Let's Talk About It

Who needs Christmas? Well, as it turns out, we all do. God waited until the time was right and things were just the way He wanted, to send His Son to save us. Jesus' life, death and resurrection were a demonstration of God's perfect timing and His faithfulness to fulfill His promise.

Genesis 12:1-3; Isaiah 49:6; Malachi 1:11; Galatians 4:4; Luke 1:26-33

- Which part of the message made an impact, caught your attention or challenged you?
- Read Genesis 12:13. Abram believed something he couldn't yet see. What is something you're believing for that hasn't happened yet? How does Abram's example inspire you to keep believing?
- Read Galatians 4:4. Pastor Gregg traced how the Christmas story unfolded over two thousand years until the conditions were exactly as God wanted them. When has God's timing been different for you? How does hindsight often change your feelings?
- The struggling nation of Israel had no reason to believe God's promises given their dire circumstances. Talk about a time when you've seen someone trust God despite challenging or seemingly hopeless circumstances. Why do we often struggle to trust in God's faithfulness to us?
- Read Luke 1:26-33. The full Christmas story from God's promises to Abram all the way to the birth of Jesus is a reminder of God's timing and His faithfulness. Which of those do you need to be reminded of this Christmas?
