galatians 5:16-26 will help us understand.
 - 2. There was no struggle before you were saved because you were dead in sin.
 - 3. But after the new birth there is a war: the new creature at war with the old creature.
 - 4. So how do these passions of the flesh wage war against the soul?

C. Strategy: To keep you from doing that for which you were made.

- 1. Our identity is 2:4-10.
- 2. Our passions of the flesh attempt to make God's naming of us untrue.

D. Strategy: To shrink our soul to the size of smaller pleasures.

- 1. To shrink our soul into base urges and animalistic instincts.
- 2. To hinder our understanding that all good gifts and pleasures come from God.
- 3. God made pleasures to serve our worship and usher us to Himself.

E. Strategy: To cut us off from fellowship.

- 1. To isolate us.
- 2. To erode our relationships.

F. Strategy: Total Destruction! Total War!

- 1. Our passions are fundamentally a god complex.
- They want what God wants. God wants our heart, soul, mind, strength all of us. God is not satisfied with second.
- 3. No one in this war is going to settle for a negotiated solution.

HOW DO WE FIGHT BACK?

- A. Believe in our identity who we are.
 - 1. Peter begins by saying "*Beloved*".
 - 2. Before we begin fighting, we need to remember that we are loved.
 - 3. Second, Peter calls us "sojourners and exiles."
 - 4. This means we are sojourners and exiles within the kingdom of men, but we are citizens of God's new kingdom.
 - 5. The idea is that we maintain our peculiarity and decline to adopt the culture of the kingdom we reside in as resident aliens with a smile on our face.
 - 6. We do not become God's people by our abstinence we confirm our identity as his people by our abstinence.

B. What is sin aiming for?

C. Embrace total war.

- 1. The flesh is aiming at total war and total victory. So, what should we be aiming for?
- 2. When Peter says, "Abstain", you may see that as a weak word, but Peter is saying, "Run! Put some distance between yourself and these passions."
- 3. Listen to how radical Jesus would have us to be in this war in Matthew 5:27-30.

D. Develop a passion for better hopes and glories.

- 1. Abstinence is saying NO to one thing to say YES to a better thing.
- 2. Self-denial is denying yourself, but in the end, it turns out to be the only way to authentically love yourself.
- 3. Taking up your cross and following Jesus is not about death in the end, but about resurrection. It is the defeat of death.

1 PETER 2:21-25 SUBSTITUTION AND TRANSFORMATION!

- A. Two parts: Substitution and Transformation.
 - 1. Jesus saves us the just for the unjust.
 - 2. Jesus' suffering transforms us the unjust becomes just.

B. Jesus' suffering saves us!

- 1. He tells us why we need saving.
- 2. He tells us Jesus did not need saving.
- 3. He tells us how Jesus saved us.

Note: THE DEVIL WANTS YOU TO HAVE JESUS AS ANYTHING BUT A SUBSTITUTIONAL, SACRIFICAL LAMB

C. Jesus' suffering transforms us!

- 1. "He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness." (v.24)
- 2. This is substitution in order that it might be transformational.
- 3. Jesus' substitution is meant to result in imitation. He provided an example of a whole way for us to be called and live. What is that example?
- 4. It looks like "cross bearing".
- 5. The word that Peter uses for EXAMPLE means a PATTERN to be traced in order to learn.
- 6. Peter wants that cross shaped pattern of Jesus' life, death and resurrection, to be what our lives look like.
