He entered Jericho and was passing through. 2 And behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus. Let's Talk About It

In Sunday's message, Vince talks about Zacchaeus—a man who went out of his way to see Jesus and ended up having his life completely changed. Even though he was looked down on by others, Jesus saw his heart and his desperation to know Him, even calling Zacchaeus by name. It's a great reminder that Jesus is always looking for us, and when He gives us an opportunity to respond, we shouldn't miss it!

Luke 19:1-10; Romans 15:13

Discussion questions

- Which part of the message impacted or challenged you?
- Zacchaeus made an effort to see Jesus—what are some ways we can be more intentional about seeking Him in our daily lives?
- Climbing a tree wasn't something a wealthy, powerful man like Zacchaeus would normally do. What does this bold move say about his hunger for Jesus, and how does his response to Jesus' invitation show a transformed heart? Is there something God might be asking you to do that feels risky or uncomfortable but shows your own hunger for Him?
- Zacchaeus faced limitations—his small stature and his unpopular job as a tax collector—but he didn't let these hold him back from seeking Jesus. What are some things in your life that feel like barriers or limitations keeping you from fully living for Jesus? How can you overcome or see those challenges differently, just like Zacchaeus did?
- Have you ever experienced a "short notice" opportunity from God—a moment when you felt called to act quickly? What happened when you responded? How did it affect your faith or your relationships? What can you learn from that experience that might help you be more ready to say "yes" the next time God gives you a similar opportunity?

Take a Step

This week, ask God to make you aware of any "short notice opportunities" He places in your path—whether it's a conversation, a chance to help someone, or a moment to share your faith. When it comes, don't overthink it—respond like Zacchaeus did: with boldness and joy. Then, be ready to share your experience with the group next week!
